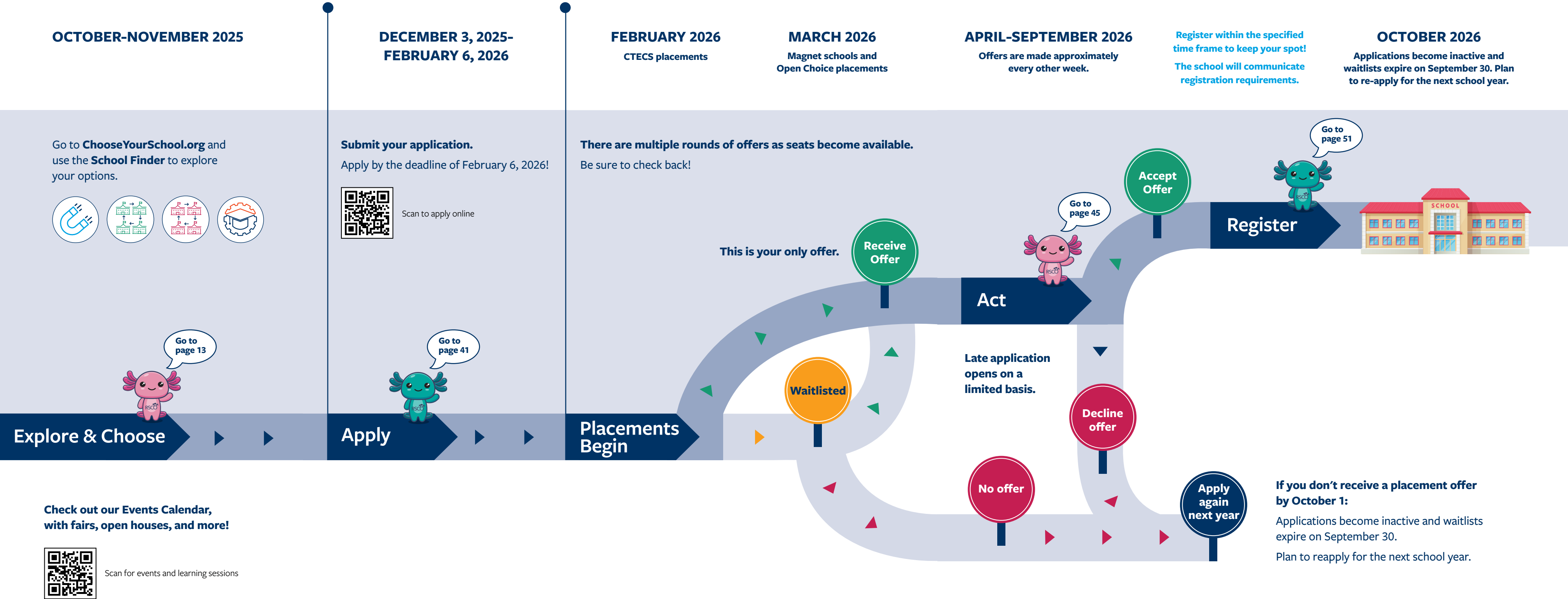

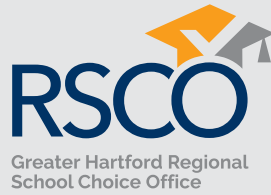

Limited applications will be available in mid-March 2026 to schools with open seats.

- ☐ **Explore schools.** Go to ChooseYourSchool.org.
- ☐ **Consider transportation.** Review options by program, age, and town.
- ☐ **Learn application and placement rules.** Understand priorities, placement rules, and eligibility.

Apply

- ☐ **Create or update your RSCO account.**
- ☐ **Add or update profiles for each child.**
- ☐ **Check your priorities.** Make sure they are flagged as expected.
- ☐ **Choose your schools.** Rank by order of preference.
- ☐ **Submit your application by February 6, 2026.**

After You Apply

- ☐ **Monitor your account for communications from RSCO.**
- ☐ **Accept your offer if you receive one and register by the deadline.**
- ☐ **Monitor your waitlist if you did not receive an offer.** Offers continue through September.

Top 5 Things to Know

1

You Must be a Connecticut Resident & the Student's Legal Guardian to Apply

Applications submitted by anyone other than a legal guardian may be deleted.

2

The Application Deadline Is February 6, 2026

Submit one application per student for the 2026-27 school year.
Duplicate applications will be deleted.

3

You May Receive Only ONE Offer

If your student receives an offer from any school, they will be removed from all other waitlists and will no longer be eligible for another placement for the 2026-27 school year, regardless of whether you accept or decline the placement.

Apply only to schools from which you would accept an offer.

4

Choice Order Counts

Rank school/district selections by preference, since the placement protocol assigns offers based on choice order.

Most placement priorities apply only to your first-choice selection.

5

Receiving an Offer is Not Guaranteed

Every year, we have more applicants than available seats. Submitting an application does not guarantee a placement offer. Families who do not receive a placement offer and are still interested in a choice program must reapply each year.

