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Testimony of the Office of Chief Public Defender Benedict R. Daigle, Assistant Public Defender

Committee on Judiciary – March 13, 2023
Raised S.B. 953 – An Act Concerning the Definition of Racial Profiling

The Office of Chief Public Defender (OCPD) <u>supports</u> **Raised S.B. 953 – An Act Concerning the Definition of Racial Profiling (LCO 3347),** as the bill would appropriately modernize Connecticut's definition of racial profiling to ensure that law enforcement units are not permitted to engage in racial profiling to any degree, except to apprehend a specific suspect whose racial or ethnic status is part of the description of the suspect.

OCPD is a longstanding member of the Connecticut Racial Profiling Prohibition Project (CTRP3) Advisory Board.¹ OCPD concurs with the CTRP3 Advisory Board's testimony, as submitted by the Hon. William Dyson, the Board's chair – including the request that the proposed changes apply to both C.G.S. § 54-1*l* and C.G.S. § 54-1m.

This office highlights the Board's conclusion:

By updating our statutory definition, we can continue to be a model for the country and fulfill our goal to eliminate racial profiling, use data to improve roadway safety and increase trust between law enforcement and the communities they serve. A modernized definition will allow us to build upon our success and continue to work towards a more fair and just society.

OCPD urges passage of this legislation. Thank you.
