SUBJECT: Fiscal Year 2020-21 Midterm Budget Reallocation and Reduction Options

#### **Reallocation Option:**

The Department is requesting the reallocation of \$1.26 million of the \$3.2 million currently appropriated for the Bilingual Education entitlement grant to a new account entitled Bilingual Education – District-Level Supports. The biennial budget appropriates \$3.2 million for Bilingual Education grants in each fiscal year. Section 10-17g of the Connecticut General Statutes (C.G.S.) limits the Department to granting only \$1.9 million of the funds appropriated for the purpose of the Bilingual Education entitlement grant. The balance of the funds are dedicated to carrying out the purposes of C.G.S. Sections 10-17k, 10-17n, and 10-66t. These sections were for activities that were limited to being carried out in Fiscal Years 2015 and 2016.

The Department is proposing to use the \$1.26 million balance for more direct and targeted supports to local school districts for their English language learner student populations. The data collected and analyzed by the Department, and detailed below, show a significant gap in the academic outcomes for these students:

- The English Language Arts (ELA) achievement index of English learners is lower than that of all race/ethnic groups, free meal eligible students, and reduced price meal eligible students in 2015-16, 2016-17, and 2017-18. The only student group with lower ELA achievement than English learners is the students with disabilities group. Overall, only about 1 in 10 English learners across all grades meets the grade-level expectation in ELA.
- The four-year graduation rate of English learners is lower than that of all race/ethnic groups, free meal eligible students, and reduced price meal eligible students for the cohorts of 2014-15, 2015-16, 2016-17, and 2017-18. Even over a six-year period, 1 in 4 English learners fails to graduate high school.
- Chronic absenteeism rates for English learners exceeds 15 percent; i.e., nearly 1 in 7 English learners miss at least 10 percent of school days.

The reallocation of these funds would allow the Department to provide more meaningful support to districts for this student population.

### **Reduction Option:**

In an August 1, 2019 letter to agency heads, the Secretary of the Office of Policy and Management (OPM) asked that agencies submit reduction options totaling 1 percent of the agency's budget, excluding entitlements and formula-based municipal aid. For the Department, the total reduction would amount to \$8 million.

To meet this target, the Department is proposing that each account be reduced by 1 percent with the exception of the following accounts: Adult Education; Health and Welfare Services – Private Schools; Education Cost Sharing Grant; Bilingual Education; School Breakfast Program; Child Nutrition – State Match; and Special Education Excess Cost – Student Based. Of the aforementioned accounts, the first five are considered formula-based municipal aid and the last two accounts are required for the purpose of matching federal funds or meeting federal maintenance of effort requirements. As part of the process, we will provide OPM with pertinent information about the potential impact on each of the accounts to assist in the development of the proposed midterm budget adjustments.
