The second triennial assessment is due **June 30**, **2025**, and is conducted using WellSAT.

Reminder: USDA Foods for School Year 2025-26: Orders due March 7, 2025; New Office Hours Session on March 5, 2025

The Connecticut Food Distribution Program's (FDP) catalog for USDA Foods for school year (SY) 2025-26 opened on **Friday, February 14, 2025**, in Web Based Supply Chain Management (WBSCM). The deadline to place orders in WBSCM is **Friday, March 7, 2025**. Recipient Agencies (RAs) that miss the ordering deadline will not receive USDA Foods.

Please carefully review and follow the CSDE's <u>Instructions for Ordering USDA Foods for School Year 2025-26</u>. This document and the <u>USDA Foods Ordering Worksheets for School Year 2025-26</u> are available in the "<u>WBSCM</u>" section of the CSDE's FDP webpage. For questions, please contact the FDP staff.

The FDP will conduct an additional <u>USDA Foods office hours session</u> on **Wednesday, March 5**, **2025**, from 2:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m. Please come prepared with questions about your USDA Foods order.

Operational Memorandum No. 03-25: Requirements for Submitting the Healthy Food Certification (HFC) Statement for School Year 2025-26

Section 10-215f of the Connecticut General Statutes requires that every year, each local board of education or governing authority (BOE) for all public schools participating in the National School Lunch Program (NSLP) must certify whether all food items sold to students will or will not meet the Connecticut Nutrition Standards. This includes all public schools, regional educational service centers, the Connecticut Technical Education and Career System (CTECS), charter schools, interdistrict magnet schools, and endowed academies.

Operational Memorandum No. 03-25: Requirements for Submitting the HFC Statement for School Year 2025-26, provides the required motion language and summarizes the **steps that districts must take now** to ensure the accurate and timely submission of the 2025-26 HFC Statement by the deadline of **July 1, 2025**.

All BOEs **must** vote on whether to participate in the healthy food option of HFC.

- If the BOE votes "yes" to the healthy food option, a vote on whether to allow food exemptions is **required**. The BOE may choose to vote on whether to allow beverage exemptions.
- if the BOE votes "no" to the healthy food option, a vote on whether to allow food exemptions is **not** required. The BOE may choose to vote on whether to allow beverage exemptions.

The "<u>Annual HFC Application</u>" section of the CSDE's HFC webpage provides information on the required steps for submitting the annual HFC Statement. The CSDE's 21-minute video, <u>Completing the Application Process for HFC</u>, provides detailed guidance on the HFC application process.

New Federal LFSIP Reimbursement Request Form (Phase 1 and/or Phase 2)

The CSDE has created a new Federal LFSIP Reimbursement Request Form to streamline the process for reimbursement and reporting allowable purchases. The current Phase 1 reporting form has been inactivated. The remainder of Phase 1 purchases should be entered into the new form.

School food authorities (SFAs) that are ready to request reimbursement for Phase 2 purchases will also utilize this new form. SFAs that submitted Phase 2 purchases on the old reporting form, will need to resubmit those purchases into the new form to receive reimbursement. All Phase 2 purchases must target socially disadvantaged and/or small business farmers, producers, growers, and ranchers.

• Form: Federal LFSIP Reimbursement Request Form (Phase 1 and/or Phase 2)

"Local and regional food" is defined as food that is raised, produced, aggregated, stored, processed, and distributed in the locality or region where the final product is marketed to consumers, so that the total distance that the product travels between the farm or ranch where the product originates and the point of sale to the end consumer is at most 400 miles, or both the final market and the origin of the product are within the same state or territory. Schools are strongly encouraged to purchase Connecticut grown food when possible.

"Small business" is defined by the U.S. Small Business Administration as a business that is a forprofit business of any legal structure; independently owned and operated, not nationally dominant in its field and physically located and operated in the U.S. or its territories.

"Socially disadvantaged" is defined by USDA as a member of a socially disadvantaged group (SDG), whose members have been subject to discrimination on basis of race, color, national origin, age, disability, and, where applicable, sex, gender identity, marital status, familial status, parental status, religion, sexual orientation, genetic information, political beliefs, reprisal, or because all or a part of an individual's income is derived from any public assistance program.

Need to Know

USDA Memo SP 07-2025 and CACFP 07-2025: Requirement to Accept Medical Statements from Registered Dietitians for Schools and Child and Adult Care Institutions and Facilities

On December 30, 2024, the USDA published <u>USDA Memo SP 07-2025</u> and <u>CACFP 07-2025</u>: Requirement to Accept Medical Statements from Registered Dietitians for Schools and Child and Adult Care Institutions and Facilities. This memo includes questions and answers and clarifies the updated regulatory requirement for school food authorities (SFAs) to accept medical statements from registered dietitians, based on the USDA final rule, <u>Child Nutrition Programs: Meal Patterns</u>

<u>Consistent with the 2020-2025 Dietary Guidelines for Americans</u>. The change requiring SFAs to accept medical statements from registered dietitians must be implemented by **July 1, 2025**. SFAs may choose to accept medical statements from registered dietitians prior to this deadline.

Updated "Medical Statements" Section of CSDE's Special Diets in School Nutrition Programs Webpage

The CSDE updated the <u>Medical Statements</u> section of CSDE's Special Diets in School Nutrition Programs webpage to include guidance on the requirement for medical statements, based on <u>USDA Memo SP 07-2025</u> and <u>CACFP 07-2025</u>: This section provides information on when medical statements are required, the required information for medical statements, authorized signers for medical statements, and the CSDE's medical statement forms.

Data on HFC Participation for SY 2024-25

HFC is in its nineteenth year of implementation with SY 2024-25. The data below summarizes HFC participation for SY 2024-25.

- 182 school districts/schools (96.3% of eligible districts/schools)
- 1 new school
- 99.5% recertification rate
- 90% increase from the first year (2006-07) to the current school year
