Action Items

School Meals Assistance Revenue for Transition (SMART) Funds 2.0 Opt-in Survey Due February 24, 2023

Pursuant to House Bill (HB) 6671, an additional \$60 million of federal American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds was allocated to the Connecticut State Department of Education (CSDE) for the Free School Meals for Children grant, which is referred to as SMART funds 2.0. Beginning March 1, 2023, the additional funding will allow eligible school food authorities (SFAs) operating the NSLP and SBP to offer meals at no cost to students for the remainder of school year (SY) 2022-23.

SFAs electing to receive these funds must notify the CSDE of their intent to accept these funds by completing the <u>SMART Funds 2.0 Opt-In Survey</u> by **February 24, 2023**. Please refer to <u>Operational Memorandum No. 06-23</u>: School Meals Assistance Revenue for Transition (SMART) Funds 2.0 for important information. Revised Link for USDA's Form AD-3027: USDA Program Discrimination Complaint Form

On May 5, 2022, the USDA Food and Nutrition Service's (FNS) Civil Rights Division issued a memorandum informing FNS program recipients that the prohibition of discrimination based on sex in Title IX and the Food and Nutrition Act includes gender identity and sexual orientation. The changes impacted the USDA nondiscrimination statement (NDS) and the And Justice for All (AJFA) posters. For more information, refer to "Revised USDA Nondiscrimination Statement and "And Justice for All" Posters" in the School Lunch Tray from July 6, 2022.

- The USDA's 2022 nondiscrimination statement (NDS) includes a link to <u>Form AD-3027</u>, <u>USDA Program Discrimination Complaint Form</u>. The USDA has updated this link. The previous content of the 2022 USDA NDS remains unchanged.
- The complete USDA NDS including the updated link is available on the CSDE's Nondiscrimination Statements webpage. The USDA NDS statement is available in Spanish and many other languages on the USDA FNS Nondiscrimination Statement webpage.
- The CSDE reminds school food authorities (SFAs) that all documents, pamphlets, websites, and similar materials should be updated with the 2022 USDA NDS, including the correct link for Form AD-3027.

The CSDE is working to update the USDA NDS on all CSDE publications and resources for Child Nutrition Programs.

Where to Find USDA Foods in Schools Product Information

The USDA has four main resources to help schools find information about USDA Foods.

1. The <u>USDA Foods Available List</u> is updated each year in December/January and includes every food item available for purchase for the following school year. This list contains basic information such as the Web-Based Supply Chain Management (WBSCM) material code and description, food group where the food item belongs, form (i.e., canned, frozen, dried, fresh), pack size, and if the material is a whole grain or has a commercial Kosher certification.

- 2. The <u>USDA Foods in Schools Product Information Sheets</u> are organized by food group and can be identified by their USDA Foods Description and WBSCM material code. These are useful for menu planning as they provide a more detailed product description, crediting and nutrition information, case yield, and culinary tips and recipes. The Product Information Sheets are more detailed than the USDA Foods Available List, but less detailed and technical than the product specification. *The Product Information Sheets are expected to be phased out by December 2023 and replaced by the USDA Foods Database*.
- 3. <u>Product Specifications</u> can be found on the Agricultural Marketing Service (AMS) website. Products can be searched by food type (e.g., fruits, vegetables, eggs, chicken, dairy) and form. Each product specification contains detailed information such as defined serving sizes, limits on specific nutrients, ingredients that are included or restricted, which commercial kosher certifications a product may have, or if a product is raw or cooked.
- 4. The <u>USDA Foods Database</u> provides access to vendor-specific nutrition, allergen, and ingredient information for direct delivered USDA Foods for Child Nutrition Programs. Products can be searched by food category and WBSCM material code. The USDA Foods Database has similar information to the Product Information Sheets but also includes nutrient, allergen, ingredient, and certification information unique to each vendor that supplies a particular USDA Foods product. *The USDA Foods Database will replace the Product Information Sheets when they are phased out*.

New capabilities for director and manager users are now available on the USDA's Professional
Standards Training Tracker Tool (PSTTT). The "View Employee List" and "Search Employees" pages under the "Employees" menu are now one page. The "View Employees" page which has a search function, now has the option to hide inactive employees from view. Users have the capability to filter the list of employees by school year and assigned school. The option to hide inactive employees is also available on the "Log Training" page.
