Minutes State Board of Education Meeting April 5, 2017 (Approved May 3, 2017)

Pursuant to notice filed with the Secretary of the State, the State Board of Education (hereinafter "Board") met on Wednesday, April 5, 2017, in Plaza North Room C and D of the State Office Building, 450 Columbus Boulevard, Hartford, Connecticut.

I. Call to Order

Chairperson Allan Taylor called the meeting to order at 9:40 a.m.

II. Public Participation

 Susan Sumberg, a first grade teacher at Laurel Elementary School in Bloomfield, and president of the Bloomfield Education Association, spoke in support of the Performance Evaluation Advisory Committee's (PEAC) recommendation concerning the role of state mastery tests in teacher evaluation, and urged the Board to adopt resolution V.G. A copy of Ms. Sumberg's prepared statement is included in the official file of this meeting.

2. Dr. Shuana Tucker, Chief Talent Officer, New Britain Public Schools, and Mr. Salvador Escobales, science teacher and President of NBFT Local 871, both members of the Professional Development and Evaluation Committee for the New Britain School District, spoke about their concerns about the use of standardized tests for evaluation purposes.

They stated that standardized tests such as the SBAC could be useful for identifying areas for academic improvement for students and for identifying areas for instructional improvement for teachers. A copy of Dr. Tucker's and Mr. Escobales' prepared statements are included in the official file of this meeting.

- 3. Pam Murphy, Visual Arts Supervisor for West Hartford Public Schools, spoke about the importance of the arts in a comprehensive education. Ms. Murphy urged the Board to fill the state arts consultant position with a qualified candidate to facilitate implementation of the Core Arts Standards in Connecticut. A copy of Ms. Murphy's prepared statement is included in the official file of this meeting.
- 4. Andrew Mayo, Supervisor for the Department of Fine and Performing Arts for West Hartford Public Schools, expressed his concerns about not filling the arts consultant position, and urged the Board to reflect on the role of arts throughout academic areas, and the need to guide Connecticut's school districts through the process of revising curricula and training teachers on the Core Arts Standards. A copy of Mr. Mayo's prepared statement is included in the official file of this meeting.
- 5. Dr. RoseAnn O'Brien Vojtek, Principal of Ivy Drive Elementary School in Bristol, and President of the Connecticut Association of Schools and the Chair of the Administrator Professional Standards Council, expressed her support for the PEAC Committee amendment proposal concerning the use of the SBAC assessment (agenda item V.G.). A copy of Dr. O'Brien Vojtek's prepared statement is included in the official file of this meeting.
- 6. Dr. Jacob Easley II, Dean of the School of Education and Professional Studies at Eastern Connecticut State University and a former teacher, spoke in support of the PEAC recommendation regarding the use of state standardized tests for teachers in setting goals and professional development.
- 7. Dr. Rupendra Paliwal, Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs, Sacred Heart University, expressed his appreciation for the process and outcome concerning the continuing approval of the Educator Preparation Programs at Sacred Heart University. Dr. Paliwal was pleased with the positive changes in the culture within the university's educator preparation program, and thanked the visiting team, and Dr. Sarah Barzee and Dr. Katie Toohey, for their support and guidance throughout the process.
- 8. Brian Frazier, Vice-President and President-elect of the Connecticut Arts Administrators' Association, stated that it is critical that an arts specialist lead the effort to implement the Core Arts Standards in Connecticut, and urged the Board to fill this vacant position. A copy of Mr. Frazier's prepared statement is included in the official file of this meeting.
- 9. Tom Stringfellow, resident of Manchester, recommended to the Board several articles and spoke about historical events and figures (the 100 year anniversary of U.S. military involvement in World War I, Maya Angelou, Cesar Chavez, Martin Luther King, <u>Most Likely to Succeed: Preparing Our Kids for the Innovation Era</u>, <u>Navigating Achievement for Struggling Students with the Common Core State Standards</u>, and a Time Magazine,

March 27, 2017, article on redefining gender identity of students and young adults). A copy of Mr. Stringfellow's statement is included in the official file of this meeting.

