# BACKGROUND

- DPDS had been approached several times, by Administrations of both Govs. Malloy and Lamont, regarding representing individuals in parole revocation proceedings.
- Activity not specified in our enabling statute and we had no funding for additional staff.
- Section 3 of Public Act 19-59 created a pilot program for the DPDS to provide representation to individuals accused of violating conditions of parole who cannot afford an attorney.
- Approximately \$250,000 allocated to provide representation to as many individuals as possible with the funding.

# STAFFING

- 2 experienced attorneys
- Secretary
- Social Worker
- Located within the office space for PD Legal Services Unit in Waterbury

# PRELIMINARY ORGANIZATIONAL ACTIVITY

- Developed protocols for PD field offices to make referrals to PRU from new arrest.
- Worked with BOPP and PCS to create process for notice to parolees and eligibility applications.
- Addressed hearing schedule issues and access to DOC counselors
- Developed social worker's responsibilities
- Developed administrative assistant's duties
- First client intake occurred on September 17, 2019.
- Drafted form letters and notices to be sent to new clients.
- Met with BOPP regularly regarding certain aspects of the parole revocation process that might be improved through PRU's existence.

## OUTCOMES

### **Disposition Details**

- 377 cases have been disposed
- 40 of our disposed cases involve the same clients (repeat violations)
- 186 cases are pending currently
- 348 preliminary hearings
  - 43 of these cases resulted in findings of "no probable cause"
- 256 final revocation hearings
  - 4 of these cases resulted in no findings of violations (failure to show a violation by a preponderance of the evidence)
- 200 BOPP final review hearings

#### **Sanction Details**

Reinstate immediately: 4 at final revocation

43 at preliminary hearing

No reinstatement: 3

Supplemental hearing: 3

Three month of less sanction: 30

Three to six month sanction: 82

#### Sanction Details (continued)

• Six month to one year sanction: 68

More than one year sanction: 19

#### OTHER DISPOSTIONS

TOPP referrals: 2

Reimprisonment warrant withdrawals: 38\*

Parole automatically revoked: 7

Discharge off sentence: 39

<sup>\*</sup>PCS will request that the BOPP withdraw the reimprisonment warrant when an inmate with pending criminal or motor vehicle charges is granted a diversionary program.

# CHALLENGES

- PD field office compliance with protocols
- Ongoing difficulty scheduling legal phone calls with clients in DOC custody.
- Delayed scheduling of final revocation hearings for clients with pending out of state charges.
- Parole officer addendum submission delays.
