2. Enhanced Reciprocity



- Educators certified in the following states/districts/territories may follow a streamlined application process
 - Alabama, Delaware, District of Columbia, Georgia, Illinois, Indiana,
 Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, Michigan, New Hampshire, New Jersey,
 New York, North Carolina, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Puerto Rico, Rhode Island,
 South Carolina, Tennessee, Vermont, Virginia, or Wisconsin

 The program began in April 2022 with thirteen states/districts/territories and was expanded to include 10 additional jurisdictions as of March 1, 2024.



3. and 4. NASDTEC – Two Options



Under the NASDTEC Interstate Agreement, to waive specific coursework requirements, Connecticut may accept:

 Successful completion of a state-approved educator preparation program at a regionally accredited college or university from another U.S. state.

OR

• A minimum of 30 months of successful full-time experience under another state's valid educator certificate (at least equivalent to a Connecticut initial educator certificate) that is appropriate to the subject area being requested and completed within 10 years of the date you apply for Connecticut certification.

These must be accompanied by the requisite verification / recommendation.



5. Transcript/Experience



- Educators in approved private or non-public schools in the State of Connecticut can apply for certification based on their experience.
- All applicants must submit an official undergraduate transcript and graduate transcript if available.
- A statement of professional experience using the <u>ED 126</u> form must be completed and signed by the superintendent, executive director, or school administrator verifying your experience.



Data Analysis Notes




- Educators can be endorsed to teach specific areas through more than one pathway.
- Records are limited to one per Educator Identification Number.
- The record with the earliest Certification endorsement is retained.

Observations on Number/Percent Certified Annually by Pathway of First Endorsement




- The number of individuals certified in a given pathway varies from year to year. For example, NASDTEC numbers may vary based on migration patterns while CT EPP numbers may vary based on personal choices, program capacity, program completion, or the COVID pandemic.
- Of the total number of individuals first certified in a given year, the percentage who completed a CT EPP has declined in recent years to below 50%.
- The average number of individuals certified annually based on certification in another state (either NASDTEC or Enhanced Reciprocity) has increased by over 33% from the five years prior to the introduction of enhanced reciprocity (2016-17 to 2020-21) to the three years since (2021-22 to 2023-24).
- Additionally, since the introduction and ongoing expansion of Enhanced Reciprocity states, the number of individuals first certified through NASDTEC has declined significantly because more individuals are able to pursue the streamlined pathway offered by Enhanced Reciprocity.



Number/Percent of Individuals Certified in a Year by Pathway who are Subsequently Employed in Connecticut Public Schools








Percentage of Individuals First Certified by Pathway who are Ever Employed in Connecticut







Observations on Individuals Certified by Pathway Who are Subsequently Employed



- Individuals first certified through a CT EPP are significantly more likely to be employed in Connecticut than through any other pathway. This is not surprising because CT EPP completers experience student teaching and internships in Connecticut public schools and school districts have greater familiarity with graduates from CT EPPs.
- While the number of individuals first certified in Connecticut through interstate agreements/reciprocity has increased significantly, they are subsequently employed in Connecticut at lower rates than those completing CT EPPs. This is likely influenced by a myriad of factors (e.g., family circumstances, cost of living, job opening in certified area, travel distance).
