- Use <u>proven strategies</u> to encourage parents and patients to stay up to date on vaccinations.
- Make <u>immunization schedules</u> easy for parents and patients to find by displaying them <u>on your website</u>.
- Use tools like <u>PneumoRecs VaxAdvisor Mobile App</u> to help you make vaccine recommendations.
- Share clear and accurate information about the latest vaccine recommendations, including <u>COVID-19 vaccines</u>, <u>Flu vaccines</u> and <u>RSV vaccines</u>.

Check out the <u>National Immunization Awareness Month</u> <u>local events</u> planned by our Immunization Action Plan (IAP) contractors throughout the state!



Adolescent Reminder/Recall Pilot Project

A group of CVP clinics were selected for a **reminder/recall pilot for the human papillomavirus (HPV) vaccine.** Clinics that were selected for this pilot project have a large adolescent patient population. If your clinic was selected, you received an email on July 18th to notify you and provide instructions to view your reminder/recall report in CT WiZ.

The purpose of this pilot is to determine the feasibility, acceptability, and effectiveness of DPH-generated reminder/recall reports and messages at getting patients who have initiated the HPV vaccine series up to date.

Call to Action: Strengthening Kindergarten Vaccination Coverage

CDC data show that <u>vaccination coverage among kindergarteners</u> has declined to its lowest level in decades and an estimated 750,000 young learners entered kindergarten during the COVID-19 pandemic who were not up to date on their school vaccinations. Recent upticks in <u>global and domestic measles cases</u> <u>and outbreaks</u> underscore that under- and unvaccinated children are at risk for serious illness. Routine immunization catch-up is a goal we can achieve by working together. CDC calls upon <u>health care providers</u>, <u>education professionals</u>, and <u>trusted community messengers</u> (with materials also available in <u>Spanish</u>) to help keep kids healthy, in school, and ready to learn.


What Can You Do?
