# MINUTES OF THE MEETING OF THE FINANCE ADVISORY COMMITTEE December 19, 2019

Held in Room 1E at the Legislative Office Building

Lieutenant Governor Bysiewicz called the meeting to order at 1:00 p.m.

The minutes of the June 6, 2019, meeting were adopted.

The following new transactions were considered by the committee:

<u>FAC 2020-01 for the Department of Transportation</u>. Transfer of \$1,000,000 from Personal Services to Pay As You Go Transportation Projects to provide additional contractual resources to address the statewide tree mortality issue.

Senator Osten asked the agency to address the status of refilling vacancies. Commissioner Giulietti responded that the vacancy count is decreasing, although the agency continues to experience turnover due to retirements, and that OPM is assisting DOT with approving refill of positions. The commissioner noted that lack of candidates with commercial drivers' licenses (CDLs) is one major obstacle to hiring, and that the department is considering providing the necessary training itself. Senator Osten asked whether pay is a problem, and the commissioner responded that DOT is working with DAS and OPM on that issue, which is a challenge for all agencies. Senator Osten asked about efforts to remediate the emerald ash borer beetle infestation. Commissioner Giulietti answered that there are other invasive pests beyond the emerald ash borer, and that DOT has spoken to Pennsylvania, for example, about the spotted fly making its way toward Connecticut. Senator Osten asked whether DOT is working with DEEP, which is dealing with the issue as it pertains to public forests. Commissioner Giulietti responded that DEEP is focusing on areas where the camping public and parking lots are. Secretary McCaw added that an item on the December 18, 2019, State Bond Commission agenda was approved to provide \$1 million to DEEP to address removal of damaged, decayed and distressed trees in state parks and recreations areas. Senator Osten expressed an interest in more broadly dealing with the issue in municipalities, as small towns typically have more treed areas but limited financial resources. Senator Osten inquired about grants for town roads, particularly for smaller towns, and asked the agency to consider recommendations for how to help municipalities.

Representative Walker asked whether candidates for positions requiring a CDL can be exoffenders. Commissioner Giulietti responded that he was unsure, but that he would provide an answer.

Lieutenant Governor Bysiewicz asked whether any discussions have occurred about engaging state technical high schools in the training process. Commissioner Giulietti answered that DOT has talked to the universities but will need to initiate a conversation with the tech and trade schools.

Representative Walker noted that regional workforce boards have funding for training.

The item was unanimously approved.

<u>FAC 2020-02 for the Department of Education</u>. Transfer of \$1,200,000 from the Commissioner's Network and State Charter Schools accounts to Other Expenses to support Alliance District grants in two communities and costs for students impacted by closure of a charter school.

Senator Osten asked if \$300,000 in municipal aid would be provided for Groton in FY 2021, and Secretary McCaw affirmed that it would.

Senator Osten asked whether all 135 students displaced by the closure of Trailblazer Academy in Stamford went to the Stamford public schools. State Department of Education Chief Financial Officer Kathleen Demsey responded affirmatively. Senator Osten asked if the transfer of funds covers the full cost of these student's attendance. Ms. Demsey indicated that it only covered a portion of the costs.

Representative Lavielle asked about the Commissioner's Network schools rolling off the program and Ms. Demsey indicated the department would send that information to the committee. Representative Lavielle inquired about the allocation of funding for Commissioner's Network schools in FY 2021, and Ms. Demsey indicated that information is not yet available.

Representative Walker asked if the aid provided to Groton and Thompson will be subject to minimum budget requirements. Ms. Demsey indicated it would not be subject to minimum budget requirements.

Representative Walker asked if a decision had been made to redistribute FY 2020 charter school funding from schools where students are under-enrolled to those with over-enrollment. Secretary McCaw answered that no decision has been made yet.

The item was unanimously approved.

<u>FAC 2020-03 for the Teachers' Retirement Board</u>. Transfer of \$300,000 from Retirees Health Service Cost to Other Expenses to support digitization of statutorily required member records prior to the agency's move to the State Office Building later this year.

Daniel Krupkick, Interim Deputy Treasurer, asked whether the board was informed about the source of funds for this transfer. Secretary McCaw noted that the source is a result of a natural lapse in the Retiree Health account, and noted further that OPM is working hard to move agencies out of leased space and the agency intends to use the funds to digitize member records and decrease storage space. Hellen Sullivan, the TRB Administrator, explained that the board entrusts the administrator to run the daily operations of the agency. Mr. Krupnick asked whether this source funds OPEB costs. Both Secretary McCaw and Ms. Sullivan stated no.