- 10. Gwen Samuel, President of the Connecticut Parents Union, stated that the Board has had five years to determine how best to measure the effectiveness of educators, and must fulfill its responsibility for holding educators accountable and ensuring that the educational interests of the state are met. She stated that being poor does not equate to students' inability to learn, and educators must be held accountable for all students. She urged the Board, at the very least, to table agenda item V.G. pending additional parental and student input.
- 11. Jennifer Alexander, Chief Executive Officer, ConnCAN, shared ConnCAN's concerns regarding the March 2017 Performance Evaluation Advisory Council's recommendations to not use student growth on the Smarter Balanced Assessment in calculating an educator's summative performance evaluations. Ms. Alexander noted that Connecticut needs an evaluation model that connects teacher performance evaluations with assessments of student growth toward college and career readiness standards. A copy of Ms. Alexander's prepared statement is included in the official file of this meeting.
- 12. John Prins, member of the Branford Board of Education, and President of the Connecticut Alliance for Arts Education, spoke about the importance of arts education, and offered support to make the state arts consultant position a requirement under the laws. A copy of Mr. Prins' prepared statement is included in the official file of this meeting.
- 13. Dr. Jeffrey Spector, Executive Director of the Connecticut Alliance for Arts Education, discussed the need for a knowledgeable arts professional to provide leadership to the arts education teachers across the state, and asked the Board to fill the vacant position. A copy of Dr. Spector's prepared statement is enclosed in the official file of this meeting.
- 14. Andrea Haas, arts educator, spoke about the value of arts education and the role of the arts in student engagement. Ms. Haas described the effect of prior arts education consultants on her professional practice, and urged the Board to fill the arts education consultant position. A copy of Ms. Hass' prepared statement is included in the official file of this meeting.
- 15. Tracy L. Abbate, Director of Arts and Wellness, Hartford Public Schools, stated that the state arts consultant and physical education consultant are integral to the success of students in Connecticut, and asked the Board to consider filling these two positions to continue to advocate in these areas and communicate grant opportunities, professional development opportunities, and current information to the field. A copy of Ms. Abbate's prepared statement is enclosed in the official file of this meeting.
- 16. Brian Cyr, Fine Arts Coordinator, Meriden Public Schools, encouraged the Board to fill the arts education consultant position with a well-qualified individual.
- 17. Dave Cicarella, President of the New Haven Federation of Teachers and a member of PEAC, spoke in support of agenda item V.G., concerning the appropriate use of state

mastery test data (i.e., professional development and goal setting) in the state educator evaluation and support system.

- 18. Steve McKeever, Advanced Placement science teacher, Middletown Public Schools, and First Vice President of AFT-CT, spoke in support of agenda item V.G., regarding the appropriate use of state mastery test data. He noted that performance on a single test on a particular day is not an accurate way to assess performance. He added that SBAC is a computer based test, and we must consider the impact of students' varying technology skills on their test performance.
- 19. Jahana Hayes, classroom teacher, Waterbury Public Schools, and 2016 National Teacher of the Year, urged the Board to support the PEAC recommendation regarding the appropriate use of state mastery test results, noting that it has value in professional growth and development. Ms. Hayes expressed her concerns about the potential for prospective and new teachers thinking that their success is based on the results of a single test.
- 20. Dr. Joseph Cirasuolo, Executive Director of the Connecticut Association of Public School Superintendents (CAPSS), expressed his support for the PEAC recommendations, noting that use of state mastery test data to inform educator goal-setting for professional development purposes will result in improved student outcomes. Dr. Cirasuolo urged the Board to adopt the PEAC recommendations.
- 21. Jeffrey Villar, Executive Director, Connecticut Council for Education Reform, stated his concern with removing state mastery test results as a measure of accountability in teacher evaluation. Mr. Villar stated that these tests serve as a powerful tool to provide an accurate assessment of student performance in English Language Arts and mathematics, and could be used to drive necessary change.

3. Be it resolved that districts are provided flexibility when designing the school day, week, year and structure of the classroom to meet the learning needs of each student on his or her path to mastering standards.