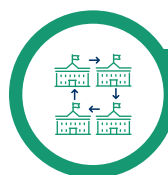

Interdistrict Magnet Schools

PK3-Grade 12

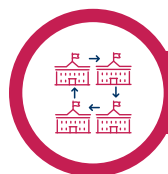
These schools have a special focus, like science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM); performing arts; global studies; Montessori; computer programming; and many more. Students get hands-on learning and unique experiences that match their interests.



The Hartford Region Open Choice Program for Hartford Residents

PK4-Grade 12

Students who live in Hartford have an opportunity to attend public schools in nearby school districts, with full access to challenging academic programming, extracurriculars, and athletics.



The Hartford Region Open Choice Program for Non-Hartford Residents

KG-Grade 8

Students who live outside of Hartford have an opportunity to attend select Hartford public schools that offer specialized curricula and themes.



Connecticut Technical Education and Career System (CTECS): Technical High Schools

Grades 9-12

These high schools combine core academic and career/technical education courses that prepare students for immediate employment, apprenticeship programs, and college and career opportunities.

Explore Schools and Programs

Do your research

1. Browse ChooseYourSchool.org

Use the School Finder to view the programs and schools your student is eligible to apply to based on grade and town of residence. Or access the School Directory to filter by grade, theme, location, or more to explore an interactive map to find schools and programs that fit your student and family.

Knowing where seats tend to be available can help you prioritize schools from which your child is more likely to receive an offer. Most open seats are in the entry grades:

- PK/KG for elementary schools
- 6th grade for middle/middle-high schools
- 9th grade for high schools

Note: Seats in other grades are available but are limited.

Applying to schools with more seats and fewer applications increases your chances of placement. Applying to schools with fewer seats and more applications lowers your chances. Check last year's Past Seat Availability in the School Directory when selecting schools to apply to.

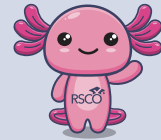
Eligibility Requirements

As you explore our schools and programs, it is important to understand the eligibility requirements so you know which options are available to your family. For example, some schools only accept students from certain towns or specific grade levels.

Knowing these details early on can save you time and help you focus on the schools that are the best fit for your student.

Note:

A P.O. Box cannot be used to prove residency, and applications submitted by anyone other than a legal guardian may be deleted.

Considerations for Prekindergarten and Kindergarten Applicants

Age eligibility requirements

PK3 (prekindergarten age 3): Child must turn 3 on or before September 1, 2026 (born on or between September 2, 2022, and September 1, 2023)

PK4 (prekindergarten age 4): Child must turn 4 on or before September 1, 2026 (born on or between September 2, 2021, and September 1, 2022)

Kindergarten age requirements: Child must turn 5 on or before September 1, 2026*

Exceptions to the Kindergarten Age Requirements

Connecticut law requires children to turn 5 years old on or before September 1 to be automatically eligible for kindergarten. The law allows parents to request early enrollment in kindergarten if their student does not meet the age requirement. Under the law, students who do not turn 5 years old by September 1 may be admitted to kindergarten if:

- The parent submits a written request to the principal of the school to admit their child to kindergarten; **and**
- The principal of the school determines the child is developmentally ready for kindergarten based on an assessment.

Kindergarten placement offers made to students who have not reached the age of 5 on or before September 1 will be conditional, pending the results of the assessment. If the assessment determines that kindergarten is not developmentally appropriate for the student, the placement offer will be revoked and the student will be placed back on the waitlist for PK4.

Parents wanting to submit a kindergarten application for a child turning 5 years old in **September, October, November, or December, must do so by the application deadline of February 6, 2026, and contact RSCO for assistance. The student's on-time application serves as a parent's written request for early enrollment in kindergarten.*



Prekindergarten Tuition

Magnet schools operated by the CREC and Goodwin University Educational Services (GUES) charge prekindergarten tuition on a sliding scale based on your family's income. The fee for prekindergarten is determined annually but will not exceed \$2,320 per child, in accordance with Connecticut law. Some schools provide a discount for multiple student enrollment. Please check with the school for specific details.



Magnet Schools

Grades: PK3-12

Magnet schools offer hands-on learning experiences with a special focus like science, technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM); visual and performing arts; International Baccalaureate; Montessori; and many more.

These schools teach all core academic subjects woven together with the theme to create a learning experience that sparks creativity and boosts engagement.

There are 44 interdistrict magnet schools in the Hartford region, operated by either Bloomfield Public Schools (BPS), the Capitol Region Education Council (CREC), East Hartford Public Schools (EHPS), Goodwin University Educational Services (GUES), or Hartford Public Schools (HPS).

Important tips about how placements work:

- The RSCO application process is different from a traditional application process. While families can apply to multiple options, a student is eligible for only one placement offer. If a placement offer is made, the student's application is automatically removed from all other waitlists.
- We try to place students in one of their top choices, but this is not always possible.