The item was unanimously approved.

The meeting was adjourned at 1:26 p.m.

#### **MEMORANDUM**

Re: Finance Advisory Committee: transfer of funds within DAS

The Department of Administrative Services is requesting a transfer of \$2,400,000 from its Personal Services account and \$900,000 from its Rents & Moving account to cover a \$2,400,000 shortfall in the State Insurance & Risk Management Board ("SIRMB") account and a \$900,000 shortfall in the Workers' Compensation Claims account.

SIRMB was consolidated into the Department of Administrative Services in 2009 but by statute it retains its own independent decision making authority. For FY 2020, General Fund appropriations for SIRMB operations total \$12,924,070.

These monies pay for premiums associated with policies purchased by the State to insure against losses; for claims and judgments issued against the State for losses that occur within our self-insured deductible amounts; and for payment of our insurance broker and Third Party Administrator, which is responsible for managing the state's liability claims. SIRMB is a pay-as-you-go operation that is not permitted to maintain reserves.

The Fleet Liability insurance policy for the State insures approximately 12,000 vehicles and is written subject to a \$4 million per-occurrence self-insured retention. SIRMB pays for all fleet claims within the \$4 million self-insured retention out of its allocated fleet claims budget.

This fiscal year, several large fleet liability claim settlements fell outside of the Board's standard projections and these large claims resulted in this anticipated overall \$2.4 million deficiency in the SIRMB account.

Similarly, the Workers' Compensation Claims shortfall is another account which is based on projected/estimated claims costs and this year's higher costs are the result of several factors including: rising costs of healthcare, orthopedic surgery, physical therapy, hospital outpatient care, and cost of living adjustments.

If approved by the Finance Advisory Committee, DAS will cover the two shortfalls noted above by transferring \$2,400,000 from Personal Services and \$900,000 from Rents

& Moving. The funding from Personal Services is available as the result of delays in filling vacancies within DAS. Although DAS' FY 2020 budget reflects the expectation that the vacancies would have been filled in this fiscal year, the practical reality is the vacancies won't be filled until early FY 2021. The Rents & Moving funds are available as a result of vacating the property at 55 Elm Street in Hartford.

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#### Division of Criminal Justice FAC Transfer Request 2020-3 (addendum to B-107)

This FAC Proposal seeks to transfer \$325,000 from Personal Services to the Other Expenses, Medicaid Fraud Control Unit, and Witness Protection accounts

**Funding is available in Personal Services** due to retirements, turnover, delays in filling positions (especially prosecutor positions which require action by the Criminal Justice Commission). Delays are also due to the time required to backfill senior level positions through internal promotion process and external hiring process.

#### Funding is required in each of the following accounts:

- Other Expenses Repairs and maintenance costs are required related to:
  - Minor premises repairs and upgrades;
  - Installation of a new security system at Central Office as part of the replacement of the parking lot;
  - o Software costs were slightly higher than anticipated; and
  - o Training/Consultant costs as well as extradition costs were trending higher than budgeted.
- Medicaid Fraud Control Unit The Federal Department of Health and Human Services ('HHS') has
  approved funding for thirteen positions for the CT-MFCU Unit. On the State DCJ side the MFCU Unit was
  short some appropriations for 13 FTE's during the current Fiscal Year. DCJ has filled all 13 positions, and
  vacancies were filled with transfers into the unit, whose salaries exceeded projected/budgeted dollar
  amounts.

As background, the CT-MFCU Unit is reimbursed by HHS for 75% of its Operating Expenses (Personal Services, Fringes, and Other Expenses) as well as an Indirect Overhead Rate of 19.1% of Personal Services. The Reimbursements are deposited into the State's General Fund.

Witness Protection - Witness Protection utilization varies from year to year based on the number of trials
and types of trials during the year. Utilization of this program during FY20 has been higher than expected.

### DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH FINANCIAL ADVISORY COMMITTEE APRIL 2020 DESCRIPTION OF REQUESTED TRANSFERS

The Department of Public Health is requesting a transfer of \$618,984 from the Personal Services account to meet projected budget deficits in the Other Expenses and Local and District Departments of Health accounts for fiscal year 2020.

#### Personal Services (10010)

\$618,984

The Personal Services account is projected to experience cost savings due to delays in refilling vacant positions.

