# Correction to Nondiscrimination Statement in CSDE's Medical Statement for Meal Modifications in the School Nutrition Programs

The nondiscrimination statement in the September 2024 English version of the Medical Statement for Meal Modifications in the School Nutrition Programs was incorrect. The correct version has been added and the updated form (dated November 2024) is available in the "Medical Statements for School Nutrition Programs" section of the CSDE's Special Diets in School Nutrition Programs webpage.

### **Grant Applications Open for 2025 Patrick Leahy Farm to School Program**

The USDA continues its support for local foods in schools by opening applications for the <u>2025 Patrick</u> <u>Leahy Farm to School Grants</u>. For the first time, USDA is allowing organizations to select the type of Farm to School Grant that best fits their needs by offering three different requests for applications. Each organization can only submit one application for one grant:

- The <u>Implementation Grant</u> (\$50,000 to \$500,000) supports the establishment or expansion of comprehensive farm to school projects.
- The <u>State Agency Grant</u> (\$50,000 to \$500,000) helps state-level agencies implement local sourcing and agricultural education activities.
- The <u>Turnkey Grant</u> (\$5,000 to \$50,000) is for organizations interested in projects related to launching or enhancing farm to school activities; agricultural education; or edible gardens.

Applications are due by **January 10, 2025**.

### Resource Roundup: Menu Planning Checklists for Lunch for Grades K-12

Updated versions of the CSDE's <u>Menu Planning Checklists for Lunch for Grades K-12</u> are available for school year 2024-25. These checklists assist school food authorities with planning menus to meet the National School Lunch Program (NSLP) meal patterns. Checklists are available for five-day and seven-day weeks for grades K-5, 6-8, 9-12, and the optional grade group for K-8.

# New Resource: Food Allergy Research & Education (FARE) Food Allergy Management in Schools (FAMS): Expert Recommendations for K-12

In September 2024, FARE published the <u>Food Allergy Management in Schools (FAMS): Expert Recommendations for K-12</u>, developed by FARE in close collaboration with the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP), and an Advisory Council of school nurses, physicians in allergy/immunology, food allergy patient advocacy groups, legal experts, and dietitians. These expert recommendations have also been endorsed by 15 school and allergy-related organizations. This document is available in English and Spanish and is a supplemental update to the Center for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC) 2013 <u>Voluntary Guidelines for Managing Food Allergies In Schools and Early Care and Education Programs</u>.
