DRAFT Minutes State Board of Education Meeting February 14, 2018

Pursuant to notice filed with the Secretary of the State, the State Board of Education (hereinafter "Board") met on Wednesday, February 14, 2018, in Plaza North Room C and D of the State Office Building, 450 Columbus Boulevard, Hartford, Connecticut.

The Board unanimously agreed to consider agenda item X., Items for Discussion, at this time.

X. Items for Discussion

A. The Perils and the Promises in the Education of Black, Latino and Poor Children in Connecticut

A panel consisting of Gwen Samuel, President and Founder, Connecticut Parents Union, and two guest researchers: Sharif El-Mekki, Co-founder, The Fellowship of Black Male Educators-Pennsylvania, and Albert Cheng, postdoctoral research and teaching fellow at the Program on Education Policy and Governance at Harvard University. Ms. Samuel thanked Chairman Taylor, Commissioner Wentzell, and the Board for the opportunity to present before them. The panel presented a summary on the Connecticut Parents Union Symposium, "The Perils and the Promises in the Education of Black, Latino and Poor Children in Connecticut," held on December 16, 2017, at Capital Community College, Hartford. The purpose of the symposium was to address the disproportionate suspension and expulsion rates for children of color and the importance of rethinking how we think about suspensions and expulsion and the urgency of being intentional. Questions and discussion ensued.

B. Central Connecticut State University Teacher Leader Fellowship Program

A panel consisting of Dr. Betty J. Sternberg, Director, Teacher Leader Fellowship Program, CCSU; Ray Rossomando, Jr., Director of Policy, Research and Government Relations, Connecticut Education Association; Sal Escobales, President of AFT-CT in New Britain and representing AFT-CT; Dr. Maureen Brummett, Superintendent, Plainville Public Schools; Bernadette Brown-Palmer, Read Elementary School, Bridgeport; Lynn Logoyke, Principal, Toffolon Elementary School, Plainville; Cheri Burke, Director of Student Learning, Region # 10, Harwinton/Burlington; Melissa Orfitelli, Head Teacher & K-5 Literacy Coach, Wheeler Elementary School, Plainville; Wendy Bender, Grade 3 Teacher, Toffolon Elementary School, Plainville; Rachel Miller, Kindergarten Teacher, Wheeler Elementary School, Plainville; and Nadine Mills, Mathematics Teacher, A.I. Prince Technical School, Hartford; presented on the collaborative Teacher Leader Fellowship Program that is centered at Central Connecticut State University. The speakers spoke on the opportunity of being part of a fellowship of teacher leaders that assists both teachers and administrators. The Fellowship offers a supportive environment, encouraging teachers to take ownership of the programs, practices, policies, and priorities that shape student learning. Questions and answers ensued.

C. Education Development Center (EDC) Work in Connecticut and Updates from the Regional Educational Laboratory/Northeast and Islands (REL-NEI)

A panel consisting of Rebecca "Rebby" Carey, Associate Director, U.S. Division, Education Development Center (EDC) and Researcher Carrie Parker, Regional Educational Laboratory Northeast & Islands (REL-NEI). The presentation focused on the English learner, including effective models for meeting the needs of the diverse population of students who are English learners.

The Board recessed the meeting for lunch at 1:31 p.m.

V. Items Requiring Action

A. Certificate of Exemption: Mesivta–Durham

Dr. López moved, Mr. Vrabely seconded, that the State Board of Education, pursuant to Section 10-8a-1 to 10-8a-8 of the Regulations of Connecticut State Agencies, issues a conditional Certificate of Exemption to the Mesivta-Durham of Yeshiva Gedolah of Waterbury ("Mesivta"), 459 Wallingford Road, Durham, CT 06422, for the period of February 14, 2018, through August 13, 2018, and directs the Commissioner to take the necessary action. The conditional Certificate of Exemption is subject to satisfaction of the following conditions:

- To ensure appropriate levels of supervision for the number of students served, the Mesivta shall not exceed its current enrollment (180) and shall maintain its current levels of personnel involved in teaching, supervising or providing care for students, including with respect to the allocation of staff assigned to dormitory supervision responsibilities.
- In accordance with the applicable regulations, CSDE may conduct a site visit at the Mesivta during the period of conditional approval at a time to be determined by CSDE.
- 3. In records that shall be preserved and available for inspection by state agencies, the Mesivta shall document any instance involving a breach of its policies or procedures relating to supervision, safety or health of students, and how the breach was addressed. In addition to any reports to DCF or other state agencies that may be required by law, any breach of policies or procedures resulting in injury or serious risk of injury to a student shall be reported to CSDE as soon as possible, and in no event later than 48 hours following discovery of the incident.
- 4. The Mesivta shall obtain and provide to CSDE a final health inspection report from the Town of Durham health inspector for the dining hall, and shall continue refraining from using the dining hall for food preparation until receipt of such report.

The Certificate of Exemption shall convert to a standard one-year Certificate of Exemption, expiring February 13, 2019, upon a determination by CSDE that the Mesivta appropriately satisfied the foregoing conditions during the initial six-month period.

VII. Report of the Commissioner

Commissioner Wentzell referenced her written report. The Commissioner highlighted the following items:

• The public release of the Next Accountability results would happen during the week. She commented on being proud of the reporting system and the national attention.

- The Commissioner thanked Director of Communications Peter Yazbak for all his efforts for the Department's social media presence.
- GirlsGoCyberStart. The Connecticut Department of Emergency Services and Public Protection (DESPP) and the State Department of Education will collaborate with the Girl Scouts of Connecticut to encourage young women in grades 9 through 12 to register for cybersecurity training for future cybersecurity professionals.
- #Loveteaching. The Commissioner highlighted the national campaign, Love Teaching Campaign. During the week of Valentine's Day, teachers around the U.S. and Connecticut were asked to share why they love teaching with a story from the classroom. Teachers can post using the hashtag #loveteaching on social media or their blog.
- The funds that would be received from the federal government are at jeopardy, which places our Title II and Title IV funding to districts at risk.
- State Education Resource Center (SERC). The State Department of Education is very supportive of SERC. As a quasi-public agency, it is up to the SERC Board of Directors whether SERC continues to operate and not a matter for the State Department of Education or the State Board of Education.

VIII. Financial Matters

Chief Financial Officer Kathleen Demsey provided a financial summary on the budget. Ms. Demsey highlighted that an impact to the Department is the potential consolidation of the Office of Higher Education into the Department. She stated that Governor Malloy has proposed changes to the ECS formula that was passed; those changes would mean that some districts that were anticipating funding would not receive funds. Discussion ensued.

XI. Committee Reports

A. Academic Standards and Assessment

The committee will be meeting on February 26, 2018.

B. Accountability and Support

Dr. López reported that the committee will be meeting on February 21, 2018. An invitation was extended to attend the meeting for its restorative practice overview.

C. Finance, Audit, and Budget

Mr. Taylor reported that the committee will be meeting on February 28, 2018.

D. Legislation and Policy Development

Mr. Vrabely reported that the committee met this morning and had two presentations. Chief Talent Officer Dr. Sarah Barzee presented on the Sacred Heart University (SHU) proposal for a Superintendent of Schools program. Mr. Vrabely thanked Dr. Barzee for bringing new educator preparation programs that relates to workforce needs. Attorney Matthew Venhorst presented an overview of regional collaboration among school districts.

E. Connecticut Technical High School System Board

Mr. Trefry reported that Jeffrey Wihbey has been officially appointed by Commissioner Wentzell as the Superintendent of the Connecticut Technical Education and Career System. Mr. Trefry indicated that Mr. Wihbey is in the process of meeting with focus groups at each of the technical high schools. Mr. Trefry referenced that he and Mr. Wihbey continue to work with Ms. Kathy Demsey on the budget.