#### Other Expenses (10020)

\$542,474

The Other Expenses account is projected to experience a shortfall of \$542,747 due to greater than budgeted and unanticipated costs. DPH has assumed unplanned costs to support Census outreach activities (\$50,000), consultant services to support the department's accreditation efforts (\$148,858), and laboratory costs carried over from the prior fiscal year associated with fire remediation and other needed property maintenance services (\$343,616).

The consultant costs were assumed by DPH when available federal funds expired on January 30, 2020. The consultants' work involves the department's Public Health Accreditation Board (PHAB) activities, and the development and implementation of the Connecticut State Health Assessment (SHA) and the Connecticut State Health Improvement Plan (SHIP).

Costs associated with maintaining the Public Health Laboratory increased significantly at the end of FY 2019, exceeding projections due to emergency repairs to respond to fuel tank water intrusion, cooling system failures, electrical systems replacement, fire remediation and emergency cleanup, as well as information technology infrastructure upgrades for specialized instrumentation. Payment of these costs was unable to be made before the fiscal year end. These costs are not recurring.

#### **Local and District Departments of Health (17009)**

\$76,510

An anticipated funding shortfall of \$76,510 in the Local & District Departments of Health account will occur from the expected joining of the Town of Easton with the Westport/Weston Health District (WWHD) before the end of the current fiscal year. Currently, the WWHD does not receive per capita funding because the District does not meet the eligibility requirements set forth in CGS Section 19a-245. To be eligible for a grant, a health district must serve towns having a combined population of 50,000 or more, or serve three or more municipalities. These thresholds will be met when the Town of Easton joins the WWHD.

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#### PROPOSED ITEMS FOR APPROVAL BY THE FINANCE ADVISORY COMMITTEE April 2020

The Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services requests approval of transfers totaling \$1.5 million to cover projected shortfalls in two accounts:

- \$1,250,000 in the General Assistance Managed Care account (SID 12220), and
- \$250,000 in the Discharge and Diversion account (SID 12330).

The shortfall in General Assistance Managed Care account results from the following factors:

- A general overall increase in expenditures resulting from the opioid epidemic which was exacerbated by reduced funding of \$1.5 million in the FY 2020 appropriation to reflect FY 2019 expenditure trends;
- The FY 2020 holdback of \$140,000 for contract savings;
- Higher than anticipated claims payments in substance abuse residential services, in part due to a rate increase for a nonprofit provider so it can meet Department of Public Health staffing requirements;
- Higher than anticipated claims expenditures for mental health inpatient services not reimbursable under Medicaid: and
- Increased expenditures for basic needs including additional sober house recovery services.

The shortfall in the Discharge and Diversion account results from additional community placements for individuals who no longer meet hospital level of care including the establishment of a six-bed congregate living site for clients.

The anticipated lapse in Personal Services (SID 10010) of \$1.5 million will offset the shortfalls detailed above. This lapse is due to staff vacancies and delays and difficulties recruiting for licensed positions.

#### Finance Advisory Committee - Meeting April 2020

The Department of Transportation (Department) requests the transfer of funds between its appropriations as detailed below, to mitigate shortfalls in several accounts. Significant savings in Personal Services will enable the Department to address some, but not all of the projected operational deficits.

Funds are available in the **Personal Services** appropriation due to budget savings from delays in the refill of vacant positions, and below average winter overtime.

Funds are available in the **ADA Para-transit Program** due to favorable actuals-to-budget through February, combined with an expected reduction in operational expenditures due to the COVID-19 crisis.

The transfer to **Bus Operations** is required to cover a shortfall of \$4.36 million primarily due to lower than budgeted revenues and higher than budgeted expenses, affecting both the CT Transit services (\$1.48 million) and the private carrier fixed route and express bus services (\$1.38 million); and higher than budgeted operating and maintenance expenses related to the new Waterbury Bus Garage (\$1.5 million).

The transfer to **Rail Operations** is required to mitigate an operational shortfall driven by the following factors:

- Metro North Railroad (MNR) labor contract settlements (reached in 2019) and associated retroactive wage adjustments (\$8.9 million);
- CTDOT's share of higher-than-budgeted MTA information technology and other expenses for the New Haven Line (NHL), due to MNR budget underestimation of 2019 costs (\$5 million);
- Final equipment repair costs associated with the 2013 NHL Bridgeport derailment, paid in 2019 (\$1.3 million);
- Reversal of a PRIIA credit erroneously duplicated by Metro North in FY 2019 (\$4.7 million);
- Higher-than-budgeted Maintenance of Equipment and Maintenance of Way materials and supplies, primarily related to MNR's error that accounted for the end of the Kawasaki lease term incorrectly (\$1.2 million);
- Higher-than-budgeted Common Area costs due to increased maintenance (including Smart Track CP 106-109) (\$.5 million).

