Overview

Career exploration is an integral part of an effective school system. Career readiness begins in schools and lasts a lifetime. By investing in **industry-aligned curricula**, **work-based learning** opportunities, and **college and career advising** and mentorship, schools and districts can offer students:

- Rigorous, applied instruction to aid with learning recovery in all content areas
- A meaningful way to re-engage in school after a difficult year
- A pathway to a secure future

Industry-Aligned Coursework

Aligning core and elective courses to industry demand is crucial for showing students the "why" behind their school work. It allows students to imagine a future in careers and industries they might never have imagined, and it provides a clear pathway towards a post-high school career or college degree.

Work-Based Learning

Work-Based Learning is a way for students to begin exploring and imagining their future. Job shadow and mentorship opportunities for younger students give way to internships and pre-apprenticeships for high school juniors and seniors.

College & Career Advising

Structured advising programs, offered by school guidance counselors, nonprofit partners, or industry volunteers, help students to envision their future and map out the steps they will take to get there.
