

Bail Services

- In 2003 the Judicial Branch's CSSD initiated a multi-year project to develop a more systematic and consistent bail determination process ultimately resulting in:
 - Increased number of defendant's released on non-financial bonds
 - Increased use of the service provider network
 - A decrease in the number of failures to appear
 - More consistent and equitable financial bond recommendations
- Three significant developments resulted from this project
 - 2003 Validation of the Case Data Record
 - 2005 Bail Decision Aid
 - 2008 Financial Bond Guideline

- Case Data Record Validation Process
 - In 2003, CSSD contracted with CCSU to validate the weighted release criteria to ensure that bail staff places greater emphasis on the factors related to appearance in Court.
 - Criteria such as number of dependants, other family in CT, time at current address and student status were eliminated and criteria such as marital status, references and charge severity were weighted differently.
 - Based upon recommendations by CCSU the weighted release criteria was modified and pilot findings showed:
 - Bail staff were more likely to order or recommend non-financial releases (66% vs 52%)
 - Fewer individuals released on non-financial bonds failed to appear (20% vs 10%)
 - In 2004 the revised weighted release criteria was implemented statewide.

- Case Data Record Decision Aid
 - In 2005 CSSD contracted with CCSU to:
 - ✓ Review our pre-trial release decision making process and develop a system whereby more non-financial release recommendations are made in cases where lower surety bonds would have been recommended.
 - This project resulted in the creation of the Bail Decision Aid which assists bail staff in obtaining additional information in the following areas:
 - ✓ Personal Needs (substance use, education, employment)
 - ✓ Compliance Needs (support & structure, prior compliance)
 - ✓ Safety Risk (prior record)

Decision Aid – Pilot Study

- Decision Aid was associated with:
 - A greater likelihood of recommending a non-financial condition of release (56% vs 20%)
 - A greater likelihood of recommending a condition (64% vs 21%)
 - A higher percentage of recommendations that matched the judge's order (65% vs 49%)
 - A lower failure to appear rate (12% vs 17%)
- In 2005 the Bail Decision Aid was implemented statewide

- Guidelines for Financial Bond Recommendations:
 - Prior to September of this year CSSD did not deploy a statewide structured method for determining financial bond amounts / recommendations.
 - In 2008 CSSD contracted with CCSU to review our financial bond determination process.
 - Over 50,000 financial bond records from 2006-2007 data were analyzed, resulting in the development of a financial bond guideline.
 - The Financial Bond Guideline considers the offense characteristics, mitigating or aggravating case factors and client risk to guide bail staff in recommending a financial bond amount.
 - In September 2009 the Financial Bond Guideline was implemented statewide.
