

# Important Reminder: Updating the School Year (SY) 2022-23 Sponsor Agreement for School Nutrition Programs

The school year 2022-23 Sponsor Agreements must be completed and submitted by **Friday**, **September 16**, **2022**. For more information, please refer to <u>School Lunch Tray from August 31</u>, 2022.

**Note:** National School Lunch Program, School Breakfast Program, Afterschool Snack Program, and Special Milk Program claims for July and/or August **cannot** be entered or submitted without an approved agreement.

Applications that have been submitted and are ready for approval will have a **Packet Submitted Date** and will show "**The Application Packet is currently under review by the State and is unavailable for changes**" on the 2022-23 Application Packet dashboard. The school nutrition programs staff urge SFAs to review the <u>Updating the School Year 2022-2023 Sponsor Agreement for School Nutrition Programs</u> to troubleshoot application issues before contacting their county consultant.

### New CSDE Training Program: Complying with Healthy Food Certification (HFC)

The CSDE is pleased to announce a new training program for HFC public schools, **Complying with Healthy Food Certification**. This training program is a series of recorded modules that provide guidance on how to meet the requirements for HFC under Section 10-215f of the Connecticut General Statutes and the related state laws for competitive foods in schools.

- Module 1: Introduction to Training and Healthy Food Certification (HFC)
- Module 2: HFC Requirements
- Module 3: Connecticut Nutrition Standards (CNS)
- Module 4: Evaluating Foods for CNS Compliance
- Module 5: Laws for Foods and Beverages in HFC Schools
- Module 6: Fundraisers

This training program is required for the district's designated HFC contact person and is strongly recommended for all individuals who coordinate sales of competitive foods to students on school premises. ### Distribution of Pandemic EBT Food Benefits to More Than 71,650 Schoolchildren

Special food assistance benefits under the <u>Pandemic EBT (P-EBT) program</u> were distributed last week to more than 71,650 schoolchildren who are clients of the Department of Social Services (DSS) and who qualified for P-EBT benefits during the 2021-22 school year. Over \$3.4 million in benefits were provided statewide, with an average benefit of \$49.50 per student.

This is the first distribution of the larger \$118.1 million in food benefits going to over 287,000 schoolchildren in Connecticut covering the 2021-22 school year and subsequent summer period through the federal P-EBT program. Specifically:

- On August 29, DSS began depositing P-EBT benefits onto the existing electronic benefit
  transfer (EBT) cards to households of over 71,650 schoolchildren currently enrolled in the
  Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP); Temporary Family Assistance (TFA); or
  HUSKY Health/Medicaid Programs EBT cards were issued to households that have not
  previously received an EBT card from DSS. The EBT card will arrive with instructions on how
  to activate them and access the food benefits.
- This current distribution does not include children who attended a school participating in the Community Eligibility Provision, in which all children receive free meals. Those benefits are expected to be distributed to non-DSS clients beginning on a date in mid-September to be announced.
- Households will see a single benefit deposit covering the entire 2021-22 school year. A separate benefit deposit covering the summer period is expected later this year.
- Benefits will differ from student to student and depend on the learning model due to COVID 19 the student was in each month of the 2021-22 school year
- The average benefit amount in this distribution is \$45.90 per student.
- Households that believe the student's information may have been incorrectly reported should
  contact the student's school and request for the school to review the student information
  submitted to the CSDE for the 2021-22 school year. If the school determines that an error in
  reporting was made, the school may contact the CSDE with a formal request to reconsider the
  benefits determination.

The Pandemic EBT benefits are administered in Connecticut by DSS, in cooperation with the Department of Education. Federal support is provided by the Department of Agriculture's Food and

The CSDE <u>Calendar for Completing Verification</u> summarizes the tasks and completion dates required for Connecticut school nutrition programs to comply with the USDA verification requirements. The CSDE's verification forms are updated annually in August/September and are available on the CSDE's <u>Verification Procedures for School Nutrition Programs</u> webpage. As a reminder, the formal verification process begins on October 1.

#### USDA Webinar: Supply Chain Assistance Best Practices, September 26, 2022

On December 17, 2021, the USDA Food and Nutrition Service (FNS) provided \$1 billion in relief funds through the Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC), authorized under the CCC Charter Act [15 U.S.C. 714]. On July 31, 2022, FNS allocated an additional \$943 million through the CCC. This webinar will be an opportunity to hear best practices on how these funds have been used to enhance local school districts' ability to purchase foods for school meals.
