### **Updated CSDE Resource: Guide to Menu Documentation for the School Nutrition Programs**

In September 2024, the CSDE released the *Guide to Menu Documentation for the National School Lunch Program and School Breakfast Program Meal Patterns for Grades K-12*, as part of the updated menu planning guidance series for the school nutrition program meal patterns for grades K-12.

The meal documentation requirements are the same for all school nutrition programs and age/grade groups. Instead of having separate menu documentation guides for preschool and grades K-12, this guide now also includes the requirements for the NSLP, SBP, and ASP preschool meal patterns and the ASP meal pattern for grades K-12. The updated guide is renamed the <u>Guide to Menu</u> <u>Documentation for the School Nutrition Programs</u> and is available on the CSDE's webpages below.

Updated CSDE Resource: Calculation Methods for Grain Ounce Equivalents for the Preschool Meal Patterns of the School Nutrition Programs

The CSDE's <u>Calculation Methods for Grain Ounce Equivalents for the Preschool Meal Patterns of the School Nutrition Programs</u> is updated to delete the reference to grain-based desserts in the paragraph below, which is located on page 4. Grain-based desserts do not credit in the preschool meal patterns.

• **Groups A-E** (baked goods) include foods like crackers, breads, rolls, taco shells, muffins, waffles, and pancakes, and grain-based desserts, e.g., cookies, cake, granola bars, and pastries. The amount of a food that provides 1 oz eq varies from 22 grams (0.8 ounce) for foods in group A to 69 grams (2.4 ounces) for foods in group E.

### Resource Roundup: Using the USDA's Food Buying Guide for Child Nutrition Programs

If food service staff are experiencing challenges with using the Food Buying Guide for Child Nutrition Programs (FBG), consider incorporating the USDA's FBG webinars into staff training sessions. The USDA has five modules that cover all areas of using this tool, including an overview of the FBG, the FBG Recipe Analysis Workbook (RAW), Product Formulation Statements, the Exhibit A Grains Tool, and the FBG Calculator. The training modules are in the "Training Modules" section of the USDA FBG website. These trainings also count toward the professional standards requirements for food service staff.
