	<p>ASD Supportive Housing Pilot Update</p> <p>Tara explains that the pilot project, which aims to provide supportive housing for people on the autism spectrum, has faced roadblocks including the loss of housing vouchers due to department cuts. OPM is committed to moving forward by reallocating some of the service dollars from the budget to fund the vouchers, though this means the program will need to be picked up by the general fund sooner than anticipated. The project was originally planned for 15 housing vouchers with housing-specific case management, but they may need to scale back depending on budget constraints, with more details will be provided at the September council meeting.</p>	
3.	<b>Housing Legislation</b>	<b>Stephen &amp; Lois</b>
	Nothing specific to autism has been proposed in the housing legislation	
4.	<b>Community Membership &amp; Engagement</b>	<b>Stephen &amp; Lois</b>
	<p>The Housing Subcommittee discussed their research on housing models for the autism community, noting that Connecticut lags behind other states in this area. Stephen mentions they need more committee members and community involvement, with Tara confirming that community members can participate in subcommittees and offers to connect interested individuals to the subcommittee chairs. Tara advises the committee to consider different approaches for their housing initiative, such as creating a nonprofit like Virginia's model or seeking appropriations for residential support in the autism waiver and mentions that housing needs will be included in the recently approved autism needs assessment.</p>	

<b>5.</b>	<b>New Business</b>	<b>Stephen &amp; Lois</b>
	The committee discusses the need for a follow-up meeting with more members present to plan their lobbying strategy, with Stephen agreeing to send around potential dates. They also identify the importance of including self-advocates with autism on the committee, particularly those who have successfully navigated independent living situations. Jennifer mentions a parent who has created a successful housing arrangement for her son with autism, and Tobey suggests learning from special needs trust administration examples. The committee plans to meet monthly or bi-monthly moving forward.
