### **V. Report of the Chair**

Vice Chair Benham highlighted the following:

- Attended the 2026 Teacher of the Year Ceremony at the Bushnell on December 16, 2026.
- Attended a CAPSS press conference on workforce development with Dr. John Maduko and Dr. Kelli-Marie Vallieres on January 13, 2026.
  - Dr. Vallieres highlighted workforce initiatives that connected associations from different sectors all around CT.
  - Dr. Maduko, noted that it was good to have cross-sector colleagues and partners across the state doing this work.

Vice Chair Benham asked for a motion to move agenda item, XI.A., Recognition of the 2026 Teacher of the Year and 2026 Teacher of the Year Finalists, to accommodate the teachers and superintendents attending the meeting. Board Member Pitkoff moved, and Board Member Record seconded, that agenda item XI.A. be moved on the agenda.

## **XI. Items for Discussion**

### **A. Recognition of the 2026 Teacher of the Year and 2026 Teacher of the Year Finalists**

Associate Education Consultant Ashley Wright, Talent Office, and Education Service Specialist Victoria Malvey, Talent Office, presented. Each teacher joined at the table with their superintendent.

Vice Chair Benham read aloud the bios of each teacher into the minutes of the meeting as follows:

#### **2026 Connecticut Teacher of the Year Finalists**

**Ryan Heath:** Pond Hill and Parker Farms Elementary Schools (Wallingford)

Superintendent: Dr. Danielle Bellizzi, Wallingford Public Schools

Ryan is an educator of multilingual learners specializing in teaching bilingual Spanish-speaking students in grades 3–5 at Pond Hill and Parker Farms Elementary Schools. He leads student-run news broadcasts and develops cultural exploration videos that highlight student voices and the diverse languages represented across his schools. These initiatives provide authentic opportunities for students to collaborate, take leadership roles, and showcase their learning in ways that connect directly to the broader school community. Ryan also has built meaningful relationships with organizations such as Integrated Refugee and Immigrant Services (IRIS) and the Spanish Community of Wallingford (SCOW) to bridge connections between students, families, and vital community resources.

**Joseph Meyer:** Glastonbury High School (Glastonbury)

Superintendent: Dr. Alan B. Bookman, Glastonbury Public Schools

Joey teaches Latin at Glastonbury High School, where he has inspired students for 21 years. At Glastonbury, Joey helped establish the school's Advisory program, training more than 100 student facilitators to foster peer connections during monthly homerooms. He has co-chaired the school's NEASC leadership self-study, co-advises the Classics Club, and has been recognized with the Essence Award for exemplifying Glastonbury High School's core values. Beyond his classroom, Joey has served in leadership roles with the Classical Association of Connecticut and contributed to the design of ACTFL's Latin Interpretive Reading Assessment, which is used nationwide to measure Latin proficiency. He frequently presents and publishes on equity and empathy in Latin instruction and the importance of student voice and connection.

**Antwanette Serrano:** Elizabeth Green School (Newington)

Superintendent: Maureen Brummett, Newington Public Schools

Antwanette teaches third grade at Elizabeth Green School in Newington, where she has dedicated 26 years to inspiring young learners. She earned her undergraduate and master's degrees in Reading and Elementary Education from Central Connecticut State University and now shares the "magic of books" with her students every day. Beyond her classroom, Antwanette promotes Social Emotional Learning through her original children's books, *Mindful Mason* and *Empathetic Emma*, which teach empathy, kindness, and resilience. Her work has been featured in Newington Life and highlighted by the Connecticut Education Association for going "the extra mile every day."

### **2026 Connecticut Teacher of the Year**

**Brian Betesh:** Rogers Park Middle School (Danbury)

Superintendent: Dr. Kara Casimiro, Danbury Public Schools

The 2026 Connecticut Teacher of the Year is Brian Betesh, a 6th grade Social Studies teacher at Rogers Park Middle School in Danbury. Brian has been teaching for 18 years and is a proud graduate of Danbury Public Schools who has dedicated his career to giving back to the community that helped shape him.

