# Revised Operational Memorandum No. 03-22: Updated Requirements for Lunch Periods in the National School Lunch Program (NSLP)


"Note: For SY 2021-22, sponsors may submit a waiver for meal time requirements to the CSDE to request approval to serve meals outside of the specified times outlined in the federal regulations."

#### Reminder: FNS 742 Verification Summary Report due December 15, 2021

The FNS 742 Verification Summary Report is due **December 15, 2021**. To date, 67 sponsors have *not started* this report. All sponsors of the National School Lunch Program (NSLP), including Seamless Summer Option (SSO) sponsors, must complete this report. This also includes private schools, residential child care institutions (RCCIs), and sponsors that normally would participate as a Community Eligibility Provision (CEP) school or district.

Attached is the PowerPoint handout from the CSDE's webinar: *Direct Certification and the FNS 742 Verification Summary Report*, conducted on November 18, 2021. Please refer to the CSDE's document <u>Completing the Verification Collection Report (FNS 742)</u> which explains the process for completing the FNS 742 Verification Summary Report. Additionally, check off box 5-1 to indicate that you are exempt from conducting verification **only if you do not have newly approved free or reduced applications on file by October 1**, and therefore were not required to conduct the formal verification process. Send an email to <u>teri.dandeneau@ct.gov</u> confirming that you had no applications on file. A note will be made on the Report when it is approved.

# National School Lunch Program (NSLP) Equipment Assistance Grant: Due December 31, 2021

The CSDE is now accepting proposals for the **USDA NSLP Equipment Assistance Grants Request for Proposals (RFP)**. The Fiscal Year (FY) 2020 Agriculture Appropriations Act provided funds to state agencies to competitively award equipment assistance grants to eligible school food authorities (SFAs) participating in the NSLP. These funds will allow SFAs to purchase equipment to serve healthier meals that meet the updated meal patterns, improve food safety, and expand access. The total funds available are \$244,011. The CSDE will award grants of up to \$25,000 per SFA.

For this grant, the previous free or reduced-price meals percentage eligibility requirement has been eliminated. All SFAs participating in the NSLP are eligible to apply. Priority is given to schools that did not receive previous equipment grant funding under earlier USDA NSLP Equipment Assistance Grants.

The RFP document is available on the CSDE's 2021 <u>Request for Proposals</u> webpage. **Proposals must be received by 5:00 p.m. on Friday, December 31, 2021.** Extensions will not be given. 

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## **Direct Certification**

Determining children eligible for free or reduced-price meals benefits who are not subject to verification based on:

- Documentation obtained directly from the appropriate
   State or local agency or other authorized individuals
- Should not involve the household. The communication exchange should be between an appropriate agency and the LEA/school.

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# **Direct Certification**

Children that are directly certified:

- Do not need to submit an application, and
- Are not subject to verification.

# **Categorical Eligibility**

- When a child is automatically eligible for free meals or free milk because he (or another member of his household) receives Assistance Program benefits, or
- When a child is determined individually eligible through an Other Source Categorically Eligible designation.
- May be established through the application process or through the direct certification

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# **Categorical Eligibility**

Assistance Programs include:

- Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Programs (SNAP)
- Temporary Family Assistance (TFA) Programs

Free eligibility is extended to all children in the household and these children are considered to be directly certified in the same category.

# **Other Source Categorical Eligibility**

Those categories which make children automatically eligible for free benefits, either through direct certification or application, because the children are:

- Enrolled in a Federal Head Start Program;
- Enrolled in State-funded pre-kindergarten classes using identical or more stringent eligibility criteria than the Federal Head Start Program;
- Determined as homeless by the school district's homeless liaison or by the director of a homeless shelter;

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# **Other Source Categorical Eligibility**

Those categories which make children automatically eligible for free benefits, either through direct certification or application, because the children are:

- Determined a runaway child who is receiving assistance from a program under the Runaway and Homeless Youth Act and is identified by the local educational liaison; and
- Determined to be a foster child whose care and placement is the responsibility of the State or is formally placed by a court with a relative or other caretaker household, and the State retains legal custody of the child.

# **Other Source Categorical Eligibility**

A child's eligibility for free meals under Other Source Categorical Eligibility does **not** extend to any other child in the household.

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# Other Source Categorical Eligibility

Homeless, runaway or Head Start children are other source categorically eligible and also considered directly certified *if program directors or the homeless liaison provides a list of eligible participants*.

## **Direct Certification – Ways a Child May be Directly Certified**

- 1. Name appears on the direct certification list as:
  - FS SNAP benefits
  - AF Temporary Family Assistance (TFA) benefits
  - OT Other -foster child (Foster status is merged MONTHLY with DCF)
  - FM Free Medicaid
  - RM Reduced Medicaid

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## **Direct Certification – Ways a Child May be Directly Certified**

- If a child is listed as FS, AF, or FM, free benefits are extended to all children in the household.
- Extension of free benefits does NOT occur for OT.
- If a child is listed as RM, reduced-price benefits are extended to all children in the household.

For verification purposes, you must track the differences.

