Text Description

<u>Dear Mr. Blueberry</u> is a series of letters written between a young girl, Emily, and her teacher, Mr. Blueberry. Emily writes about seeing a whale in her pond and would like information on whales from her teacher. The teacher writes back, explaining why there couldn't be a whale in her pond and includes facts to support his reasons. They exchange letters throughout the summer and through them, Emily learns facts from Mr. Blueberry and he learns to use his imagination from Emily.

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Potential Reader/Task Challenges

This text is intended as a read aloud for younger students. Students will need to know that the book's format is a series of letters. It is also helpful for them to know that parts of the book are real, and parts are make believe. Fiction and non-fiction are interwoven throughout as the teacher tries to convince Emily that she couldn't have a whale in her pond.

Big Takeaway

Readers should notice that the characters express different points of view in their letters. The tone of each letter reflects the imagination of a child or the logic of an adult. Students may also distinguish their own point of view from that of Emily, or Mr. Blueberry. (CCSS L. RL2.6)