Magnet School Application Tips

Who can apply: Students entering grades PK3 through 12th grade.

Apply only to schools that are a fit for your family. You are eligible for only one placement offer, so apply only to schools from which you would accept an offer. There is no requirement to use all your choices—just focus on the options that are the right fit.

If you're interested only in magnet schools, apply only to magnet schools. You do not have to apply to the other program options (Open Choice, CTECS)*.

**Something to consider when applying to multiple programs: CTECS placements begin in February, before magnet school and Open Choice Program placements. If you apply to CTECS and receive a placement, you are no longer eligible for a magnet or Open Choice placement based on the one-offer rule.*

Have a placement priority? Make the school with a priority your first choice for the best chance of getting a placement.

- Direct pathway
- Enrolled siblings
- Employee/staff
- Placed siblings
- Pathway school
- Residential neighborhood
- Residential zone

Other Things to Know

Students in the final grade of their magnet school may receive priority through pathway schools, which can increase their chances of staying within the magnet system.

At key transition points, like going from elementary to middle school or middle to high school, some magnet schools are connected by these pathways. These connections help increase the chance of placement and keep peer groups together.

Prekindergarten Tuition

Magnet schools operated by the Capital Region Education Council and Goodwin University Educational Services charge prekindergarten tuition based on a sliding scale. Tuition varies with family income.

Open Choice Program for Hartford Residents

Hartford Residents: PK4-Grade 12

The Open Choice Program for Hartford residents enables Hartford students to attend public schools in nearby districts from PK4 through 12th grade. These districts offer excellent educational opportunities, including full access to challenging academic environments and enriching extracurricular activities like clubs, sports, arts, and community involvement.

Open Choice for Hartford Residents Application Tips

Who can apply: Hartford students entering PK4 through 10th grade. Once a student is enrolled in an Open Choice district, they are enrolled through high school graduation as long as they remain a Hartford resident. There is no need to reapply each year.

Find your zone. The City of Hartford is divided into four residential zones, with specific districts assigned to each zone. Families living in a specific residential zone apply to the districts assigned to that zone. Go to [page 24](#) to see which districts are assigned to each zone. You can also go to ChooseYourSchool.org and use the School Finder Tool to determine your zone based on your full street address.

Open Choice your top choice? Apply only to Open Choice to activate the Open Choice Only Priority. Adding other programs such as magnet schools or CTECS cancels this priority.

Apply only to districts from which you would accept an offer. You can decline only one Open Choice offer.

Consider adding other program options (magnet schools and CTECS for applying 9th graders)* to your application if your student is in an upper grade level. Most available seats are at the lower grades, especially PK4, kindergarten, and 1st grade.

**Something to consider when applying to multiple programs: CTECS placements are made first, in February, followed by magnet school placements in March—both before Open Choice Program placements. Under the one-offer rule, if a student receives a placement in CTECS or a magnet school, they are no longer eligible for an Open Choice placement.*

Have a placement priority? Make the school with a priority your first choice for the best chance of a placement. Applicable placement priorities:

- Former resident
 - Open Choice only
 - Enrolled siblings
 - Pathway school
 - Placed siblings

