

EDUCATION REFORM UPDATE Alliance District Application Approvals

Public Act 12-116, An Act Concerning Educational Reform, created the Alliance District program with the goal of providing new resources to the districts in greatest need – provided they embrace key reforms to position their students for success. To achieve this, the law establishes a process for identifying 30 Alliance Districts – the districts with the lowest district performance index scores statewide – and allocates to these districts \$39.5 million in increased Education Cost Sharing (ECS) funding in the upcoming fiscal year. Each district's receipt of its designated allocation is conditioned upon district submission, and Connecticut State Department of Education approval, of an Alliance District Plan for the expenditure of the new increment of conditional funds in the context of the district's overall strategy to improve academic achievement.

HARTFORD, CT - Connecticut Commissioner of Education Stefan Pryor today announced that the second cohort of Alliance District applications have been finalized, as school district plans from Bristol, Vernon, and Windsor were approved by the Department of Education. Each of the three districts is now eligible to receive additional Education Cost Sharing (ECS) funding based on their locally-conceived, evidence-based reform plans that propose initiatives to dramatically increase student achievement.

Bristol: \$1,390,182

- Expanding an already successful early childhood education program, Bristol has coordinated Alliance District funding with another component of the Governor's education reform bill. The district will add teachers to support new non-fee preschool slots they were awarded under new legislation, increasing support for children at a crucial educational period in their lives. Bristol has also intensified its focus on developing high-quality data analysis tools, in this case, by refining a screening instrument to ensure that the still-limited number of non-fee preschool slots go to children who need them most.
- Acknowledging the paramount importance of literacy in driving achievement across all content
 areas, Bristol will dedicate a majority of its Alliance District funding to providing supports for
 students not achieving Goal and challenging students who are. Bristol will target student and
 adult action in this area by adding new teachers, employing and developing literacy coaches
 who will train and mentor teachers, and by devoting 20 hours a week of an assistant principal's
 time at two new K-8 schools to ensure that school leadership has sufficient capacity to align
 faculty to the increased emphasis on literacy instruction.

Vernon: \$ \$671,611

- Vernon plans to implement the standards-based Common Core curriculum to strengthen classroom instruction and develop Common Core aligned assessments to inform teacher practice.
- Vernon will build capacity to address student needs through intensive, collaborative, jobembedded professional learning by: increasing the number of district-level coaches and focusing their support on K-3 literacy and numeracy, and implementing the state's teacher evaluation and support system.
- Responding with a sense of urgency to the achievement gap, Vernon is devoting a substantial
 portion of its Alliance District funding to strengthening interventions for students in need of
 improvement by: implementing additional reading interventions according to need, adding
 before and after school reading interventions, and ensuring that high-school students have
 multiple avenues to recover lost credit.

Windsor: \$ \$306,985

- Windsor plans to consolidate, coordinate, and streamline its data-collection and utilization system in order to provide meaningful and actionable data to teachers and school leaders. A district data coordinator will be hired to optimize data collection and spearhead professional development for teachers and administrators to ensure that each adult in the district will be able to respond effectively to data.
- Windsor will also start a Leadership Development Academy. Through the Academy, the local Board of Education, existing school and district leaders, and the leaders of the future, will receive professional development, mentoring, and coaching in instructional leadership and school administration.

Application Process

- All 30 designated Alliance Districts submitted applications in August
- The iterative process involves rounds of dialogue between the Department and districts to ensure proposals fulfill program guidelines and goals
- Districts have been asked to revise, expand, focus, and/or clarify components of their proposed plans
- Districts were asked to consult local stakeholders, including the local bargaining unit, and submit plans to their boards of education

Approved Alliance District Plans

- Cohort one (approved September 6, 2012): Ansonia, Naugatuck, and Windsor Locks
- Cohort two (approved September 24, 2012): Bristol, Vernon, Windsor

Alliance Districts Currently in Feedback/Revision Process

 24 Alliance Districts are revising Alliance plans based on Department feedback: Bloomfield, Bridgeport, Danbury, Derby, East Hartford, East Haven, East Windsor, Hamden, Hartford, Killingly, Manchester, Meriden, Middletown, New Britain, New Haven, New London, Norwalk, Norwich, Putnam, Stamford, Waterbury, West Haven, Winchester, and Windham

Alliance Districts, Year 2

A short timeframe necessitated expedited reviews and approvals for the 2012-2013 school year;
 a more rigorous process is planned for Year 2

- The Department of Education has requested that districts commit to working on several priority areas as process shifts to Year 2, including:
 - o School intervention and redesign
 - o Evaluation-informed professional development
 - Transition to new accountability system described in Connecticut's approved NCLB waiver
 - o Preparation for the Common Core
 - Strategic planning
 - o Monitoring of Alliance plan implementation
