

# **Environmental Justice Rulemaking Presentation to NRZ Advisory Board**

- Connecticut passed Public Act 23-202, which updated Connecticut's existing **environmental justice law** (Conn. Gen. Stat. § 22a-20a).
- DEEP is required to write and adopt regulations about cumulative impacts of affecting facilities in environmental justice neighborhoods.
- For the first time, DEEP will be able to place conditions on permits, or deny permits, because of the cumulative impact of a new facility or new permit on an EJ community.

## **Environmental Justice Communities**

- census block groups, for which 30% or more of the population consists of <u>low-income</u> persons who are not institutionalized and have an income below 200% of the federal poverty level
- <u>distressed municipalities</u> defined by the CT Department of Economic and Community Development

### **Affecting Facilities**

- electric generating facilities
- sludge or solid waste incinerators or combustors
- sewage treatment plants
- solid waste intermediate processing facilities
- recycling facilities
- landfills
- medical waste incinerators
- major sources of air pollution