Hartford Residential Zone Map

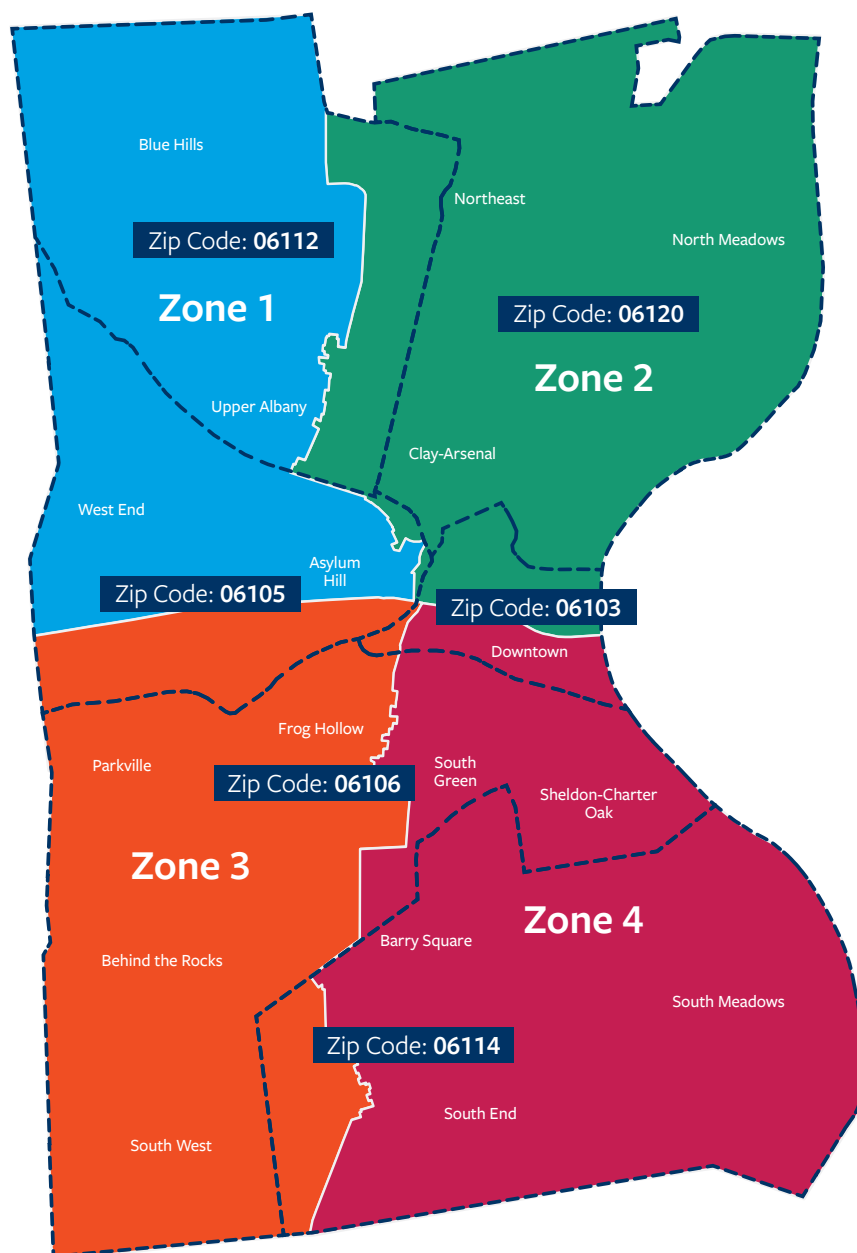
Open Choice Program

Hartford is divided into four residential zones, each linked to specific school districts. Families apply to the districts assigned to the zone where they live.



To determine where you can apply, go to ChooseYourSchool.org and use the School Finder Tool to determine your zone based on your full street address.

Open Choice Program for Non-Hartford Residents

Non-Hartford Residents: KG-Grade 8

The Open Choice Program for non-Hartford residents enables students living outside of Hartford to attend certain non-magnet public schools in Hartford from kindergarten through the end grade at the school. These schools include specialized programming tailored to enhance students' educational experiences.

Open Choice for Non-Hartford Residents Application Tips



Who can apply: Non-Hartford residents entering kindergarten through 6th grade (depending on the school's grade offerings). Once your student is enrolled in an Open Choice school, they are enrolled through the end grade at the school.

Open Choice your top choice? Apply only to Open Choice to activate the Open Choice Only Priority. Adding other programs such as magnet schools cancels this priority.

Have a placement priority? Make the school with a priority your first choice for the best chance of a placement.

Connecticut Technical Education and Career System (CTECS)

Grades 9-12

There are three CTECS high schools in the Greater Hartford region: A.I. Prince Technical High School, E.C. Goodwin Technical High School, and Howell Cheney Technical High School. These schools offer a unique combination of academic courses and hands-on training in a wide range of technical fields such as health sciences, manufacturing, automotive, culinary arts, and more. Students receive a well-rounded education that prepares them for immediate career opportunities like employment and apprenticeships or enrollment in college.

CTECS Application Tips

Applying 9th graders only. The RSCO application is available only for students entering 9th grade and interested in attending one of the three technical high schools.

Note for applying 10th graders:

Students entering 10th grade should contact the technical school directly.



Rank the schools in order of preference. Students entering 9th grade and applying to CTECS will automatically have all three schools added to their application. Then families should rank the schools in the order that best fits the student's preferences and interests.

CTECS your top choice? Apply only to CTECS technical high schools to activate the CTECS Only Priority.

CTECS Only is the only way to express a preference for a CTECS placement. Adding other programs such as magnet schools or Open Choice cancels this priority. Only apply to other programs (magnets and Open Choice) if you are willing to accept an offer from a magnet school or Open Choice district.

Have a placement priority? Make the school with a priority your first choice for the best chance of a placement.

Now that you have explored the different options, it's time to focus on the schools and programs that feel like good fits for your student.

Start by looking at the schools and programs your student is eligible for and think about what matters most to your family, like school themes, school and classroom size, extracurricular activities, before-/after-school programs, and other practical factors, like distance from home, transportation options, and prekindergarten tuition.

Understanding the Placement Process

RSCO uses a computer-based system to match students with schools. Seats are divided between Hartford and non-Hartford residents, with a specific number of seats allocated to each group. Most schools reserve half of the seats for Hartford residents.

While not every student will get a placement offer or their top choice, RSCO works hard to place as many students as possible. If your student is not placed in the initial round, they may still receive an offer during a future round if a seat becomes available.

Placement Factors

There is no single factor that determines placement, but it is worth understanding some things that can influence the process. Two of the biggest factors are:

- **The grade level and whether it is an entry grade.** Schools have more seats available in entry grades. For other grades, seats open only when current students withdraw.
- **The number of other applicants and whether they have priority.** Schools with many sibling or pathway applicants may have fewer seats available for other students.

