## FY 2017-18 Adult Education State Grant Statement of Expenditure Report

The FY 2017-18 Statement of Expenditure Report (ED-141) for the Adult Education State Grant was due to the Division of Finance and Internal Operations on September 4, 2018. The ED-141 is required for every school district that received adult education state funds whether as a provider, cooperator or cooperating eligible entity (CEE). The ED-141 is an electronic submission and is completed by each district's business office. The ED-141 should reflect those line item expenditure amounts requested in the Adult Education State Grant Revision forms (ED-245 and ED-245A). If you have questions regarding the ED-141, please check with your business office. These expenditure reports are used to calculate the Prior Year Adjustment (PYA) that is added to or deducted from the May payment.

### **FY 2018-19 Adult Education State Grant**

Due to the State Adult Education Grant's statutory nature, the CSDE distributed an August payment to districts whose Adult Education State Grant award is at least \$1,500. The August payment represents two-thirds of the state grant award. The state grant entitlement is calculated based upon the estimated expenditures reported in the Adult Education Grant Application Form ED-244 and the Supplemental Grant Application Form ED-244A. The cap is calculated on the funding of the adult education state grant funds relative to the submitted budgets. The FY18 cap is approximately 7.98% at this time.

### Federal Program Enhancement Project (PEP) Grants

The FY 2018 PEP End of Year Report was due to the Bureau of Health/Nutrition, Family Services and Adult Education on or before **August 1, 2018**. Thank you for your timely submissions. The new PEP grant awards will be released during the month of September. Due to the limits of our federal Title II grant, all Integrated English Language/Civics Education (IELCE) grants had to be reduced to \$37,000. All Workforce Readiness and Transitions to Postsecondary grants were reduced by \$4000 each. When grants are fully processed, CSDE will notify all recipients.

### National External Diploma Program (NEDP)

A revised 2018-19 NEDP Site Agreement was sent to adult education directors on September 6th with the invitation to the annual NEDP meeting for directors. The NEDP lead advisor/assessor should attend with the program director. This meeting is required for program directors and will be held on Wednesday, October 31, 2018 at 1:00 at the Meriden Public Library in Meriden. Please RSVP to Susan Pierson (susan.pierson@ct.gov) by October 26.

The three day NEDP New Advisor/Assessor Training will be held on three consecutive Fridays, November 30th, December 7<sup>th</sup>, and 14<sup>th</sup> at Naugatuck Adult Education. Snow date is January 4<sup>th</sup>. There is a \$200 fee for this training. More details will be announced at the Policy Forum. Additional NEDP training sessions

#### **GED Enhancements**

Although GED test content and item types will remain unchanged in 2019, the format of the Reasoning through Language Arts (RLA) Extended Response (ER) item will be enhanced next year. Some changes include:

- enlarging the ER response box;
- enhancing the instructions; and
- removing the tabs from the stimulus material.

## GED Prep Connect<sup>TM</sup>

GEDPrep Connect<sup>™</sup> is a tool designed to build stronger connections between students and local adult education programs. When a student creates an account, they can search for and select a program in their area, and the selected program will be notified of the student's interest.

Adult Education Programs all have access to data about active students and students interested in enrolling in your program and are now able to connect more easily with testers and manage their progression through the GED® program. GEDPrep Connect<sup>TM</sup> is able to identify additional information such as candidate testing results, GED Ready scores, if potential candidates would like to be contacted, etc. This is a great resource to guide instruction for teachers and as a recruitment tool for administrators.

Please ensure that at least one person from your program is using this valuable tool.

### **Professional Development**

## **CSDE** Vendor for Adult Education Professional Development

The CSDE now contracts with one Regional Education Service Center (RESC), EdAdvance, to provide the delivery of training crucial to adult education staff. As our federal adult education funds support this initiative, training will continue to be offered at no cost or minimal cost to local adult education staff. Some key staff from the Capitol Region Education Council (CREC) are still providing training under an agreement with EdAdvance. More information on registration will be included in a collaborative training and development calendar.

## College and Career Readiness (CCR) Standards

The GED® tests and the NEDP assessment have been aligned with the College and Career Readiness Standards. All of Connecticut's adult education programs are required to adopt these standards and integrate them into curriculum and classroom instruction. Training for all programs will continue to be delivered during this year. The 100 series of training sessions will be offered on a limited basis to accommodate any new teachers. The 200 series for lead teachers focuses on resource alignment and lesson development. Each program needs to send one or two lead teachers to the 200 series training. We look forward to working with our coaches to review our implementation plan this year.