Brian believes middle school is about more than grades or test scores; it's about creating memorable experiences that inspire students to collaborate, innovate, and lead. This philosophy has guided him in creating several student-driven initiatives. Together with his students, he co-founded Park 21, a club dedicated to improving school culture and elevating the middle school experience for everyone involved. He also co-created SEVEN, a project-based learning class where students design and implement projects that make a real impact on their community.

Brian and his students also created a podcast titled Rogers That! which has recorded over 100 episodes. The podcast connects his students with leaders, professionals, and Rogers Park alumni to explore potential career paths and has helped to build meaningful partnerships with the local community. To further promote creativity and innovation, he also designed and created the ROARcording Studio, a dedicated podcasting and media space, and The Bella Patterson Innovation Lab, named in honor of a former student, to support hands-on, project-based learning experiences at Rogers Park Middle School. As the school's DonorsChoose Ambassador, Brian has supported teachers in securing over \$500,000 in resources for Rogers Park, ensuring students and staff have the tools they need to succeed. Brian's teaching philosophy is simple: every student has the potential to do big things and his role as an educator is ultimately to create opportunities for them to shine.

## **X. Committee Reports**

### **A. Academic Standards and Assessment**

Committee Chair Gilberto reported that the committee met on January 13, 2026, and welcomed new committee member Evan Pitkoff. The meeting focused on two key priorities - Curriculum Teacher Leader Fellowship Program, and industry recognized credentials.

### **B. Accountability and Support**

Committee Chair Benham reported that the committee last met on January 7, 2026, and will next meet on February 4, 2026.

### **C. Finance, Audit, and Budget**

Committee Chair Harris reported that the committee's last quarterly meeting was held on November 18, 2025, and the next meeting will be held on February 24, 2026.

### **D. Legislation and Policy Development**

Committee Chair Burr reported that the committee met on December 3, 2025. The committee reviewed and discussed the 2026 Legislative Proposals, and the CT Educator Preparation and Certification Board (CEPCB) proposed revision of educator certification. She concluded that the committee was meeting today at 1:00 p.m.

**E. Connecticut Technical Education and Career System Board**

Dr. Pritchard reported that she had the opportunity to showcase CTECS on January 12, 2026, at the 4<sup>th</sup> Annual Connecticut Regional Sector Partnership Convening that was hosted by the Office of Workforce Strategy. She highlighted what CTECS is doing around work-based learning.

**F. Connecticut State Colleges and Universities**

Dr. Maduko reported on CSCU's CT Automatic Admissions Program (CAAP). He highlighted the ways the CAAP Program simplifies the enrollment process for participating institutions of higher education. He concluded that since December, there has been an increase of 3,700 applications.

**G. NASBE**

Vice Chair Benham thanked Ms. Record, Dr. Carlson, and Dr. Labas for attending NASBE Zoom calls. She reported that NASBE is very interested in the work in CT and is looking at how CT started the AI Pilot Program. Ms. Record shared that she and Dr. Labas, and Ms. Gilberto, have been part of the NASBE CurriculumHQ Action Group that focuses on high-quality instructional materials (HQIM). She concluded that the next steps are to find ways that NASBE can highlight HQIM.

**G. SERC**

Vice Chair Benham referenced her written report and invited Division Director Bryan Klimkiewicz to present on the partnership with the State Education Resource Center (SERC) under the leadership of Dr. Ingrid Canady.

Mr. Klimkiewicz reported that SERC is a critical partner on the work that that is done on a day-to-day basis supporting our students with disabilities to improve outcomes for students with disabilities across the state. He highlighted that SERC assists the state with expertise and priorities that are aligned with the State Board of Education Plan.

**V. Report of the Commissioner and Agency Update**

The Commissioner noted that her written report was in the Board's Supplemental Folders.

The Commissioner referenced the one-page that summarized the core strategic priorities of the Board's Five-Year Comprehensive Plan, *Every Student Prepared for Learning, Life, and Work Beyond School*. She highlighted that activities are laid out under the relevant Board strategic priorities.

