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**Strengthening Connecticut's Educator Pipeline:  
Proposed Amendments to the Aspiring Educators Scholarship Program Legislative Language**

**Increasing candidate financial support, sustaining program resources, and maximizing state investment in educator preparation and certification**

**Introduction:**

Consistent with the Connecticut Educator Preparation and Certification Board's statutory responsibility to advise on educator preparation and certification policy, this proposal is submitted for the Board's consideration and recommendation to the State Board of Education.

The Connecticut Educator Preparation and Certification Board recommends consideration of targeted amendments to Section 10-156ii of the Connecticut General Statutes governing the Aspiring Educators Scholarship Program. The proposed revisions are intended to strengthen Connecticut's investment in educator recruitment and preparation by increasing the maximum annual scholarship award from \$10,000 to \$15,000, retaining scholarship repayment funds within the program, and establishing options for the use of unexpended appropriations after all scholarship obligations have been satisfied.

These recommendations preserve the original legislative intent of supporting aspiring educators while improving the state's ability to maximize appropriated funds to address educator workforce needs. The proposal presents three policy options for the Board's consideration, each representing a different level of statutory flexibility while maintaining the scholarship program as the primary funding priority and ensuring that any remaining appropriated funds continue to support Connecticut's educator pipeline.

**Rationale for Adopting this Proposal:**

Connecticut has made a significant annual investment in the Aspiring Educators Scholarship Program to strengthen the educator workforce and increase access to the teaching profession for candidates from underrepresented populations. While the program has provided valuable financial assistance to eligible candidates, annual appropriations have consistently exceeded program utilization, resulting in substantial unexpended balances that revert to the General Fund rather than continuing to support educator workforce development.

The proposed amendments seek to improve the efficiency and long-term impact of this investment while maintaining the Legislature's original intent. Increasing the maximum scholarship award from \$10,000 to \$15,000 reflects the rising cost of higher education and educator preparation programs and may improve the program's attractiveness to prospective teacher candidates.

The proposal also recommends that scholarship repayment funds remain within the Aspiring Educators Scholarship Program to create a sustainable source of future financial assistance for educator candidates.

Three policy options are presented for the Board's consideration, each reflecting a different level of statutory flexibility while preserving the Legislature's original intent that the Aspiring Educators Scholarship Program remain the primary use of appropriated funds. These options provide the Board an opportunity to consider the appropriate balance between statutory specificity and administrative flexibility before making a recommendation to the State Board of Education.

Collectively, the options recommend that, after all scholarship obligations have been satisfied, any remaining appropriated funds continue to support Connecticut's educator pipeline through initiatives such as financial assistance for candidates completing required clinical experiences, educator residency opportunities, certification-related expenses, or other educator workforce development initiatives. By allowing appropriated funds to remain dedicated to educator recruitment, preparation, certification, and entry into the profession, the proposal seeks to maximize the state's investment while preserving the scholarship program as its primary purpose.

By ensuring that appropriated and repaid funds remain dedicated to educator recruitment and preparation, the proposal seeks to maximize the state's investment in developing and retaining highly qualified educators for Connecticut's schools.

### **Attachment(s)**

Section 10-156ii of the general statutes is repealed and the following is substituted in lieu thereof (Effective July 1, 2027):

- (a) There is established an aspiring educators scholarship program administered by the Department of Education. The program shall provide an annual scholarship to aspiring educators who
  - (1) graduated from a public high school in this state, and
  - (2) are enrolled in a teacher preparation program at any four-year institution of higher education.An aspiring educator may receive an annual scholarship in an amount up to [ten] **fifteen** thousand dollars for each year such aspiring educator is enrolled and in good standing in a teacher preparation program. As used in this section, "aspiring educator" means an individual who is in a population subgroup that is underrepresented in the teaching profession in this state and for which such population subgroup has been identified as a teacher shortage area by the Commissioner of Education pursuant to section 10-8b, as amended by this act.
- (b) Not later than January 1, 2027, the department shall, in consultation with the chairpersons of the joint standing committee of the General Assembly having cognizance of matters relating to education, develop a policy concerning the administration of the scholarship. Such policy shall include, but need not be limited to, provisions regarding
  - (1) any additional eligibility criteria,

- (2) payment and distribution of the scholarships to aspiring educators through the teacher preparation programs in which they are enrolled, and
- (3) the notification of students in high school of the scholarship program, including the opportunity to apply for a scholarship under the program while enrolled in high school and prior to graduation if such student will be enrolled in a teacher preparation program during the following fall semester at a four-year institution of higher education,
- (4) procedures governing the use of any unexpended funds pursuant to subsection (e).

