Job Opening: Education Services Specialist for the Child Nutrition Programs: Application Deadline January 4, 2022

The CSDE is currently accepting applications for an Education Services Specialist for the Child Nutrition Programs (CNP) unit within the School Nutrition Programs team. This position will assist in administering the USDA school nutrition programs including the National School Lunch Program (NSLP), School Breakfast Program (SBP), Community Eligibility Provision (CEP), Food Distribution Program (FDP), Afterschool Snack Program (ASP), and Seamless Summer Option of the NSLP. Reminder: Receipt Invoices in FFAVORS before Holiday Break

Be sure to receipt any invoices in FFAVORS before you leave the office for the holiday break. Invoices must be receipted within five days in FFAVORS to ensure prompt processing by the USDA.

Onsite Monitoring Requirements for the National School Lunch Program (NSLP), School Breakfast Program (SBP), Afterschool Snack Program (ASP), Seamless Summer Option (SSO) and Districts with Food Service Management Company (FSMC) Contracts

The chart below summarizes the onsite monitoring requirements for school year 2021-22. The CSDE previously provided this information in the chart, <u>Comparison of Operating the National School Lunch Program (NSLP) and Seamless Summer Option (SSO) for School Food Authorities in School Year 2021-22 through June 30, 2022.</u> Sample monitoring forms are available in the "<u>Monitoring Forms</u>" section of the CSDE's Forms for School Nutrition Programs webpage.

In addition to the onsite monitoring requirements below, districts contracting with a food service management company (FSMC) must also complete separate FSMC monitoring. The FSMC onsite monitoring must be done two times a year. The CSDE recommends that the first monitoring visit occurs by October 1 and the second visit occurs by February 1. A sample FSMC monitoring form (*Exhibit I: Sample School Food Authority (SFA)/Food Service Management Company (FSMC) Monitoring Form*) is available the "Food Service Management Company" section of the CSDE's Forms for School Nutrition Programs webpage.

Required monitoring by SFAs/sponsors	NSLP : On-site * review of lunch counting and claiming system for all SFAs with more than one school site completed annually by February 1.	Review of meal counting, claiming, and meal pattern and food safety compliance at least one on-site * during each site's operation.
	SBP : On-site * review of breakfast counting and claiming system for all SFAS with more than one school site. Must be completed annually by February 1 for 50 percent of sites operating the SBP. Each site operating the SBP must be reviewed once every two years.	The CSDE recommends following the monitoring requirements for the NSLP, SBP, and ASP and also recommends reviewing the sites the first four weeks of operation.
	ASP: Each ASP must be reviewed on-site * twice per year. The first review must be conducted within the first four weeks of operation. The second review must be conducted sometime during the remainder of the ASP operation.	operation.

Seeking School Nutrition Directors to Join Innovation Cohort: Apply by January 4, 2022

Do you have ideas about how to change your meal program to better meet the needs of kids, but little time or resources to try new approaches? The No Kid Hungry Program Innovation team is offering a unique opportunity for school nutrition directors to bring their ideas to life by joining an innovation cohort facilitated by the global design firm, <u>IDEO</u>.

Cohort Member Responsibilities

- Participate in three 90-minute virtual working sessions in January through March, scheduled based on the availability of the cohort members
- Pilot an approach from the toolkit in the district/school sometime in March June
- Support ongoing learning and evolution of the toolkit by sharing staff, kids', and caregivers' experiences from pilot approaches

No Kid Hungry aims to assemble a geographically diverse cohort of five school nutrition directors. Participating directors will receive a personal stipend of \$1,000 to contribute their time and expertise during the design process, as well as a \$4,000 grant to pilot an approach from the toolkit in their schools.

Connecticut Department of Agriculture's Farm Viability Grant: Due February 14, 2022

The Farm Viability Grant (FVG) is a competitive matching grant program open to municipalities, regional planning organizations, associations of municipalities, and agricultural non-profits. It is authorized by <u>Section 22-26j</u> of the Connecticut General Statutes. The maximum grant award is \$49,999. The deadline is February 14, 2022

The FVG's focus areas that align with farm to school efforts are below.

- 1. Urban Agriculture: Projects that focus on establishing or expanding support and resources for urban agriculture.
- 2. Food Supply Chain: Projects that would make kitchen space available to process CT Grown farm products or propose plans/development for construction of meat processing facilities/food hubs, co-op operations or increase market opportunities for CT farmers.
- 3. Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) in Agriculture: Projects which directly impact farmers in one or more of the following classifications: limited resource, BIPOC, veterans, members of the LGBTQ+ community, or people with a disability.
