SENATE BILL 980 AN ACT AUTHORIZING AND ADJUSTING BONDS OF THE STATE

Summary of Proposal:

The Governor is proposing new General Obligation (GO) bond authorizations of \$1.404 billion in FY 2024 and \$1.657 billion in FY 2025.

The Governor is also recommending authorizations for \$1.517 billion of Special Tax Obligation (STO) bonds in FY 2024 and \$1.494 billion in FY 2025, to keep our transportation infrastructure in a state of good repair and leverage just over \$4 billion of available matching federal funds. Lastly, the Governor is recommending \$25 million in FY 2025 of revenue bonds to fund low interest loans under the Clean Water Fund.

The Governor's capital budget includes a new authorization for the 'Northeast Corridor Modernization Match Program'. This program aims to leverage over \$1.5 billion available federal dollars via the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act across FY 2024 & FY 2025.

Authorizations approved in prior sessions are not included in the Governor's budget but will become effective over the biennium.

Automatic authorizations becoming effective over the biennium include:

- 1. \$84.7 million in FY 2024 and \$56.0 million in FY 2025 for UConn 2000;
- 2. \$24 million in FY 2024 for the Bioscience Innovation Fund; and
- 3. \$10.0 million in FY 2024 and \$10.3 million in FY 2025 for the Strategic Defense Investment Act.

Pre-authorizations becoming effective over the biennium include:

- 1. \$10 million in FY 2024 for Smart Start grants;
- 2. \$25 million each year for the Crumbling Foundations Program;
- 3. \$50 million in FY 2025 for Baby Bonds;
- 4. \$175 million each year for the Community Investment Fund;
- 5. \$5 million each year for Connecticut Port Authority Projects;
- 6. \$14.5 million in FY 2024 and \$9.2 million in FY 2025 for UCONN Research Faculty; and
- 7. \$23.5 million in FY 2024 and \$13.5 million in FY 2025 for CT Next.

Reason for Proposal:

This bill implements the Governor's recommended capital budget for the biennium.

Significant Impacts:

The Governor is prioritizing bond allocations to areas that require the most investment, which include affordable housing, energy and environmental programs, school construction, information technology improvements, economic development, workforce development, and state agency infrastructure improvements.
