I. Welcome and Introductions

II. Introduction to the Commissioner's Roundtable on Family and Community Engagement in Education (Roundtable)

The presentation provided an overview of the purpose of the Roundtable, makeup of its membership and topics addressed to date. The purpose of the Roundtable is to inform the Commissioner regarding policies and programmatic priorities, including:

- Advise the CSDE on issues and policies related to family and community engagement in education.
- Bring an authentic parent and community voice to CSDE products and initiatives.

- Review and make recommendations on implementation of the Connecticut State Board of Education's Five-year (2016-21) Comprehensive Plan regarding school-family-community partnership initiatives.
- Review and recommend effective practices to increase school and district capacity to develop successful partnerships and families' capacity to support their children's education and determine the feasibility of carrying out those practices in Connecticut.

Membership reflects a balanced representation of major constituent groups and Connecticut's geographic, economic, and ethnic/racial diversity.

A variety of topics have been discussed at the Roundtable meetings including:

- Minority teacher recruitment
- New EdSight Data Portal
- Every Student Succeeds Act
- Family Engagement Framework
- Next Generation Accountability System
- Emergent issues in education: students displaced by disasters; standards for students who have been expelled, attendance awareness campaign and immigration matters.

IV. District Stories of Family Engagement: Steps Toward Full and Equal Partnerships

Danbury Public Schools

Anne Mead, Administrator of Early Childhood Education, Extended Learning Programs and Family and Community Engagement

Windsor Public Schools

Russell Sills, Director of School, Family, and Community Partnerships

Dr. Mead and Mr. Sills provided an overview of successful parent engagement models in their communities. Danbury Public Schools created a welcoming Family & Community Engagement (FACE) Center to centralize a number of programs and services for families. The center houses a range of programs including central school registration, Free and Reduced Lunch application, the Danbury Family Learning Center, play groups, and before and after school programs. The center strives to develop trust with all families; stress the important of early educating and attendance; engage parents as partners; and serve as a one-stop information and referral hub for families. Dr. Mead provided a virtual "walk-through" of the Family & Community Engagement Center.

Windsor Public Schools implemented the Parent Teacher Home Visit Project to build powerful family/school partnerships with the goal of increasing student outcomes through improved family partnerships. Training was provided by the National Parent Teacher Home Visit Program (www.pthvp.org) and funding was provided by the Hartford Foundation for Public Giving. In 2016-17, 111 home visits were conducted and 150 home visits are expected to be completed in the current school year. Outcomes include:

- 100% of parents and teachers said they would recommend home visits to peers;
- 95% of parents indicated they had a better relationship with their child's teacher as a result of the visit; and
- 81.8% of teacher indicated they see improvement in the student's academic and/or behavioral performance after the home visit.

IV. Connecticut Blueprint/Framework for High-impact Family Engagement

Dr. Carson and Ms. Johnson provided an overview of "The Framework Project," a project of the Connecticut State Department of Education, Office of Early Childhood, and the Early Childhood Funders Collaborative (a project of the Connecticut Council for Philanthropy). The objectives are to:

- co-create a clear, useful definition of *high-impact* family and community engagement in children's learning and development;
- co-develop a Framework for using the definition that includes core values, effective strategy examples, and user-friendly tools; and
- co-promote the definition's integration into policy and practice across the state.

The proposed Framework was shared with the group and is being reviewed by the Commissioner's of Education and Early Childhood for approval.

A roundtable discussion was conducted and provided an update for members on the work of the participating agencies on behalf of children and families.
