# **OPM - Criminal Justice Policy & Planning Division** Monthly Indicators Report

#### **Highlights**

- CT prisons and jails held 15,161 prisoners on August 1, 2016. A year ago, there were 16,156 people incarcerated in the state, an annual decline of 6.2%
- The prison population shrank by 182 inmates during July. The sentenced population declined by 111 prisoners during the month. The number of pre-trial detainees fell by 75 (see table 2).
- · Staff with CSSD's Jail Re-interview Program (JRI), conducted 47% fewer prisoner interviews in July than they did in June. JRI releases were down 25% compared to the previous month. This comes in the wake of layoffs at the Judicial Branch forcing some JRI staff to be reassigned to other tasks.
- · Admissions to prison during July were down 16% compare to a year ago. Sentenced admits were down 17%, pre-trial admits were down 15% (see table 3). Although total remands to prison were down by 11%, special parole remands were up 16% from July 2015 and up 55% from June 2016.
- The number of new parole hearings has held constant, at 164, for the last three months. The parole approval rate has ranged from 55% to 60%. Parole grants since May have exceeded last year's level in each of the last three months (see table 4).
- The number of offenders on special parole status continues to grow, unabated. During the last year, the number of special parolees occupying slots in the DOC's limited, residential-bed network was up by 42%, from 191 to 271. Offenders in Community Release slots declined by 29%, from 613 to 435, during the same period (see table 3).

# **Prison Population Forecast**

On August 1, the inmate count was down by almost 1,000 prisoners compared to the last year's figure. As a result, OPM's forecast is now off by 452 prisoners – in other words – the projection is off by the size of a

small prison. Despite the mood of our forecaster, this is very good news.

Producing accurate forecasts, over the long term, depends on several factors including 1) a reliable system model 2) limited system volatility 3) accurate and timely operational data, and 4) the ability to adapt and recalibrate the forecast model to account for change.


If history is a guide, the loss of 1,000 prisoners, during a single 12-month period, is far from typical. The last time we saw such a drop was after the

implementation of RREC in 2011. In this instance, sentenced prisoners accounted for 82% of the entire drop. While legislative changes, like raisethe-age, decriminalization of small amounts of marijuana and the reduction of drug possession from a 7-year felony to a 1-year misdemeanor, will inevitably reduce the prison population, it is difficult to quantify the exact the impact on the system, or how quickly the impact will be observed. .

Better efficiency at BOPP, measured by 1) the number of hearings, and 2) increasing parole caseloads, has clearly contributed to this fall-off in the number of sentenced prisoners. So too has centralization of the process for reviewing and approving discretionary prisoner releases. From its inception last year, the Community Release Unit (CRU) has introduced consistency and accountability to a once-murky and somewhat disjointed effort. Recent positive trends for both community supervision caseloads and sentenced-prisoner counts are tightly aligned with Commissioner Semple's decision to create CRU in early 2015.

### Chart 2 - Criminal justice, monthly counts and flows




On August 1, the state's prisons held 15,161 inmates, 995 fewer than they did a year ago. The scale of this year-long population decline was not anticipated by OPM, and the causes have not been definitively established. Shifts, of this magnitude are generally associated with large policy or legislative changes that affect the flow of offenders either into, or out of, the DOC. The last time we observed such a rapid and sustained drop in the prison population was in the months following the implementation of RREC in 2011 and 2012.

The data indicates that 94% of this past year's drop can be accounted for by a 6.7% decline the in number of sentenced prisoners and a 21.3% reduction in the number of special parole

remandees. The number of federal and pre-trial prisoners remained, essentially, flat.

OPM has watched recent declines in the number of sentenced prisoners with great interest. The creation of a Community Release Unit combined and a muchimproved reporting capability supplied by the DOC MIS Division, has introduced transparency to the case review and approval process that was once confounding opaque and dispersed. Until the last year, it was impossible to determine just how many prisoners were eligible for release, and how many actually had their cases reviewed. OPM is now confident that cases of release-eligible offenders are being reviewed quickly and efficiently. The cumulative impact of this improved efficiency is a falling count.

First week of the month, and ADC




Chart 4 – Prison population, first-of-month 2014, 2015 and 2016





Chart 5 – Statewide criminal arrests 2015 and 2016

June 2015 through July 2016




Chart 7– Remands from community release

July 2016





Chart 8 – DOC community supervision July 1, 2015 through August 1, 2016
