

Story behind the baseline:

In 2015-2016, the total student population for all 3 schools was 2,043. The total number enrolled in the SBHC was 1,177 (57.6%). The number of students served was 153 (7.5% of the total population and 13% of those enrolled).

Of the 153 students served, 95 (62%) were publically insured, 23 (15%) were privately insured, 7 (5%) had no insurance, and 27 (18%) had other or unknown.


In 2015-2016, a process to request reimbursement services provided was implemented. This involved much more training and communication to secure insurance authorizations, and improved documentation of treatment plans. For students who don't have insurance we provide them with information for Husky and other financial resources as appropriate.

How Well Did We Do?

Screen All Students for Mental/Behavioral Health Issues that received a Medical Visit.



Story behind the baseline:

Students deemed to be "at risk" are those identified by the social worker as necessitating continued intervention. Of the 1,091 students with a medical visit in the 2015-2016 school year, 153 (14%) students were screened with the behavioral health screener. Of those 120 (11%) were considered positive for risk and in need of continued care.



Students Receiving Counseling Meeting their Goals



Story behind the baseline:

Among the goals SBHC staff have for students is to maintain their healthy functioning in the community and avoid crises that escalate to ED/inpatient intervention. Of the 153 students that received counseling for 3 or more months, 141 (92%) achieved at least one goal and were successfully maintained in the community. The other 12 (8%) students required ED or inpatient evaluation and/or treatment (any cause).

How Much Did We Do:

Survey the staff to assess their knowledge of the medical and mental health services available at the SBHC.

How Well Did We Do:

Provide professional development on how to complete a risk assessment.

Is Anyone Better Off:

In the upcoming year a survey and interview will be done on those students who did not attain their goal, and those that went elsewhere for counseling.

Data Development Agenda:

- 1. Document in EHR goals that students are trying to reach and progress.
- 2. Do pre and post-test screeners on all students that receive counseling.
