## AMENDMENTS

Docket #FIC 2022-0316 Ahmaad Lane v. Commissioner, State of Connecticut, Department of Correction; and State of Connecticut, Department of Correction

Paragraphs 18-20 and the order recommended in the Hearing Officer's Report are amended as follows:

18. It is found that the approximate 12-week delay in providing the one responsive email to the complainant was [not] reasonable **UNDER THE FACTS AND CIRCUMSTANCES OF THIS CASE.** 

[19. Upon consideration of all the factors presented, and under the facts and circumstances of this particular case, it is found that the respondents did not provide the responsive email to the complainant promptly.]

[20.] 19. Consequently, it is concluded that the respondents **DID NOT** violate[d] the promptness provisions of §§1-210(a) and 1-212(a), G.S.

The following order by the Commission is hereby recommended on the basis of the record concerning the above-captioned complaint:

1. [Henceforth, the respondents shall comply with the promptness provisions of §§1-210(a) and 1-212(a), G.S.] **THE COMPLAINT IS HEREBY DISMISSED.**