A transfer of \$2.0 million to the **Pay-as-you-go Transportation Projects** appropriation (PAYGO) is necessary to fund additional unbudgeted emergency efforts to continue to combat the extraordinary statewide tree mortality issue. This transfer will enable the commitment of additional funds, so that specialized tree contractors can continue to work on this matter, and take advantage of lower traffic volume during the COVID-19 crisis.

Funds are being transferred to the HUSKY B Program and State Administered General Assistance accounts to meet year-end requirements. Funds are being transferred from the Connecticut Home Care Program and the Temporary Family Assistance accounts to support these requirements.

#### **HUSKY B**

Funds are being transferred to the HUSKY B Program state share account to meet yearend needs. The department is currently projecting that up to \$1.0 million may be needed in this account to meet anticipated expenses through the end of this year. The program has experienced higher cost trends than had been budgeted, resulting in a deficiency.

The SFY 2020 appropriation assumed an average gross total monthly expenditure amount of \$3.58 million in the HUSKY B Program. Through February, caseloads have averaged 20,324 with an average total gross monthly expenditure of \$3.9 million. Gross service costs in the program have exceeded the levels projected in the appropriation. The higher than projected service costs have driven monthly expenditures up by approximately \$295,000 per month of which approximately 23.5% represents the state share of the expense. The increase in service costs has driven the need for an additional \$1.0 million in the HUSKY B state share account.

### **State Administered General Assistance (SAGA)**

Funds are being transferred to the State Administered General Assistance account to meet year-end needs. The department is currently projecting that up to \$1.2 million may be needed in this account to meet anticipated expenses through the end of this year. The program has experienced higher cost trends than had been budgeted, resulting in a deficiency.

The SFY 2020 appropriation assumed a continuation of caseload decreases in SFY 2020 based on historical trends. The SAGA caseloads decreased by 16% in SFY 2018 and 6.8% in SFY 2019. The appropriation assumed average caseloads of 6,369 with an

average total monthly expenditure amount of \$1.51 million. Through February, caseloads have averaged 6,566 with an average total monthly expenditure of \$1.6 million. The higher than projected caseloads have driven monthly expenditures up by approximately \$85,000 per month, leading to the estimated need of an additional \$1.2 million in the SAGA account.

#### **Transfer Sources**

#### **CT Home Care Program**

Funds in the amount of \$1.0 million are available for transfer from the CT Home Care Program account. The department is projecting a surplus in the account as a result of a downward trend in the average cost per month of approximately \$140,000 from the SFY 2020 appropriated levels.

### **Temporary Family Assistance -TANF**

Funds in the amount of \$1.2 million are available for transfer from the Temporary Family Assistance - TANF account. The department is projecting a surplus in the account as a result of a downward trend in the average cost per month of approximately \$300,000 per month from the SFY 2020 appropriated levels. This decrease is largely driven by a continued decline in caseloads.

Transfer Request for Fiscal Year 2020 April 9, 2020

#### Request

Early Head Start Child Care Partnership – Early Head Start (EHS) is funded directly by the U.S. Department of HHS to provide year-round comprehensive child and family services to low-income pregnant women and families with children birth to 3 years old. EHS settings include center-based, family child care and home-based (home visiting). The OEC provides state funds to support children in the three federally funded EHS-CC Grant Partnership Programs whose families are not eligible for the Care4Kids subsidy program.

A transfer of \$280,000 is needed to cover expenses projected until the end of FY20.

*Smart Start* - The Smart Start Program reimburses local and regional boards of education for operating expenses related to establishing or expanding a preschool program under the jurisdiction of the board of education for the town.

This transfer of \$30,000 to Smart Start is needed to fund local and regional boards of education who have received funds as a grant and expended for Early Childhood classrooms. The funds were allocated to regions in beginning of FY20 and need to be replenished in OEC Budget.

#### Transfers From:

(\$310,000) <u>Childcare Quality Enhancement</u> – QE (16158): This account is projected to have a surplus due to an RFP awardee that is no longer able to conduct the work.

Subject: Finance Advisory Committee Request

The Department of Correction is requesting approval to transfer funds from various accounts to cover the anticipated operational needs of the Agency for the remainder of the current fiscal year.

