Updated CSDE Resources on Federal and State Requirements for Competitive Foods

The chart below summarizes recently updated CSDE resources that address the federal and state laws for selling and giving competitive foods to students in Connecticut public schools. Competitive foods are foods and beverages available for sale to students on school premises separately from reimbursable meals through the USDA's Child Nutrition Programs. Please discard any previous documents dated prior to **August or September 2022** and replace with the updated versions.

Note: The federal and state laws for competitive foods apply differently to public schools that choose the healthy food option of Healthy Food Certification (HFC) under Section 10-215f of the Connecticut General Statutes (C.G.S.), non-HFC public schools, and private schools and residential child care institutions (RCCIs). Reminder: USDA Foods Update on Inventory from School Year 2021-22

As the USDA continues to experience supply chain issues with procuring USDA Foods, the CSDE and HPC stored remaining USDA Foods from last school year over the summer. Some foods that were close to their expiration dates were donated over the summer. Therefore, not all allocations will be available for ordering. Recipient Agencies will have one final chance to order any remaining inventory on their first USDA Foods Order date.

All HPC allocation reports will contain products from last year and new school year 2022-23. All remaining allocations from school year 2021-22 must be ordered by the end of September. Remaining inventory that is not ordered by the end of September will be added to the "Excess USDA Foods" ordering form or donated locally.

Resource Roundup: Considerations for Implementing Web-based Applications

As districts adopt more sophisticated application certification systems, local educational agencies (LEAs) must have measures in place to ensure that a computerized application for free and reducedprice meals or free milk (i.e., a web-based application) and supporting materials comply with the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) regulations. This includes ensuring that non-required information (such as date of birth, school, grade, and student ID) do not block the parent or guardian from completing the application if they choose not to complete these specific areas. September is National Food Safety Education Month

The Food and Drug Administration's (FDA) National Food Safety Education Month (NFSEM) provides 30 days for health educators at the national, state, and local levels to focus attention on the fundamentals of buying, storing, preparing, and serving food as safely as possible. This year, FDA's NFSEM program is refocusing on the four basic messages of food safety at home: clean; separate, don't cross-contaminate; cook; and chill.

FDA offers <u>NFSEM resources</u> all year round for consumers and educators on a variety of subjects, including learning who is most at risk for foodborne illnesses and how to avoid food waste while maintaining food safety.