## **Direct Certification – Ways a Child May be Directly Certified**

- 2. Homeless Liaison provides the determining official with an updated list of all students that are homeless or runaway. The list must be signed and dated by the homeless liaison.
  - To determine the Homeless Liaison in the district, go to: https://portal.ct.gov/SDE/Homeless/Homeless-Education/How-To
  - Set up a process for notifying the determining official, as students become identified.

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### Direct Certification – Ways a Child May be Directly Certified

- 3. The director of the federally funded (or state-funded program that has the same or more stringent requirements) district's Head Start Program provides the determining official with a list of students who enrolled in the current year Head Start Program. The list must be signed and dated.
- 4. LEA Point of Contact provides the determining official (DO) with a list of children who are confirmed to be foster children direct certification and not subject to verification. Free benefit does not get extended to other children in the household.

### **Direct Certification – NOTIFICATION**

#### REMINDER

- You must notify the household in writing, ANYTIME you approve a child for free/reducedprice meals.
- This includes when you approve them based on direct certification.

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## **Direct Certification – Important Points About DC and Medicaid**

FS (SNAP benefits)	Free benefits extend to all children in the household
AF (Temporary Family Assistance)	Free benefits extend to all children in the household
OT (Other, e.g., foster children)	Free benefits do NOT extend to all children in the household
FM (Free Medicaid)	Free benefits extend to all children in the household
RM (Reduced Medicaid)	Reduced benefits extend to all children in the household

- Due to differences in HH definitions and income assessments, some children that are directly certified as reduced Medicaid could also be eligible for free meals if the HH submitted an application.
- Therefore, districts must give the HH the opportunity to apply for free benefits if a child is directly certified as RM – Reduced Medicaid.

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## **Direct Certification – Important Points About DC and Medicaid**

- A child's status as Reduced Medicaid cannot negatively impact their eligibility if they have been determined free by the district (e.g., via a HH application, homeless liaison, Head Start director of if a foster child.
- The district's determination supersedes the reduced Medicaid status

There is a hierarchy of eligibility and certain considerations when allowing the POS (point of sale) software to override a determination.

- Eligibility for SNAP benefits (FS) supersedes all other eligibility categories;
- A Medicaid match should never overlay an existing direct certification match with another allowable program category (e.g., SNAP, TFA or OT); and
- Districts must identify a Medicaid match only when the child does not match with SNAP, TFA, or OT.

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### **Direct Certification – Important Points About DC and Medicaid**

#### **HIERARCHY**

- 1. FS (SNAP benefits): Free benefits extend to all children in the household;
- 2. AF (Temporary Family Assistance): Free benefits extend to all children in the household;
- 3. OT (Other, i.e., foster child): Free benefits do NOT extend to all children in the household.
- 4. FM (Free Medicaid): Free benefits extend to all children in the household; and
- 5. RM (Reduced Medicaid): Reduced-price benefits extend to all children in the household.

**HIERARCHY** 

Example of Hierarchy of Eligibility:

If a student is categorized as RM and the latest direct certification file now has the student categorized as AF, the student's eligibility category would change to AF and this would extend to all children in the household.

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## **Direct Certification – Important Points About DC and Medicaid**

**HIERARCHY** 

What happens if a student's name appears twice on the direct certification list?

This may occur because DSS has issued two client ID's for the student (e.g., one ID for SNAP benefits and one ID for Medicaid (HUSKY).)

Remember the hierarchy and give the child the highest benefit.

**HIERARCHY** 

What happens if a foster child's (e.g., OT on the direct certification list) name appears twice on the direct certification list?

This occurs because the SNAP/TFA data comes from DSS and a foster child's data is issued by DCF.

Remember the hierarchy and give the child the highest benefit.


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- Each sponsor has ONE designated direct certification contact who can access the direct certification list online; and
- This access is on the CSDE Direct Certification website https://portal.ct.gov/SDE/Nutrition/Direct-Certification;
- The Direct Certification list is updated every Monday (or Tuesday if Monday is a holiday) and the CSDE matches student enrollment with the Department of Social Services (DSS) SNAP/TFA benefits and DCF (once a month); and
- Direct certification contacts are required to access the list weekly (on Wednesday) to ensure that the children listed are awarded free or reduced-price benefits accurately and timely.

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
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
### **Direct Certification – THE LIST**



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- Private Schools and RCCIs may have a different method and must refer to the Direct Certification Manual for Private Schools.
- All sponsors may always check the State Wide Search to locate a student.



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### **Direct Certification – THE LIST**

 If you find a student in the State Wide Search link, make sure you do a screen shot and print off as proof that the child was directly certified!



### IMPORTANT REMINDER ABOUT DC AND ENROLLMENT

 Schools must match their total enrollment with the entire direct certification list every time the DC match is made.


- If an application is submitted and the child is directly certified, disregard the application (don't throw away however!)
- Direct Certification supersedes everything.

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## **Direct Certification – Foster Children – Different Ways to be DC**

- OT on the DC list
- DO obtains a copy of a current DC 603 form or a state agency document indicating that the child is a foster child and legal ward of the state
- LEA Point of Contact provides the DO with a list of children who are confirmed as foster children

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