The Commissioner highlighted the following:

- Aspiring Educators Scholarship Program applications now open for Spring 2026 for students interested in a career in education.
- Convened the Commissioner's Roundtable for Family and Community Engagement.
- The CSDE launched a 2026 family literacy celebration.
- Delivered remarks at the Governor's Prevention Partnership School-Based Mentoring Conference, The Power of Connection: Mentoring for Engagement, Academic Success, & Workforce Readiness.
- In partnership with Rock and Roll Hall of Famer Stevie Van Zandt's TeachRock, the CSDE launched a new high school elective, An American History of Rock and Soul.
  - Chief Academic Officer Irene Parisi presented on "Course in a Box," in partnership with TeachRock.

- Chief Academic Officer Irene Parisi reported on Career and Technical Student Organizations (CTSOs).

### **Data Dashboards Update – Earnings of CT Graduates and Relation to Board Priority**

Chief Performance Officer Ajit Gopalakrishnan reported that we have updated the data with a couple of additions. Postsecondary Labor Market Outcomes is an available dashboard that gives the outcomes of high school graduates from 2007 through 2019.

### **Update on Hartford Public Schools Fiscal Operations**

Chief Strategic Planning Officer Keith Norton presented to the Board. He highlighted that at the December 3, 2025, SBE meeting, the Board was updated on HPS's actions to address the 61 recommendations derived from the March 2025, Public Works Fiscal Services Review Executive Summary of the Final Report, and the May 2025, New Solutions K-12 Review Executive Summary of the Final Findings Report.

Mr. Norton reported that the agency's Accountability and Support Team has updated the list of recommendations to include 3 additional recommendations derived from the November 5, 2025, Financial Analysis of Hartford Magnet School Operations, authored by CSDE's Office of Internal Audit in collaboration with the CSDE's Legal Office.

### **Actions to Address Fiscal and Grants Management**

He reported that Recommendations 1-46 were derived from the Public Works report on financial operations.

### **Special Education**

He reported that Recommendations 47-61 were derived from the New Solutions K12 report on Special Education delivery services.

### **Magnet Funding**

He reported that Recommendations 62-64 were derived from Magnet utilization report.

Board members engaged in discussion.

### **Update Bridgeport Public Schools – Action to Address District Needs**

Deputy Commissioner Charles Hewes presented to the Board. He reported that there has been significant focus on support for financial and human resources procedural development with the district.

### **Financial and Human Resources Improvement**

He reported that in December 2025, the Technical Assistance Team and Public Works supported BPS to:

- develop an Annual Budget Calendar
- work on the procedural components of financial and human resource systems within the district
- work on the superintendent's 2026-2027 proposed budget
- assist the district with building the structures necessary to respond to the Forensic Audit

### **Facilities and Maintenance**

The BBE approved the Building Operations Five Year (FY27-31) Capital Plan.

Board Governance/Oversight Improvement

The readiness of the BBE to initiate a search for a superintendent is dependent upon how the BBE will operate and function as a governing agency.

Board members engaged in discussion.

**B. Connecticut State Department of Education Special Education Systems Review: WestEd Final Report**

Commissioner Russell-Tucker provided an introduction and noted that there were 94,174 PreK-12 students who are identified as students with disabilities in Connecticut. She reported that having heard the concerns of stakeholders, the CSDE initiated, launched and engaged WestEd to conduct a comprehensive, independent evaluation of the Department's special education infrastructure, processes, support, and accountability systems.

The Commissioner stated that "this was us looking at ourselves internally" to uncover and know where the challenges were. She then provided an introduction of the WestEd team to present the final report.

Rorie Fitzpatrick, Vice President, Center for Education Systems, WestEd, and Sarah Barzee, Senior Director, State Education Services, WestEd, provided a comprehensive overview of their final report related to research, findings and recommendations.

Board members engaged in discussion.
