• An overview of policy elements including guiding principles, ethical considerations, requirements for AI systems, and Assessments, Inventory and Oversight.

The floor opened for questions. Ms. Armah provided context for the presentation, stating that AI is not presently being used in the APCD program but there is a chance in the future for it to be used. OHS has heard from stakeholders about uneasiness about AI and how it may introduce bias into the analyses and decision making that state government does. The presentation was intended to inform the members and public of measures being taken by the state in developing guardrails.

Mr. Aseltine made a comment about AI presenting an opportunity to take human bias out of the equation and certain decisions that are made, particularly around healthcare. He commented that his hope is that the AI workgroup will adopt a balanced approach in developing the guardrails. Mr. Ebeid commented about embracing AI but making sure guardrails striking a right balance are in place to ensure agencies and stakeholders are implementing it within a framework that ensures accountability and transparency.

4. Healthcare Cost Growth Benchmark Presentation Michael Bailit, Bailit Health 1:26 PM Michael Bailit provided a presentation on the CT Healthcare Cost Growth Benchmark initiative, key highlights included: A background overview of the cost growth benchmark initiative and PA 22-118. o Governor Lamont issued E.O. No 5 in 2020, later PA 22-118, creating the CT healthcare cost growth benchmark initiative. OHS must set annual cost growth benchmarks in accordance with statute. OHS worked with a stakeholder advisory group to set benchmarks for a five-year period (2021-2025). OHS also established quality benchmarks effective 2022 and primary care spending targets for 2021-2025. Mr. Bailit provided an overview of the timeline for requirements to be fulfilled by OHS and data 0 submitters in accordance with the statute, including a public hearing (recently held Jun 28) and a report submitted by OHS to the joint standing committee of the General Assembly (due Oct 15). An overview of the logic model for the cost growth benchmark. A presentation overview on how the APCD is being leveraged through data and analysis to inform findings. The analysis will be used to identify opportunities and strategies to slow cost growth and then to implement. Mr. Bailit noted this is an ongoing iterative process. An overview of the three elements that make up the measurement for performance against the benchmark, and the formula that equates to the total healthcare expenditures. There are four levels of reporting of performance against the benchmark (state, market, insurer, advanced network). An overview of the data sources for the calculations. Summary of the results for 2020 and 2021 of CT's total healthcare expenditures & total medical expense trends by market. Members asked questions. Francois De Brants initiated a discussion regarding the difference in negotiated prices and differences in trends for the fully insured versus self-insured populations. Mr. Bailit agreed and commented that it will be good if private institutions like a large university would contribute claims data to the APCD to help capture these nuances. Pat Checko inquired whether the pandemic influenced the results. Mr. Bailit commented that it did so enormously, covid impacted trend data. A discussion took place regarding the impact of covid on the data. Mr. Bailit summarized the value of the APCD, describing it as an essential tool in understanding healthcare spending, and increasingly sophisticated analyses are going to allow OHS and the public to understand what's driving spending and spending growth, and then to inform specific policy solutions to improve affordability. 5. Review and Approval of Minutes: May 11, 2023 Olga Armah, OHS 2:02 PM Ms. Armah requested a motion to approve the minutes of the May 11, 2023 meeting. A motion was made (Inskeep) and seconded (Gaul). Mr. Sajnani stated that since the last meeting, OHS conducted additional stakeholder engagement and held internal discussions to review strategic goals for the APCD and assess prioritization based on considerations such as existing resources and any dependencies. Mr. Sajnani summarized each of the seven umbrella-level strategic initiatives which are organized into two major categories: 1) data enhancements and utilization, and 2) operational enhancements.
