I. Call to Order and Introductions

II. Next Generation Accountability System – Presentation and Discussion (Ajit Gopalakrishnan, Chief Performance Officer and Jennifer Leeper, Educational

Consultant from the Connecticut State Department of Education): Chief Performance Officer Gopalakrishnan shared the current 12 indicators of the Next Generation Accountability System. He provided clarification to the committee that Indicator 10 pertains to students enrolling in any two-year or four-year post-secondary institution anywhere in the country one year after graduation. The Connecticut State Department of Education (CSDE) gets information directly from the National Clearinghouse. If a student goes straight to work after graduation that information is not currently in the National Clearinghouse.

Ajit will follow-up with the committee in relationship to "noncredit" manufacturing programs and how they are impacted in the national clearinghouse data and in these measures. Ajit will send the committee chairs information pertaining to the 17 clusters and the courses that the districts code to the cluster. The CSDE respects and acknowledges all pathways in the system. CSDE will consider inclusion of pre-apprenticeship for Indicator 5 and apprenticeship post-graduation for Indicator 10. - **III. Update on Catalog of Programs and Next Steps:** Committee reviewed the catalog of programs. Cliff Thermer will send edited documents to Margaret Van Cott. Committee requested CSDE Commissioner's letter be sent to the following groups: superintendents of schools, boards of education, guidance counselors, career centers, and Career and Technical Education (CTE) administrators. The revised document will be posted to the Manufacturing Website.
- IV. Update on the Analysis of Current Programs and Next Steps: Committee reviewed draft report and submitted edits. Frank Gulluni and John Murphy shared their experiences and drafted actions. A motion was made by Todd Berch to add the state legislative actions to the report as Conclusion 4.0. After discussion, the motion was rescinded and committee agreed to add this as our first agenda item for the next committee meeting.
