Agency Description:

REQUEST: The DPH Drinking Water Section (DWS) has submitted a 2016 legislative proposal for "An Act Concerning Drinking Water and Drinking Water State Revolving Fund Fees" for the purpose of funding the public drinking water program under the provisions of the Connecticut General Statutes and the Federal Safe water program starting October 2015. Acquiring the ability to collect fees is imperative to offset the current and growing costs to operate the DPH DWS do. The current and future level of federal funding annually received by the DPH DWS is not sufficient to sustain current level of activities of the states public drinking services within the DWS. Currently, the DPH DWS does not charge fees for sanitary surveys, project reviews, or DWSRF water infrastructure projects, as other states legislation will create a fee structure to support public water system sanitary surveys, project reviews, and Drinking Water State Revolving Fund (DWSRF) Program Drinking Water Act. This same proposal was submitted by DPH for consideration under the 2012- 2014 legislative sessions and did not move forward. This proposed

The number of unfulfilled requests is rising, due in part to the growing interest in genealogical research and the search for older records. The State Vital Records Office is permitted by statute to charge a fee for the issuance of a certified copy of a vital record—\$30 for a birth certificate and \$20 for marriage or death certificate. The fees only apply when a record is found and a certified copy of the record can be issued. When a record cannot be found, the Department must return the fee, meaning that the State receives no compensation for the search of the record or the time spent to prepare correspondence informing the requester of the negative search result.
