# Your Child's Right to Read Checklist



Every Connecticut student has the right to read at or above grade level independently and proficiently by the end of third grade.

### DID YOU KNOW?

Being able to read opens a universe of opportunities. Reading well improves a child's confidence, focus, and academic success.

Starting July 1, 2025, all Connecticut schools and districts will be teaching in a way that is backed by decades of scientific research so that your child is more likely to become a strong, skilled reader.

## What should I see in my child's kindergarten through grade 3 classroom?

#### Some things you should see:

- Students using Connecticutapproved reading curriculum models or programs to help them learn grade level skills
- Students being assessed three times a year using a Connecticut approved K-3 Universal Screen Reading Assessment to regularly track their progress
- High-quality text for students to practice their reading

#### Some things you should ask:

- What reading curriculum model or programs do you use?
- How often are my child's reading skills assessed on reading?
- How is reading progress communicated to families?
- What support is available for children who are not reading on grade level?
- What resources are available for families to support reading at home?

#### What are some ways I can support my child at home?

#### Read, Talk, Play

Each day spend time reading, talking, and playing with your child.

#### **Stay Informed**

Keep in touch with your child's school about how they are teaching reading, testing reading, and supporting families as partners.

#### **Get Involved**

Participate in school, district, and community activities and workshops focused on reading.





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
