Minutes

CFRP Data/Discussion

There were 4 cases reported to the OCA by the OCME since the last meeting. The causes were homicide, suicide an MVA and an unsafe sleep environment. The suicide involved a firearm and a young teenager. A 22 year look at the manners and causes for adolescents was broken down. Data shows that there had been a decline in fatalities of 16-year-olds, and an increase in the number of suicides for the 18–24-year age group. Suicide data doesn't speak to the number of kids who make attempts or have suicidal ideations. 70K kids that have been screened in CT during the past 10 years have showed signs of being at risk for suicide. Medicaid's limitations with regards to reimbursement rates were discussed, plan not widely accepted for young adult SA treatment.

A Collective Impact Approach to Addressing Minor Homelessness, Stacey Violante-Cote, CCA

- -Definition of homelessness is different depending on age (Unstably Housed vs. Literally Homeless)
- -In 2017, 1 in 10 young adults (18-25 yrs.) had experienced homelessness
- -50-75% of youth experiencing homelessness have been arrested.
- -Youths with a HS diploma or GED are less likely to experience homelessness
- -2020-Youth Data- Pre pandemic, showed that 696 minors 17 and under experienced homelessness.

An Unspoken Crisis: Connecticut's 119,000 at-risk and disconnected youth- Chris Lyddy, Dalio Foundation

- -Dalio Foundation research agenda culminated in 3 commissioned reports having to do with getting young people back on track, national policies and practices affecting young people and how to elevate the voices of young people.
- -Age groups considered 14-26 years of age, categories included youths who were on track, at risk and those who were disconnected
- -Data was gathered from various state agencies that provide services to the specific age group in conjunction with interviewing providers. Youths experiencing disconnection were also interviewed.
- -From 2021-2022 1 in 5 young people were disconnected or at risk
- -Students who received prior state services, experienced poverty or were involved in SPED programing had higher rates of becoming disconnected.
- Research indicated that there would be a positive economic impact to getting young back on track.
