**Free Application** for Federal **Student Aid**

The Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) is a form that U.S. students can complete to apply for financial aid for twoand four-year colleges, vocational, trade, and career schools. The FAFSA is used to determine a student's eligibility for federal, state, and institutional financial

aid, including Pell Grants, Robert B. Willis scholarship funding, Free College Tuition at Connecticut Community College, loans, work study, and other aid. This aid can help cover the cost of tuition, fees, room and board, textbooks, and other educational expenses.

**Aid Application** for Connecticut **Undocumented Students** 



The Aid Application for Connecticut Undocumented Students (AACTUS) is a financial aid application specifically designed for undocumented students in Connecticut who are ineligible to complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). This application

allows undocumented students. including those with Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) status, who meet specific criteria to apply for institutional aid at public colleges and universities in Connecticut.

### The Roberta B. Willis Scholarship

The Roberta B. Willis
Scholarship is a financial
aid program for Connecticut
residents attending
undergraduate programs
at public and independent
higher education institutions
in Connecticut. It includes
both need-based grants (up to

\$4,500 for full-time study in a 2- or 4-year program of study) and need-merit scholarships (up to \$5,250 for full-time attendance in a 4-year program or up to \$4,650 a year for full-time attendance in a 2-year program of study), designed to support low-income students.

## Connecticut Automatic Admissions Program



The Connecticut Automatic
Admissions Program (CAAP) is
an initiative designed to simplify
and streamline the college
admissions process for highachieving high school students
in Connecticut. The program
automatically grants admission
to participating state universities

and colleges for students who have a 3.0 weighted GPA or a 2.75 unweighted GPA. This initiative is part of Connecticut's broader efforts to increase access to higher education and reduce the stress of a traditional application process.
