# Minutes State Board of Education Meeting June 2, 2021

(Approved September 1, 2021)

Pursuant to notice filed with the Secretary of the State and posted on the agency's Web site, the members of State Board of Education (hereinafter "Board") met on Wednesday, June 2, 2021, in Plaza North Meeting Room C and D of the State Office Building, 450 Columbus Boulevard, Hartford, Connecticut. A GoToWebinar registration link was provided to allow for public attendance to the virtual meeting. #### II. Public Participation

#### X. Items for Discussion

#### A. Agency Update

Acting Commissioner Russell-Tucker introduced and described subject matters that would be presented under the Agency Updates.

#### **Summer Enrichment**

Director of Innovation and Partnerships Chris Soto provided an update on the \$11 million in the American Rescue Plan that was set aside specifically for summer enrichment. He reported on the number of Expansion grants and Innovation grants that were awarded and highlighted that all awardees must have staff complete two hours of social-emotional learning. Mr. Soto announced a website (<a href="www.summerct.org">www.summerct.org</a>) was created to help families know about the opportunities that were now available in their communities.

#### ARP ESSER Plan Update (American Rescue Plan Update)

Fellow Tanya Budler reviewed the ARP ESSER timeline. She highlighted June 7, 2021, as the deadline for the State Department of Education to file its state plan with the U.S. Department of Education. Ms. Budler thanked the Board for its May 19, 2021, meeting, which was followed with two stakeholder focus group sessions. Ms. Budler shared a summary of takeaways of the public feedback.

Chief Financial Officer Kathy Demsey stated that from each of the ESSER funding, the federal law is to reserve 10 percent of the funds at the state level for state activities. She summarized the CSDE ARP ESSER funding priority buckets to utilize the state-level funding.

#### SBE 5-Year Comprehensive Plan

Chief Strategic Planning Officer Keith Norton provided an update on the SBE 5-Year Comprehensive Plan. He highlighted that Dr. Richard Lemons, CT Center for School Change, had generated extensive notes from the March Retreat. Mr. Norton provided an overview of the next steps for the second phase of preparing for stakeholder engagement through the use of

focus groups and surveys. The analyzing and summary of focus group findings and surveys will be presented to the Board at the Retreat in August.

#### **Learning Models of Districts**

Deputy Commissioner Desi Nesmith reported that the period of May 24 -May 28, 2021, over 86 percent of districts were now operating in a predominately fully in-person model. Zero percent of districts were predominately remote. 100 percent of Connecticut districts have offered some in-person instruction to at least some of their students during the 2020-21 school year. Deputy Commissioner Nesmith commended the Performance Office for the phenomenal job setting up the Learning Model as well as the weekly collection, and the attendance rate model that provided us with significant data during the pandemic.

#### **School Health and Safety Update**

Legal Director Jessa Mirtle reported that school districts received the most recent guidance for summer school and enrichment opportunities. School districts have also been informed about the updated guidance for sports. She concluded that there was a continuing mandate that masks be worn. This is supported by the Governor's executive order as well as per the Department of Public Health.

Division Director John Frassinelli provided an update on vaccinations and programs. He stated that the Department of Public Health has been working with districts to set up vaccine clinics. He shared that the Department of Public Health received \$107 million dollars to do school-based testing that is ongoing.

#### <u>Professional Learning Opportunities for Families and Districts</u>

Division Director John Frassinelli presented on the webinar: Relationships of Trust: Families and Educators Reflect on Home Visiting, which was held on May 27, 2021. He shared that this was one of the webinar series in which staff speak directly with families and highlighted the initiative around teacher home visiting.

#### Statewide Digital Curricula Partnership

Deputy Commissioner Desi Nesmith highlighted the recent roll out of two supplemental resources of Apex Learning and Defined Learning to provide additional resources to districts.

#### Shoutout!

#### <u>CSDE and RESC Alliance – Blended Learning Partnership</u>

Chief Academic Officer Irene Parisi shared that the CSDE partnered with the RESC Alliance to launch the Connecticut Plan for Reimaging Connecticut classrooms. The program was to put special learning in the hands of teachers to promote blended learning in the classrooms regardless of location and at no cost to districts.

#### Shoutout!

Chief Academic Officer Irene Parisi highlighted three supports from the Turnaround Office:

- CSDE Talent Office and CSDE Charter School Office: Charter School Leaders and Hiring Managers: Champions of Talent Development, May 4, 2021.

#### Recognition of Carole Dibble: Teacher Leader in Residence

Division Director Lisa Lamenzo spoke on the recognition of Carole Dibble, CSDE Turnaround Office, Teacher Leader in Residence (West Hartford) for the past two years. Ms. Lamenzo stated that the Turnaround Office was appreciative of Ms. Dibble's tremendous service to the department.

Acting Commissioner Russell-Tucker presented a Certificate of Recognition to Ms. Dibble.

#### **Legislative Update**

Chief of Staff/Legislative Liaison Laura Stefon reported that negotiations were currently in process and that the legislative session concludes on June 9<sup>th</sup>. She shared two bills that would create new entities within the Department: (i) one creates a new Center for Literacy Research and Reading Success within the Department; and (ii) the other would create an Office of Dyslexia and Reading Disabilities. Ms. Stefon concluded with the status of the Agency bill.

#### XI. Committee Reports

#### A. Academic Standards and Assessment

Committee Chair Clemons reported that the next committee meeting will be held on June 8, 2021.

#### B. Accountability and Support

Committee Chair López reported that the committee met on May 18, 2021. Great Oaks Charter School, Bridgeport, The Bridge Academy, Bridgeport, and Interdistrict School for Arts and Communication (ISAAC), New London, presented to the committee.

#### C. Finance, Audit, and Budget

Committee Chair Taylor reported that the committee did not meet.

#### D. Legislation and Policy Development

Committee Chair Benham reported that the committee did not meet.

#### E. Connecticut Technical Education and Career System Board

Superintendent Wihbey shared an update on the CTECS Board meeting and highlighted two significant partnerships and two student celebrations.

- The board has finalized an Agreement with Three Rivers Community College in connection with Grasso Tech students.
- Lt. Governor Bysiewicz joined several board members in opening up our new afternoon program for LEA students at Vinal Tech in Middletown.
- Two Platt Tech students in the sustainable architecture program participated in a national competition called SpaceNet.
- Vinal Tech students in the Criminal Justice and Protective Services program will receive state and federal recognition for their work during the COVID-19 pandemic.

#### F. NASBE

Board Member Exley reported that the Government Affairs Committee held a meeting. He highlighted that Connecticut's leadership with the African American, Black, Latino and Puerto Rican Curriculum was of interest.

Board Member Benham reported that the Whole Child Policy Study Group of NASBE held its last monthly meeting.

On May 20, 2021, NASBE hosted a webinar: *Accelerating Learning in Connecticut and Missouri* to present on the collaborative approach to coordinating summer accelerated learning plans and preparing for the next school year. The Connecticut presenter panelists were: (i) **Director of Innovation and Partnerships** Chris Soto, and (ii) Vice Chairperson López.

#### G. SERC

Board Member Benham highlighted the collaborations of SERC's services with the CSDF
