SUBJECT:	Operational Memorandum No. 12-19 Federal Meal Reimbursement Rates for School Year (SY) July 1, 2019 – June 30, 2020

This operational memorandum summarizes the annual adjustments to the federal reimbursement rates to local educational agencies (LEAs) for lunches, breakfasts, afterschool snacks, and milks served to children participating in the National School Lunch Program (NSLP), School Breakfast Program (SBP), Afterschool Snack Program (ASP), and Special Milk Program (SMP). This memorandum also includes the NSLP reimbursement rate for USDA donated foods for SY 2019-20. As published in the Federal Register (FR) (84 FR 38590 and 84 FR 39796), the SY 2019-20 federal meal reimbursement rates are listed below.

Effective SY 2019-20 NSLP Rate for USDA Foods
Rate: \$.3625
The published per meal rate from the Federal Register is .2375 cents. This is an increase of one quarter of a cent per meal from last year. For the NSLP, the per meal rate (.2375 cents) plus the 12% provision dollars and the 20 million breakfast dollars make the effective SY 20 NSLP rate 36.25 cents.

In addition to the rates above, LEAs certified as meeting the meal pattern and nutrition standard requirements set forth in 7 CFR parts 210 and 220 are eligible to receive performance-based cash assistance for each reimbursable lunch served in the amount of **7 cents per lunch** effective July 1, 2019. This is an increase of 1 cent per lunch over prior years.

As a reminder, LEAs must set reduced-price charges for lunches, breakfasts, and afterschool snacks at or below the maximum reduced-price allowed by regulations. **These rates cannot exceed 40 cents per lunch, 30 cents per breakfast, and 15 cents for afterschool snacks**.
