## **SMART Funds Next Steps**

As a reminder, the SMART funds remaining balance **cannot** be used on equipment. Please review the information below regarding the next steps for SMART funds.

**Note:** The next steps below do **not** apply to school food authorities (SFAs) that have submitted the <u>Notice to Conclude</u> and will be using partial SMART funds and funds from the nonprofit school foodservice account (NSFSA) to extend the serving student meals at no cost for the entire month. Please disregard.

### The next steps below apply to SFAs that meet either of the following conditions:

- The SFA has submitted the Notice to Conclude and the submitted <u>Projection Calculator</u> indicates that the SFA will have a remaining balance after the Conclusion Date listed in the Notice to Conclude; or
- The SFA **has not submitted** the Notice to Conclude.

### **Next Steps**

- Continue to evaluate SMART funds for your district/school and submit the <u>Notice to Conclude</u> as applicable.
- All SMART funds must be used to support meals free of charge for students. Therefore, please note the following choices and select one of the following options that is best for your district/school.
  - 1. The SFA may continue to offer meals free of charge to students with their remaining SMART funds balance for a partial month and if the SFA has excess funds (more than three-months operating costs), the SFA may use excess funds from the SFA's NSFSA or other allowable funds (donations, general fund, etc.) to continue the meals free of charge for students for the remainder of the month. If the SFA decides to take this course of action, the SFA will need to submit a Notice to Conclude listing the last day of the month that partial SMART Funds will be used and funds form the NSFSA will be used.
  - 2. The SFA may continue to offer meals free of charge to students with their remaining SMART funds balance for a partial month ending free meals on the day after the SMART funds run out. If the SFA decides to take this course of action, the SFA will need to submit the <a href="SMART Funds Remaining Balance Calculator">SMART Funds Remaining Balance Calculator</a> after the SMART funds run out to document the days the SFA uses the SMART funds. The CSDE will pay the remaining balance after the Remaining Balance Calculator is submitted. The Notice to Conclude must list the last day of the final full month that the SFA will pay the household share for reduced-price and paid school meals using monthly SMART funds reimbursement.

3. If the SFA determines that they do not wish to use the remaining SMART funds balance identified in the Projection Calculator after the conclusion date listed on the Notice to Conclude, these funds will be forfeited.


# USDA Webinar Recording Available: Supply Chain Assistance (SCA) Best Practices for State Agencies and School Food Authorities

# Food and Drug Administration (FDA) Issues Guidance on Food Allergen Labeling Requirements

On November 29, 2022, the FDA issued two guidance documents about food allergen labeling requirements to help the food industry meet the requirements to list any major food allergen on the labels of FDA-regulated foods. These documents include draft and final guidance. This webpage includes information on how to submit comments on the draft guidance.

**Note:** The <u>Food Allergen Labeling and Consumer Protection Act (FALCPA) of 2004</u> identified eight foods as major food allergens: milk, eggs, fish, shellfish, tree nuts, peanuts, wheat, and soybeans. The <u>Food Allergy Safety, Treatment, Education, and Research Act of 2021 (FASTER Act)</u> adds sesame to the list of major food allergens effective January 1, 2023, which will make it the ninth major food allergen recognized in the U.S. For more information, visit the FDA's <u>Food Allergies</u> webpage.

### Promote Physical Activity and Healthy Eating with New Move Your Way Resources

The U.S Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) Office of Disease Prevention and Health Promotion developed the <a href="Move Your Way@campaign">Move Your Way@campaign</a> in 2018 to share key recommendations from the <a href="Second edition of the Physical Activity Guidelines for Americans.">Move Your Way resources</a> for consumers that highlight simple steps people can take to get active and eat healthy.
