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are suspended per the executive order from the Governor nothing will happen yet.

- DPH is looking at how these new requirements align with the executive order and will be following up with everyone who either has a license or a certification once it's all sorted out.
- The language reflects it should be available and a requirement starting January 1, 2022, however, it's not an issue since there's an executive order suspending it. In the meantime, as a body, we can look at identifying and approving some Suicide Prevention training.
- Training is being developed in conjunction with the Office of Child Advocate, and the Youth Suicide Advisory Board, which is evidence-based training, however for Community health workers evidence-based training is not required. There was mention that evidence-based training could be utilized to cover the CEU requirement, but it is not required.
- Aware there are some mental health training that others may have taken as part of the CEU requirements. Not sure if it will satisfy the requirements for this CEU, will look at that and others for future review.
- Per the executive order from the Governor, the certification requirements and license have been suspended. Laura Morris will confirm with Chris Andresen if this also includes those applying for recertification and who have completed their CEU's. Laura Morris will send confirmation out to the group.
- OHS had no prior knowledge of the community health worker's legislative bill change.
- Needs to be a roll-out or a reasonable timeframe for CHWs to be able to find the newly required training and participate in them.
- Concerned what mechanism DPH will use to communicate these trainings to CHWs the rules are changing.

## 8. Review and Recommendations to revisions of CHWAB Statutory Laura Morris authority

- Laura Morris discussed reviewing and revising the statutory authority of the advisory body since it is growing and evolving. Will discuss further how to expand and support the advisories statutory scope.
- These would consist of items such as CHW career pathways and pipeline including high school students, connecting with Connecticut Youth Services Bureaus within the profession and beyond to look at the development and implementation of an apprenticeship program which was originally developed under the state innovation model.
- We will look at the entire statute to determine if any additional changes to be made including membership.
- If there are other areas or fields that Community health workers are working in that should be part of this body, this would be a good opportunity. Will discuss this further at the next meeting.

### 9. Research on CHW & CHW Associations Sustainability Laura Morris

Leslie Greer, Consumer Information Representative, and Community Health Worker, along
with OHS intern Jake DeFrancesco, are researching the New England states. They are
contacting all the New England States about their Community health worker associations,
how they're currently structured and funded. Also looking at how Community health workers
outside the New England states are being funded on a more sustainable model. Some of the



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	states have Medicaid reimbursement through either an 1115 waiver or through state amendments.		
	<ul> <li>We will bring the research back to this body, so we can see what others are doing. Leslie and Jake will expand beyond New England to all the other states that have associations and are utilizing Community health workers.</li> </ul>		
	<ul> <li>We will also speak with the National Association to be a part of the conversation to come up with some real sustainability and reimbursement for Community health workers, as well as the association.</li> </ul>

They award grants for innovation and innovative workforce development.</li> <li>The career connect is focusing on rescaling and upscaling Community health workers.</li> <li>There is additional training that is forecast to be released on February 15<sup>th</sup> for Community health workers and power professional training. Laura Morris will send information to the body when it becomes available.</li> <li>The New England Community health worker collaborative is interested in seeing if the New England States that part of this funding is willing to earmark some funding in their proposals to work as a collaborative on some items.</li> <li>Review Committee Update</li> </ul>		
	<ul> <li>We have not received any new training vendor applications. Leslie Greer has been reaching out to other training vendors in the state to make sure they are aware we have this process and have them submit their applications to become approved.</li> <li>Leslie Greer has been in contact with Housatonic Community College, and they are working on submitting their application.</li> </ul>