The Agency requests a transfer of \$3,927,656 into the Other Expenses account, \$15,100,000 into the Inmate Medical Services account and \$1,000,000 into the Worker's Compensation account.

The transfer of funds into the Other Expenses account is required as a result of various factors including the increased cost of energy and escalating maintenance costs required to maintain aging physical structures and internal systems (HVAC/Security/Smoke/Electrical/Plumbing/Fence alarms, etc.) required to maintain safety and security for both our staff and the confined population. The DOC received less in its FY 20 appropriation for Other Expenses than it expended in this account in FY 19. To date, expenditures are trending similarly to FY 19 levels.

Additionally, the Office of Policy and Management carried forward \$627,656 in FY 19 lapsing funds from the Bureau of Pardons and Paroles (BOPP) for use by the DOC in offsetting a portion of the differential between what DOC expended in Other Expenses in FY 19 versus what it received in its FY 20 appropriation for Other Expenses. As stated above, DOC received less in its FY 20 appropriation for Other Expenses than it expended in that account in FY 19. The transfer of these funds from the BOPP account into the Other Expenses account is included in this request.

The requested transfer of \$15,100,000 into the Inmate Medical Services account is requested to cover a projected shortfall largely due to pharmaceutical utilization trending higher than compared to last fiscal year and by the cost to deliver basic medical care to the inmates under the custody of the agency. While the agency has transitioned its pharmacy provider, costs of pharmaceuticals have declined but are offset by increased utilization. Additionally, overtime costs for medical staff are up compared to last fiscal year as the agency works to achieve appropriate staffing levels.

The requested transfer of \$1,000,000 into the "Worker's Compensation" account is requested to cover a projected shortfall due to one-time and holdover expenses from the previous fiscal year that occurred at the beginning of this fiscal year as well as higher than anticipated costs this fiscal year.

#### **DESCRIPTION OF REQUESTED CHANGES**

The Department of Children and Families requests approval to transfer a total of \$4,180,000 from the following accounts:

Workers' Compensation Claims - \$980,000 - Funds are available due to a continuing decline in new claims resulting from the closure of the Connecticut Juvenile Training School.

Differential Response System - \$775,000 - Funds are available due to the delayed start of new Enhanced Care Coordination programming.

Community Based Prevention Programs - \$200,000 - Funds are available due to one-time cost underruns related to contractual services.

Community Kidcare - \$2,225,000 - Funds are available due to one-time cost underruns related to contractual services and other monies remaining unobligated.

#### The transfer of funding in the same aggregate amount is requested to the following accounts:

Other Expenses - \$500,000 - This funding is required to meet the increased security costs across the agency's offices.

No Nexus Special Education - \$775,000 - This account supports the provision of special education for children on the DCF caseload who reside in private residential institutions and for whom no board of education is responsible under the law. The funding is needed to due to an increased number of children having "no-nexus" status and more specialized education services as required by the children's Individual Education Plans (IEPs).

Board and Care for Children - Adoption - \$680,000 - This account supports the needs of children in subsidized adoptive and guardianship homes. The funding is required to support expenses resulting from service enhancements leading to permanency for children.

Board and Care for Children - Foster - \$2,225,000 - This account supports the needs of children in foster care. This funding is needed due to delays in implementing a centralized transportation system and revising evaluation protocols.

I am writing in accordance with C.G.S. 4-87 to request a transfer of funds between specific appropriations in order to meet necessary expenditures.

#### **Workers' Compensation**

The Judicial Branch was appropriated \$6,042,106 for Workers' Compensation Claims (SID 12235). Projected expenditures through June 30, 2020 result in a \$1.1 million deficit that is due to primarily the ongoing impact of the transfer of responsibility for all juvenile justice delinquency matters to the Branch in 2018. The detention centers have adjusted to this new volume of work. However, this increased volume has translated to an increase number of claims because centers now serve more youth, including the post-adjudicated population with longer periods of secure confinement and generally more complex behavioral and mental health needs. The Judicial Branch's appropriation for Worker's Compensation has remained level funded and, thus, there is a need to transfer funds. In addition to increased claims, \$362,942 was paid so far this fiscal year to honor negotiated settlement agreements.

To eliminate this deficit it is requested that \$ 1,128,661 be transferred from the Personal Services appropriation (SID 10010) to the workers' compensation appropriation (SID 12235).

I have enclosed the necessary form to process this budget adjustment request through the Finance Advisory Committee. I appreciate your assistance with this matter.