Other factors include:

- The random number assigned to each application;
- Applying for multiple years without an offer;
- Current enrollment in a choice program; and
- The socioeconomic resources of the applicant's community.



Note:

Individual student information like grades, attendance, or discipline history does not affect placement.

How families complete the application also plays a role in placements. Important considerations include:

- **Applying on time.** Applicants who submit a late application are added to the waitlist below those who applied on time.
- **Ordering of school selections.** The placement algorithm prioritizes choice order.
- **Having connections that may give you a placement priority.** A student's priority school must be their first choice to activate the priority.

How Placement Priorities Work

Placement priorities are connections to a school or program that can boost a student's chance of an offer, like having a sibling already enrolled in a program or when your middle school shares a theme with a high school to create a pathway. These priorities do not guarantee placement at a school or program, but they can increase your chance of receiving an offer.

Even if a student qualifies for a priority at multiple schools or in multiple districts, priority is usually given only to the school or district ranked as their first choice. Keep in mind, placement always depends on seat availability and how many other students apply.

Placement Priorities by Program

RSCO follows a specific order when applying priorities for each program based on the list order below. Applicants with priorities are considered before those without, so it is important to understand which priorities apply to your student.

Factors That May Give You Priority During Placement

Connections to a school make a difference

Where a Guardian Works or Sibling Attends School

Staff Priority

- Employees of a CTECS or magnet school may receive priority for their children when applying to the school where they work.
- Employees of Goodwin University, University of Hartford*, CT State Community College Manchester, CT State Community College Capital, and Trinity College may receive priority for their children when applying to their partner magnet school.

*University High School of Science and Engineering is the partner magnet school for University of Hartford.

Sibling Priority

To help keep siblings in the same school or Open Choice district, RSCO gives priority to students who share at least one biological parent, legal guardian, or stepparent. To be eligible, all students must have a profile in RSCO's application platform and be linked as siblings.

- **Enrolled Sibling Priority:** Applicants receive priority when applying to the school or Open Choice district where their sibling is enrolled. The sibling must remain enrolled the following year or be in the school's final grade.
 - *Apply by the deadline and choose the enrolled sibling's school/district as the first choice.*
- **Placed Sibling Priority & Twins/Multiples:** Applicants receive priority at the school where a sibling has accepted a placement. The placement process also works to keep twins or multiples together.
 - *Apply during the same application period, with the same schools and/or districts in the same order for all siblings.*

What Happens If Siblings Receive Different Placements

- If siblings receive offers for different schools in the same round, a family may decline one and keep that student on the waitlist where the other sibling accepted a placement.
- If a sibling receives an offer for a different school in a later round, they can decline that placement and stay on the waitlist where the other sibling already accepted a placement.
 - *Families must contact RSCO when siblings are placed separately.*

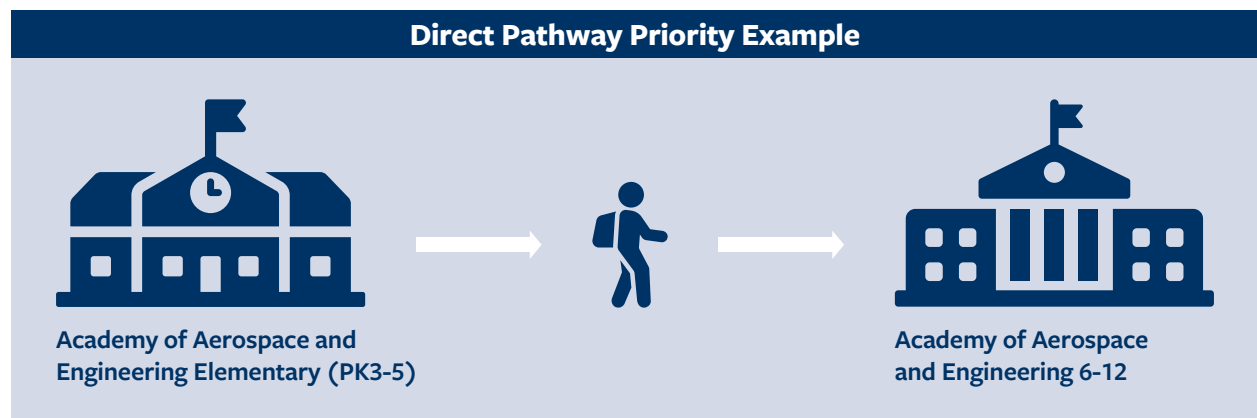
Where a Family Applies

- **CTECS-Only Applicants:** Students who apply only to CTECS.
- **Open Choice-Only Applicants:** Students who apply only to the Open Choice Program.