(c) For the fiscal year ending June 30, 2027, and each fiscal year thereafter, the department shall annually award scholarships in accordance with the provisions of this section and the guidelines developed pursuant to subsection (b) of this section.

(d) The Commissioner of Education shall develop scholarship repayment criteria for recipients who are not employed as a certified teacher by a local or regional board of education in this state following graduation from a teacher preparation program. Any amounts repaid to the department shall be [deposited in the General Fund] credited to the appropriation for the Aspiring Educators Scholarship Program and shall be used for the purposes of this section.

~~[(e) For the fiscal year ending June 30, 2026, the commissioner shall determine if there are any unexpended funds appropriated for purposes of this section for the fiscal year. If the commissioner determines that there are unexpended funds in said fiscal year, the commissioner shall transfer, not later than July 15, 2026, through a memorandum of understanding with the Comptroller, up to three hundred thousand dollars of such unexpended funds for the purpose of expanding the subsidy program, established pursuant to section 203 of public act 23- 204, as amended by section 124 of public act 24-81 and this act, to include paraeducators who are employed by a charter school in the fiscal year ending June 30, 2027.]~~

#### **Amendment Options:**

- 1) Closely aligned with the original intent
  - Annual instead of one-time.
  - Keeps the money in educator preparation.
  - Gives the Commissioner flexibility to establish eligibility through policy rather than statute.

(e) For the fiscal year ending June 30, 2027, and each fiscal year thereafter, the commissioner shall determine whether there are any unexpended funds appropriated for the purposes of this section. If the commissioner determines that unexpended funds remain after all scholarship obligations under this section have been satisfied, the commissioner may, not later than July fifteenth of such fiscal year, use such unexpended funds to provide grants to students enrolled in the required full-time clinical experience, including the student teaching semester of an approved educator preparation program in this state, in accordance with guidelines developed by the commissioner in consultation with the Connecticut Educator Preparation and Certification Board.

- 2) Creates Priorities
  - Allows room to adapt without another statutory change

(e) For the fiscal year ending June 30, 2027, and each fiscal year thereafter, the commissioner shall determine whether there are any unexpended funds appropriated for the purposes of this section. If the commissioner determines that unexpended funds remain after all scholarship obligations under this section have been satisfied, the commissioner may, not later than July fifteenth of such fiscal year, use such funds to further the recruitment and preparation of educators in this state, including, but not limited to:

(1) grants to students enrolled in the required full-time clinical experience, including the student teaching semester of an approved educator preparation program;

(2) educator residency or apprenticeship stipends;

(3) financial assistance to educator preparation candidates for certification-related costs; and

(4) other educator workforce development initiatives established by the commissioner.

The commissioner shall establish guidelines governing the use of such funds, in consultation with the Connecticut Educator Preparation and Certification Board, pursuant to subsection (b) of this section.

3) Instead of listing programs, establish a policy principle.

(e) For the fiscal year ending June 30, 2027, and each fiscal year thereafter, the commissioner shall determine whether there are any unexpended funds appropriated for the purposes of this section. If the commissioner determines that unexpended funds remain after all scholarship obligations under this section have been satisfied, not later than July fifteenth of such fiscal year, the commissioner may retain and expend such funds for initiatives that advance educator recruitment, preparation, completion, certification, entry, and retention into the teaching profession in this state, including financial assistance for candidates completing the required clinical experience, including the student teaching semester of an approved educator preparation program. The commissioner shall establish guidelines in consultation with the Connecticut Educator Preparation and Certification Board governing the use of such funds.

(f) The department may accept gifts, grants and donations, from any source, public or private, for the aspiring educators scholarship program.

(g) Not later than January 1, 2028, and annually thereafter, the department shall develop a report that includes annual data on the population subgroups of students who receive a scholarship under the program and the teacher preparation program in which they are enrolled. The department shall submit such report to the joint standing committee of the General Assembly having cognizance of matters relating to education, in accordance with the provisions of section 11-4a.
