Reminder: School Year 2021-22 Healthy Food Certification (HFC) Statement Due July 1, 2021

As indicated in <u>Operational Memorandum No. 03-21</u>: Requirements for Submitting the Healthy Food Certification (HFC) Statement for School Year 2020-21, all public school sponsors of the NSLP must complete the annual HFC Statement and upload the board of education's meeting minutes by **July 1**, **2021**, using the CSDE's <u>Online Application and Claiming System for Child Nutrition Programs</u> (CNP System). **Please read the important information below before beginning this process.**

- Before accessing the CNP System, please read the instructions, <u>Submitting Connecticut's Healthy Food Certification Statement for School Year 2021-22</u>. This document provides important information and specific steps for completing the 2021-22 HFC Statement in the CNP System.
- There are two steps for completing the 2021-22 HFC Statement.
 - 1. The sponsor's **claims preparer** first **enrolls** the district in the 2021-22 application process for school nutrition programs. Sponsors *cannot* access the online HFC module until this step is complete.
 - 2. After the claims preparer enrolls the sponsor, the sponsor's **authorized signer 1 or 2** must complete, certify, and submit the HFC Statement. The claims preparer **cannot**

complete this process. The instructions in the first bullet above provide detailed information on this process.

- The HFC application requirements are summarized in the "<u>Apply</u>" section of the HFC webpage and <u>CSDE Operational Memorandum No. 03-21</u>: *Process for Submitting the Healthy Food Certification (HFC) Statement for School Year 2020-21*. For additional guidance, review the CSDE's presentation, <u>Application Procedures for HFC</u>.
- **Complete the HFC module only**: Do **not** begin the application process to participate in the USDA school nutrition programs for school year 2021-22. The CSDE will notify sponsors when it is time to start the online application process for school nutrition programs.

USDA Foods Update

As the school year continues to wind down, please schedule final deliveries of any remaining USDA Foods at the HPC warehouse. USDA Foods are intended for use during the school year they are ordered. However, due to the COVID-19 waiver for this year, it is allowable to continue to use USDA foods from school year 2021-21 over the summer. If you unexpectedly have extra inventory of USDA Foods, the Food Distribution Program (FDP) will continue to accept Request to Donate Excess USDA Foods forms through the first week of June. USDA Memo SP 11-2021, CACFP 10-2021 and SFSP 06-2021: Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021: Effect on Child Nutrition Programs

<u>USDA Memo SP 11-2021, CACFP 10-2021 and SFSP 06-2021</u> provides notice to Child Nutrition Program operators regarding Sections 743, 764, 767, and 789 of Division A of the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2021 (Public Law 116-260), which:

- allows the substitution of all vegetables (including potatoes and other starchy vegetables) for fruits in the School Breakfast Program (SBP) for school years 2020-21 and 2021-22;
- prohibits funds from being used to procure raw or processed poultry products from the People's Republic of China for use in Child Nutrition Programs, through September 30, 2021;
- provides guidance related to pricing of paid lunches for the National School Lunch Program (NSLP) during school year 2021-22; and
- allows low-fat (1%) *flavored* milk in the NSLP and SBP, through September 30, 2021.

USDA Memo SP 12-2021: Department of Education Information on the Emergency Broadband Benefit Program

<u>USDA Memo SP 12-2021</u> provides information about the Federal Communication Commission's Emergency Broadband Benefit (EBB). The EBB is a new, temporary Federal program to help eligible families pay for internet service during the pandemic. Eligibility for the EBB Program includes households with a child who was approved to receive free or reduced price meals under the National School Lunch Program (NSLP) or the School Breakfast Program (SBP) during school year 2019-20 or 2020-21, including children who attend schools participating in the Community Eligibility Provision (CEP).
