Making the social sciences an important part of the educational process (Some reflections by Ed Dorgan – Social studies Coordinator RSD10, Burlington, CT)

- 1. Add <u>'reading like an historian'</u> and <u>writing like an historian skills</u> into the curriculum so adding students to analyze different sources (realizing the impact of perspectives) on understanding history.
- 2. Adding in <u>historical thinking skills</u> [e.g., cause and effect, change and continuity, turning points in history, through their eyes -differing perspectives, and using the past to better understand the present]
- 3. Developing lessons that <u>use historical fiction and non-fiction sources/materials</u>. Also share (historical) literacy skills with elementary teachers.
- 4. Base learning goals on students <u>developing historical / social studies thinking skills</u>. Thereby, determining benchmarks by course for the skills needed to demonstrate proficiency through the school year.
- 5. Remember to scaffold geographic, economic, and social/cultural skills from elementary through high school.
- 6. Incorporate note-taking and summarizing skills (practice) into the curriculum.
- 7. Promote <u>multiple perspectives</u> to provide a realistic view of historical events (thereby helping students realize that history isn't one-sided).
