Executive Summary

Introduction

Every day, students are vulnerable to dangers such as cyber-bullying, identity theft, and phishing. As technologies evolve and are integrated into teaching, there is a critical need for all Connecticut students to have the opportunity to learn the foundational skills of digital citizenship, internet safety, and media literacy. Media literate students can use multiple forms of media (e.g., video, audio, and imagery) to create, communicate, and differentiate from fact and fiction.

To better assist students in building relevant knowledge and skills necessary in this digital age, the American Association of School Libraries (AASL) recently published new standards that take a comprehensive approach to teaching and learning by demonstrating the connection between the student learners, school librarians/library media specialists, and school libraries. Feedback from more than 1,300 school librarians and stakeholders guided the creation of the 2018 American Association of School Libraries (AASL) National School Library Standards for Learners, School Librarians, and School Libraries.

History/Background

Digital citizenship, internet safety, and media literacy continue to be a priority in Connecticut. In July 2017, the legislature passed Public Act 17-67, Sec. 1 (codified as Conn. Gen. Stat. §10-7v.), establishing a Digital Citizenship, Internet Safety, and Media Literacy Advisory Council (Council) consisting of teachers, library media specialists, representatives from parent-teacher organizations, and individuals with expertise in digital citizenship, internet safety, and media literacy. The Council was formed to provide recommendations to the Connecticut State Board of Education regarding:

- practices relating to instruction in digital citizenship, internet safety, and media literacy; and
- methods of instructing students to safely, ethically, responsibly, and effectively use media and technology resources.

On January 2, 2020, the Connecticut State Board (Board) of Education approved the Digital Citizenship, Internet Safety, and Media Literacy Guidelines and Recommended Actions created by the Council to assist all stakeholders with instructional practices and methods regarding digital citizenship, internet safety, and media literacy. At this meeting the Board expressed an interest in having the Council explore tools and preventative measures to assist students in being safe online, responding to cyberbullying, and coping with upsetting online information.

In response to the Board's request, the Council determined that an important foundational step for Connecticut would be to update the current Connecticut State Department of Education Technology and Literacy Framework (2006) utilized by Connecticut educators, library media specialists, and librarians. From March 2021 through April 2021, the Council collaborated with the Connecticut Association of School Librarians (CASL) in the creation and dissemination of a survey to gather information from Connecticut educators, administers, school librarians, and media specialists regarding:

- standards and frameworks currently guiding school library media curricula and instruction;
- digital citizenship, internet safety, and media literacy teaching and learning priorities; and
- the need for updated standards for students, school librarians, media specialists, and school libraries.

The majority of the 252 survey respondents indicated the need for new, national standards to guide Connecticut school librarians and media specialists as the 2006 Connecticut State Department of Education Technology and Literacy Framework is not meeting current needs. Respondents noted that new standards must facilitate student learning opportunities, assist students in the selection of safe/interactive technology tools, and help students safely navigate the digital world. Many of the 102 librarians responding to the survey shared that they are currently using both the Board approved International Society for Technology in Education (ISTE) Standards for Students and the 2018 AASL Standards as they find both sets of standards to be helpful in driving effective teaching and learning.

Based on stakeholder input, the Council identified the AASL Standards as viable standards that:

- provide an essential missing piece to school and district digital citizenship, internet safety, and media literacy work;
- complement the Board approved National Computer Science Teachers Association (NCSTA) K-12 Computer Science Standards and ISTE Standards for Students (Appendix A);
- guide best practices regarding teaching and learning (Appendices B and C); and
- assist districts and schools with the establishment of effective school libraries (Appendix D).

From June 2021 through July 2021, the Council facilitated a series of focus groups. Focus group members agreed that these standards are necessary for Connecticut to assist students in engaging independently in safe, legal, and ethical digital practices. Focus group members agreed that

professional learning is necessary to understand the content, format, and expectations of the 2018 AASL Standards.

The 2018 AASL Standards were introduced for review and consideration to the Academic Standards and Assessment subcommittee of the Board on September 14, 2021. The members reviewed the work of the Council and recommended the 2018 AASL Standards go forward for full Board adoption.

Recommendation

The Connecticut State Department of Education (CSDE) presents the 2018 American Association of School Libraries (AASL) National School Library Standards for Learners, School Librarians, and School Libraries for review and consideration of adoption.

Next-Steps

Upon adoption, the 2018 American Association of School Libraries (AASL) National School Library Standards for Learners, School Librarians, and School Libraries combined with the National Computer Science Teachers Association (NCSTA) K–12 Computer Science Standards, previously adopted by the Board, will replace the Connecticut State Department of Education Technology and Literacy Framework (2006).

The CSDE will continue to work with Connecticut Association of School Librarians (CASL) to ensure that when the 2018 American Association of School Libraries (AASL) National School Library Standards for Learners, School Librarians, and School Libraries are adopted there is accessible professional learning for school librarians, media specialists, and administrators. The CSDE will continue to work with the Digital Citizenship, Internet Safety, and Media Literacy Advisory Council and CASL to leverage conference presentation opportunities, professional learning, and online resources to educate districts on digital citizenship, internet safety, and media literacy.