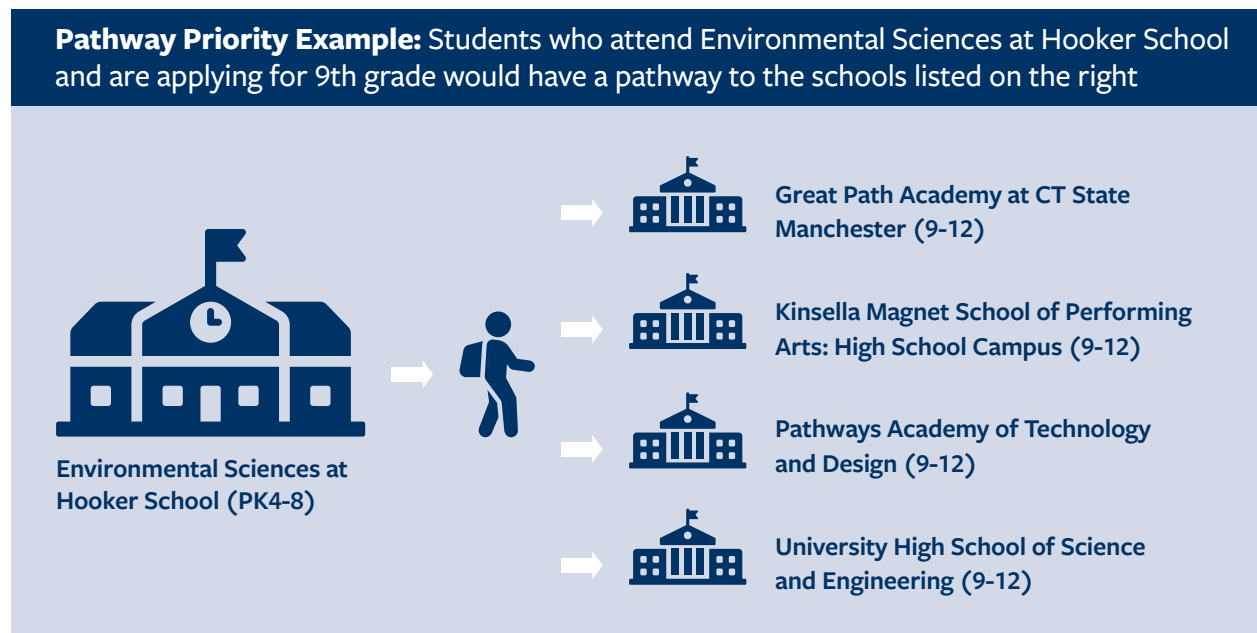
Where a Student Goes to School

- **Direct Pathway Priority:** Some magnet schools offer a prekindergarten to grade 12 continuum through direct pathways between schools. Students attending an elementary or middle school with a direct pathway will receive the highest priority when applying to their direct pathway school if it is selected as their first choice and their application is submitted on time.

To be eligible: Submit an on-time RSCO online application with your direct pathway school as your first choice.



- **Pathway Priority:** Applicants in transition grades have priority when moving between specific magnet schools. This increases a family's chance of remaining in the magnet system as students move from elementary to middle and middle to high school.



Where a Student Lives

- **Neighborhood Priority:** Hartford residents applying to elementary schools located within half a mile of their house receive neighborhood priority.
- **Former Residents Priority (Open Choice Program Only):** Applicants receive priority as a former resident if they move from an Open Choice district into Hartford and wish to continue attending school in their Open Choice district or move out of Hartford and wish to continue attending their Open Choice school in Hartford.
- **Partner Districts:** Some schools have partnerships with specific towns in which a set number of seats in specific grades are reserved for residents of the partner town.
- **Residential Zone Priority:** Hartford residents living in specific zones and applying to certain schools receive priority:
 - **Zone 1:** Montessori Magnet at Fisher School, STEM Magnet at Annie Fisher School, Webster Micro Society Magnet School, or Breakthrough Magnet School, North.
 - **Zone 2:** Capital Preparatory Magnet School (PK3-Grade 8 only) or Hartford Prekindergarten Magnet School: North Campus.
 - **Zone 3:** Breakthrough Magnet School, South, Environmental Sciences Magnet at Hooker School, Hartford Prekindergarten Magnet School: South Campus, or Montessori Magnet at Batchelder School.
 - **Zone 4:** Kinsella Magnet School of Performing Arts: PK-8 Campus, Betances Learning Lab Magnet School, or Dwight-Bellizzi Dual Language Academy.

Consider Transportation Options

Understanding how transportation works

Free transportation is generally available for most kindergarten through grade 12 students participating in school choice. Understanding the eligibility requirements and how transportation works is an important part of a family's research.

Note about bus stops:

RSCO does not provide door-to-door transportation but generally uses centralized bus stops. Typically, centralized bus stops are not within walking distance of a student's home but are located a few miles away in a public location, such as a town library or school parking lot. Parents/guardians are responsible for transportation to the bus stop.



