Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ) Regarding Vaccinations for Covered Workers in Schools

On August 25, 2021, the CSDE emailed superintendents a Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ) document summarizing Executive Order No. 13D ("Protection of Public Health and Safety During COVID-19 Pandemic – Vaccinations Required for State Employees, School Employees and Childcare Facility Staff"). This information applies to all school staff, **including school food service employees**. Please review the FAQ document and consult with your school district counsel when making decisions based on the Order. The FAQ is a working document and may be updated as the school year progresses.

USDA Foods Reminder for School Year 2021-22 Orders

As a reminder, all USDA Foods orders are "requests" until they enter the purchased status. It is critically important this year to run your "Requisition Status Report" on a weekly basis until all of your orders are in a purchased status (or cancelled). As you are all aware, there are many issues with the food supply chain this year, and we have already had cancellations and trucks coming in short for our direct delivery USDA Foods Items. Due to these continuing issues, once the trucks are received at HPC or at a processor, your actual allocations may differ from the orders you placed in April.

Instructions for running the Requisition Status Report can be found in the <u>WBSCM Training Guide</u>, starting on page 87. To view your report for the entire school year, enter the date range of 7/1/2021 through 6/30/2022.

Required Survey for SFAs: Local School Wellness Policy Triennial Assessments in the National School Lunch Program and School Breakfast Program

On June 11, 2021, the USDA Food and Nutrition Service (FNS) issued <u>COVID-19</u>: <u>Child Nutrition Response #98</u>: <u>Nationwide Waiver of Local School Wellness Policy Triennial Assessments in the National School Lunch and School Breakfast</u> to provide local educational agencies (LEAs) with additional time to focus on wellness activities. The new deadline to complete a triennial assessment is **June 30, 2022**.

All SFAs are required to complete a <u>brief survey</u> by **September 10**, **2021**. This survey will assist the CSDE with establishing a plan for providing technical assistance on school wellness polices to SFAs.

Resource Roundup: Indirect Cost Guidance

Indirect cost guidance provides assistance to school food authorities (SFA) and business officials to ensure the nonprofit school food service account (NSFSA) funds are limited to those expenses that are reasonable, necessary, and allocable to provide quality meals for the National School Lunch Program (NSLP) and School Breakfast Program (SBP). In general, the full cost of the NSLP and SBP includes both direct and indirect costs. Direct costs are incurred specifically for the NSLP and SBP, and can be readily identified to a particular school food service objective. Allocation of indirect cost is necessary because it identifies the portion of the costs benefiting the school food service.

The guidance provides information to SFAs on program rules pertaining to the areas below.

- Definitions for both direct and indirect costs, including the proper classification of costs and discussion on the treatment of certain typical costs in the NSLP and SBP. Direct costs are discussed because direct and indirect costs are complementary.
- An overview of the federal cost principles and explanation that all costs (direct or indirect)
 paid with funds from the NSFSA must be allowable. The guidance provides criteria that will aid
 an SFA in determining allowable costs and includes relevant examples.
- Considerations for the SFA when assessing indirect costs charged to the NSFSA.