### **Teacher Evaluation**

Training will continue this fall on the introduction series for evaluation (Adopting Evaluation & Effective Feedback). Participants should take BOTH sessions to get a completion certificate and materials to introduce the evaluation plan to their staff. Additional training on communicating about evaluation to staff, using the rubric and coaching will be offered this year.

Programs are reminded that the choice is to utilize the district's <u>CSDE-approved evaluation plan</u> (based on SEED) or the Adult Education Evaluation Plan. The Adult Education Evaluation Plan was developed and published by the Connecticut State Department of Education Talent Office in 2014 and is adapted to meet the unique needs of Adult Education programs. If your program is using an altered version, that plan MUST be approved at a Board of Education meeting and on file with the CSDE. The original hardcopy must be accompanied by the Board minute showing that approval. Plans should be submitted in both paper and electronic versions to Marcy Reed.

### **Credit Diploma Program**

The CSDE and the CDP Advisory Committee have been reviewing and revising the Adult High School Credit Diploma Program (AHSCDP) Administrative Manual. We will notify you when the manual is final and available on the CSDE website. There will be a meeting for school counselor personnel from all providers with CDP programs to review the manual as well as the expectations for each counselor's role in AHSCDP. The date and location will be provided as soon as that is available.

### **Adult Education Career Pathways Project**

The Career Pathways Task Force has continued to meet and plan in order to assist programs in promoting Career Pathways in adult education. The Task Force is currently developing a presentation that can be used by programs during in-house professional development or other meetings to provide information regarding Career Pathways to teachers.

The Task Force has compiled a set of materials, activities and links which are hosted on a Google Site. ### **Connecticut Adult Virtual High School (CTAVHS)**

The CT AVHS program has curricula updates:

- Accuplacer Prep courses are available now as Year Round courses for 2018-19. Similar to the GED Preparatory courses, each LEA has been assigned their own Accuplacer Prep course.
- A new course has been added to the catalog: **Allied Health** for (Terms 1 and 3). Allied Health is designed to provide students with an overview of the healthcare system, health professions, introduction to general anatomy and physiology, and medical terminology.

### **STAR: STudent Achievement in Reading**

The STudent Achievement in Reading (STAR) initiative for the training of teachers on evidence-based reading instruction is one of the longest-running investments by OCTAE, having been continuously funded since 2001 and now being implemented in 21 states. The STAR initiative for the training of teachers on evidence-based reading instruction is one of the longest-running investments by OCTAE, having been continuously funded since 2001 and now being implemented in 21 states. Research shows how this intervention has had a positive impact on student outcomes as well as spurred supportive programmatic changes.

STAR instruction is designed for the reader who is at a grade 5 level, which corresponds to a CASAS score between 210 and 230, or ABE. Although the target population is ABE, students with reading scores in that range may be participating in CDP or other programs. The STAR instruction model is beneficial for students reading at lower levels, and is a proven set of strategies for raising student performance.

Connecticut is a STAR partner state. Although STAR was introduced several years ago, it has been set aside while the CSDE focused on other systemic initiatives. This August, Marcy Reed (serving as state lead) and two ATDN trainers (Aileen Halloran and Kristin Berenson) attended a STAR convening in Washington DC in the OCTAE offices. Planning will be ongoing throughout this year with planned training sessions for a select Pilot group to begin in 2019. We will continue to provide updates.

### Law Requiring Holocaust and Genocide Education in Connecticut Schools

Governor Dannel P. Malloy announced that he has signed into law legislation that adds Holocaust and genocide education and awareness to the required courses of study for public schools in Connecticut. The new law requires all local and regional boards of education to include the topic in their social studies curriculum beginning in the 2018-19 school year. In developing and implementing the curriculum, the boards can use exiting and appropriate public or private materials, personnel, and other resources. Providers that offer CDP courses must include this topic in the relevant component of the social studies curriculum.

The legislation is <u>Senate Bill 452</u>: An Act Concerning the Inclusion of Holocaust and Genocide Education and Awareness in the Social Studies Curriculum. It was adopted by unanimous votes in both chambers of the Connecticut General Assembly.

Students should also be made aware that hate crimes are now considered a felony. Last year, Governor Malloy signed a law (Public Act 17-111) that strengthened Connecticut's hate crime laws, making them among the strongest in the nation. That law, which made the commission of a hate crime a felony instead of a misdemeanor, came in response to recent incidents of hate across the country, including murders, assaults, bomb threats, and vandalism, directed against certain groups.