Transportation Zones

The RSCO Transportation Zone establishes the list of towns where students receive transportation to RSCO School Choice schools and programs within the Greater Hartford region. Refer to the map below for the towns within the RSCO Transportation Zone.

If bus transportation isn't provided and you are responsible for taking your student to school outside your town of residence, you may be eligible to receive a \$5 per day reimbursement, based on your student's attendance, depending on the school choice program and school location. The transportation reimbursement stipend is not available to families who transport students to a magnet school located in their town of residence.

To receive the reimbursement, parents/guardians must:

- A.** Meet the eligibility requirements;
- B.** Transport their child for the entire school year; and
- C.** Complete an online reimbursement form,
available at crec.org/transportation/forms.php, before June 15, 2026.

How to Apply

Application process overview

RSCO's user-friendly online application platform makes it easy for families to manage applications for all their children.

After creating your RSCO account, be sure to use the same account every year to submit applications. The placement process gives priority to applicants who have applied for multiple years without an offer. To be identified for this priority, the same account must be used each year.

To apply:

- Go to ChooseYourSchool.org.
- Create a RSCO account or log in to your existing account if you are a returning applicant.
- Create or update your Guardian Profile.
- Create or update Student Profiles for all children in your household, including students who are not applying to a choice program, to be sure to access any potential sibling priorities.
- Select schools and programs that fit your student's interests, and rank them in order of preference.
- Remember, you are NOT required to submit applications for all available programs (Magnet, Open Choice, or CTECS).
- Apply only to programs and schools you would accept an offer from.
- Keep your information updated so that you receive time-sensitive communications.

Important note about duplicate accounts:



- You may create only one RSCO account.
- Duplicate RSCO accounts and applications will be deleted.



Be strategic!

If your student wants to attend a specific program—such as Magnet, CTECS, or Open Choice—apply only to that program.

Application Tips and Strategies

Helpful hints for a successful application

As you explore school choice options and complete the RSCO application, here are a few helpful tips to consider.

Pay Attention to Deadlines

Don't miss out on an opportunity because of a late application or missed deadline.

- **Apply by the deadline of February 6, 2026.** This is the best way to increase the chance of receiving a placement offer.
- Late application opportunities will be limited based on the waitlist size generated from applications filed by the deadline. Applying by the deadline ensures all schools and programs are available.
- After receiving a placement notification, respond by the deadline, including completing student registration to hold your seat.

Maximize Your Priorities

- To increase the likelihood of a placement, it is important for you to know your priorities and make sure they are flagged in the Family Profile of your RSCO account. Double check your family's priorities on **page 32**.
- Check the priorities on each Student Profile to confirm that all priorities are listed.
- Rank the school with a priority first to activate the priority. This will give you the best chance of a placement.
- Applying for twins or siblings in the same grade range? Choose the same schools in the same choice order on each application to increase the chance that they will be placed together.
- Only interested in CTECS? Apply only to CTECS technical high schools to activate the CTECS-only priority.
- Only interested in Open Choice? Apply only to the Open Choice Program to activate the Open Choice Only priority.

Go to **page 32** for detailed information on placement priorities.

Know the Placement Rules

One-Offer Rule

Under the one-offer rule, each applicant is eligible for only one placement offer for the 2026-27 school year. Once your student receives an offer for any of the schools listed on the application, the student is removed from all other waitlists and is not eligible for any other placement offer for the 2026-27 school year.



Important note:

Only select schools or districts your student would like to attend, because once they receive an offer, they are not eligible for another placement for the 2026-27 school year. You do not have to apply to the maximum number of schools/districts.

Choice order matters with schools and districts. Generally, the best chance of a placement offer is your student's first-choice school or district selection. However, your student could receive placement at **any** school or district on their application. Therefore, it is important to select only schools your student would like to attend.

No preference among programs. When you apply to CTECS, magnet schools, and/or Open Choice, families cannot indicate which program they prefer. If there is interest in only one program, selections should be limited to that program.

First Round Offers

In the first round of placements, RSCO makes offers only for the school or district you list as your first choice. This means you can add other options without missing a chance at your top choice. After the first round, you'll be able to see your likelihood of getting into each school. If you don't receive an offer at your first-choice school and placement seems unlikely, you can adjust your choice order to try to boost your chance at placement in future rounds. On the other hand, if your student has a good chance of getting into your preferred school, you can remove the other options and stay on the waitlist for your top choice.

Remember, placement is never guaranteed, even with a small waitlist indicator. For more information about the waitlist process, go to [page 47](#).

Respond to Your Placement Offer

What to expect during placement

The RSCO placement process begins in February 2026 for CTECS and March 2026 for magnet schools and the Open Choice Program, and continues through September 30, 2026. RSCO will notify families by email or text message if their child receives a placement offer or is on the waitlist. Read on for specific information about placements and what steps you should take upon receiving an offer.

My student received a placement offer. What happens next?

It's great news when a family receives an offer. It is important to accept the offer by the deadline, or it expires and is automatically declined.

