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DCF Statutory Mandates Established under CGS Section 17a-2

- Child Protective Services
- Prevention
- ❖ Lead state agency for children's behavioral health services
 - ❖ Mental health services
 - Substance use disorders
 - Suicide prevention
 - ❖ Juvenile justice diversion
- ❖ All children under age 18
- Children in foster care at age 18 can voluntarily remain in DCF care until the age of 21 and continue to receive services and support

Seven Key Performance Indicators DCF Operations – key results



What are we aiming to deliver for children & families? What are our aspirational targets?

Children are able to live safely with their families

>70% of DCF children are served in their own home

Children will live with relatives, kin, or someone they know For children who cannot stay in their own home, >70% will be in kinship or relative care

Children will live with a family

>90% of children in care will be in a home setting; with at least 2.5 beds available per child coming into care

Children will be in congregate care settings rarely, and briefly

<10% of children in care will be in congregate settings; with average length of stay of <60 days

Children will experience timely permanency

>60% of children in care will achieve permanency within 12 months

Children in care will be better off - healthy, safe, smart & strong >90% of children in care will have their needs met on medical/dental, academic achievement, mental health <2% will experience repeat maltreatment

Youth who age out will be prepared for success

Of children who age out of DCF: >85% will graduate from high school, >60% will be employed or enrolled in post secondary education, >95% will have a defined positive adult in their life, <5% will go into homelessness


