Operational Memorandum No. 06-24: Interschool Agreements for School Year 2024-25: Due July 1, 2024 (Full Service) or August 30, 2024 (Vended)

<u>Operational Memorandum No. 06-24: Interschool Agreements for School Year 2024-24</u> is now available on the CSDE's <u>School Nutrition Operational Memos 2024</u> webpage. Sponsors that sell USDA meals or Afterschool Snack Program (ASP) snacks to another district or school during school year 2024-25 must complete and submit an interschool agreement to the CSDE.

- The **Full-service Interschool Agreement form** must be submitted to the CSDE by **July 1**, **2024**.
- The **Recipient Site Vended Interschool Agreements** must be submitted to the CSDE at least two weeks before the start of the school year, but no later than **August 30, 2024**.

Operational Memorandum No. 07-24: Process for Submitting the HFC Statement for School Year 2024-25: Due July 1, 2024


Section 10-215f of the Connecticut General Statutes requires that each local board of education or governing authority (BOE) for all Connecticut public school districts participating in the National School Lunch Program (NSLP) must **take action annually** to certify whether all food items sold to students will or will not meet the Connecticut Nutrition Standards. This includes all public schools, regional educational service centers, the Connecticut Technical Education and Career System (CTECS), charter schools, interdistrict magnet schools, and endowed academies.

<u>Operational Memorandum No. 07-24: Requirements for Submitting the HFC Statement for School</u> <u>Year 2024-24</u> is now available on the CSDE's <u>School Nutrition Operational Memos 2024</u> webpage. This memo provides the required motion language and summarizes the **steps that districts must take now** to ensure the accurate and timely submission of the 2024-25 HFC Statement by the deadline of **July 1, 2024**.

- All BOEs must vote on whether to participate in the healthy food option of HFC.
- If the BOE votes "yes" to the healthy food option, a vote on whether to allow **food exemptions** is required. The BOE may also choose to vote on whether to allow **beverage exemptions**.
- If the BOE votes "no" to the healthy food option, a vote on whether to allow food exemptions is not required. The BOE may choose to vote on whether to allow **beverage exemptions**.

The chart below summarizes the BOE votes. The CSDE's 21-minute video, *Completing the Application Process for HFC*, provides detailed guidance on the HFC application process.

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* Beverage exemptions are defined by a separate statute (C.G.S. Section 10-221q) and are not part of the annual HFC Statement. BOEs may choose whether to allow beverage exemptions. If the BOE does not vote to allow beverage exemptions, noncompliant beverages cannot be sold to students on school premises at any time.

Need to Know

USDA Resource: Child Nutrition (CN) Labeling Manual

The USDA's <u>Child Nutrition (CN) Labeling Manual</u> provides food manufacturers with instructions on how to apply for and obtain approval for a CN label. It also contains instructions for calculating the contribution that meats, meat alternates, poultry, and seafood products make toward the meal pattern requirements for Child Nutrition Programs (CNP). CN labels are approved by USDA and provide a way for a manufacturer to demonstrate how a processed food product contributes to the meal pattern requirements in CNP. Additional CN label-related resources for food manufacturers and CNP operators (including policy guidance and technical assistance) are available on the USDA's <u>CN Labeling Program</u> website.

Resource Roundup: Using Product Formulation Statements in the School Nutrition Programs

School food authorities (SFAs) must be able to document the crediting information for commercially prepared foods that are processed or contain added ingredients, such as deli meats, pizza, chicken nuggets, hummus, coleslaw, and smoothies. A product formulation statement (PFS) is required for all commercial processed products that do not have a CN label. A PFS is a document developed by manufacturers that provides specific information about how a product credits toward the USDA meal patterns for Child Nutrition Programs. It generally includes a detailed explanation of what the product contains and indicates the amount of each ingredient in the product by weight.

Commercial processed products without a CN label or PFS cannot credit in the school nutrition programs. For detailed guidance on the PFS requirements, refer to the CSDE's resource, <u>Using</u> <u>Product Formulation Statements in the School Nutrition Programs</u>.
