Governor Lamont Launches State Initiative to Address Student Absenteeism and Disengagement Resulting from the COVID-19 Pandemic

Connecticut's Learner Engagement and Attendance Program (LEAP) Will Utilize Federal Stimulus Funding to Reengage K-12 Students Who Struggled During the Pandemic

(HARTFORD, CT) – Governor Ned Lamont today announced that his administration is launching a new state program aimed at engaging with K-12 students who struggled with absenteeism and disengagement during the 2020-21 school year as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic.

The initiative, known as the Learner Engagement and Attendance Program (LEAP), will include a partnership between the Connecticut State Department of Education (CSDE) and the six state Regional

Selection of LEAP Districts

Five key input variables:

- 1. percent students eligible for free- or reduced-price lunch (FRL);
- 2. student enrollment;
- attendance rate;
- 4. percent English learners (EL); and
- 5. number of weeks of in-person school.

For example, a district with high student enrollment and proportion of FRL and EL students, but low attendance and availability of remote or hybrid instruction, would rank as being high-need for additional investment in student attendance and engagement supports.

Learner Engagement and Attendance Program (LEAP)

To address this issue, Connecticut will direct funding towards the Learner Engagement and Attendance Program (LEAP). This program will have three goals:

- 1. Increase student attendance and engagement, relative to prior months of remote and/or blended learning
- 2. Increase engagement by students and parents/caregivers in remote learning, as measured by needs assessments
- 3. Increase usage/adoption of district and state resources available to K-12 families, including connectivity solutions and supports for emotional well-being.



Regional Network of Support

- 1. Funding provided to six Regional Educational Service Centers (RESCs) to support 15 identified school districts.
- 2. Primary research, including surveys of Connecticut families and school leaders as well as success in other states highlighted the need for "people power."
- 3. Home-visiting model to provide direct support to students and families with low rates of attendance and/or engagement with remote learning.
- 4. RESCs will coordinate with respective districts and local organizations to
 - 1. expand their capacity to address specific student needs, including
 - 2. using devices to log in for remote learning;
 - 3. troubleshooting problems with new broadband services;
 - 4. providing additional academic supports, like tutoring; and
 - 5. connecting students with critical social services needs



A Schoolwide Focus On Engagement





PLAN TOGETHER


- Trauma Task Force- WPS, WPD, DCF, Wellmore (211), Juvenile Probation Team meets weekly to discuss gaps in service provision and plan supports for students with identified needs
- **Local Interagency Service Team (LIST)-** The LIST provides a venue for community-level interagency coordination and formal communication and planning around youth service provision.

- Mental Health CollaborativePartnership with 7 local community behavioral health service providers to plan school-linked and school-based services
- **Wellmore 211 Engagement Pilot-** Use of 211 clinicians to provide additional outreach to disengaged students and families
- **DCF Prevention Workers-** DCF Social worker stationed in schools to provide support for school staff in supporting families and linking families to needed resources.
