Prior Knowledge Demands		Language Features	
Requires some discipline specific knowledge of the Crusading era and the importance of religion/Jerusalem at that time.		Use of many words students would not be familiar with. Creates graphic and illustrative language. It is a speech and it reads like a speech that has been transcribed. Some of the sentences are long and complex.	
Potential Reader/Task Challenges			
Engaging but difficult for 10 th graders to read. Vocabulary could be difficult. Theme is challenging – yet students can relate to fear and passion as motivators for action. Students can connect to the dilemma of fear and the graphic/illustrative nature of the piece draws students in.			
Big Takeaway			
Fear and passion are powerful motivators. People are willing to travel 1000's of miles without the aid of modern transportation to kill people (even children) they don't even know. God and religion are powerful motivators to action.