To accept or decline your offer:

- 1. Go to** ChooseYourSchool.org.
- 2. Select “View”** on the student card.
- 3. Review your placement letter**, which is linked under the offer.
- 4. Accept or decline by the deadline.** You will receive a confirmation email and text after you respond. Be sure to register with the new school by the date indicated in the placement notification to keep your seat!





One-Offer Rule

Generally, applicants are eligible to receive only one placement offer. If your student receives an offer, their application will be removed from all other waitlists (Magnet, Open Choice, and CTECS), and they will no longer be eligible for another placement offer for the 2026-27 school year, whether you accept or decline the offer. There are two limited exceptions:

Exception 1

Open Choice for Hartford Residents

Hartford residents can decline their first Open Choice placement offer and remain eligible for a second Open Choice placement offer in a district from their other Open Choice selections if a seat becomes available. If an applicant receives a second Open Choice offer they are not eligible for any other placement offers for the 2026-27 school year, whether they accept or decline the second offer.

Exception 2

Siblings Placed Separately

If siblings in the same grade range (e.g., PK3-5 or 6-12) are placed in separate schools or programs during the same offer round, a family can decline the offer for one student and request to keep that student on the waitlist for the school from which the other sibling received and accepted a placement.

- If only one sibling receives a placement, the waitlisted sibling(s) gets placed sibling priority at that school.
- If the sibling is placed in a different school in a later round, they can decline that placement and stay on the waitlist for the school at which they have placed sibling priority.
- Families must contact RSCO to request this exception to the one-offer rule for sibling placements.



Managing the Waitlist

The waitlist process

For the first round of placements, RSCO makes offers only for a family's first-choice school or district. Even if you don't receive an offer in the first round, your student still has a chance for an offer in later rounds. The RSCO waitlist process provides information about your student's likelihood of a placement and the opportunity to make adjustments to increase the chance of receiving an offer.

My Student Didn't Receive a Placement Offer. What Happens Next?

If your student does not receive a placement offer in the first round, we will notify you by text and email that your student's application is on the waitlist for the schools and programs you selected on their application. The late application period also begins at this time, during which you can add up to five additional selections to your application, but options will be limited to select grades and schools based on the waitlist size and number of seats available.

Magnet and Open Choice placements continue throughout the spring and summer, typically every other week. For each waitlist round, offers are made on a limited basis, depending on seat availability. Not every magnet school or Open Choice district offers seats in each round. In addition, schools that do make offers often do not include all grades. **Keep in mind that after the first round, your student could receive an offer from any school or district on their application.**



What Are My Chances of Receiving an Offer?

RSCO assigns all schools and programs on your application an indicator based on your student's position on the waitlist. Log in to your RSCO account to view the indicators for each of your school and program selections. Review the waitlist indicators below:

SMALL

Small (Green): **Good chance of receiving an offer if seats are available**

What it means: Your student is among a small number of applicants who are likely to receive a placement if seats become available. If seats are declined in a round or a current student withdraws, you have a good chance of receiving an offer. **Note: A green indicator does not guarantee a placement—it all depends on whether seats become available.**

What you should do: If you are still interested in this school, think about moving it to your top choice. If you are not interested in receiving a placement, move it down your list or remove it from the application.

MEDIUM

Medium (Yellow): **Offer unlikely in the next round of placements**

What it means: There are a medium number of other applicants who are likely to be placed before your student, and an offer is unlikely in the next round of placements. If seats are declined throughout the placement process, there is a possibility you may receive an offer in a later round.

What you should do: Review your school selections and consider changing your choice order or adding schools that have a green indicator to boost your chances of a placement.

LARGE

Large (Red): **Offer unlikely**

What it means: There are a large number of applicants who are likely to receive placement before your student. While the waitlist can change, it is unlikely your student will receive a placement offer at this school.

What you should do: Review your school selections and consider changing your choice order or adding schools that have a green indicator to boost your chances of a placement.

Submit a late application:

Missed the on-time application deadline? The late application period will open on a limited basis for select grades and schools based on the size of the waitlist and number of seats available. As seats are filled, schools will continue to close for new applications.

Log in to your account to see which schools are still accepting applications. New applicants are generally added to the waitlist after those who applied by the deadline of February 6, 2026, so be sure to use the waitlist indicator to inform your selections.

Maximize Your Chance of Receiving an Offer in the Next Round

Now that you have a better idea of how likely your student is to receive a placement offer, you have the option to update your application to increase the chance of a placement.

Add New Schools

On-time applicants can add up to five additional selections to their application based on the grades and schools available. Your student will be placed on the waitlist after on-time applicants at each of the new schools/districts added. The waitlist indicator lets you know how many applicants are currently on the waitlist for the school or district. Options with a green waitlist indicator give you the best chance for placement.

Once you add schools or programs to your application, the indicator will refresh in real time to show how likely it is that your student will receive a placement if a seat becomes available. The indicator may change depending on choice order and the number of other applicants also adding the school to their application.

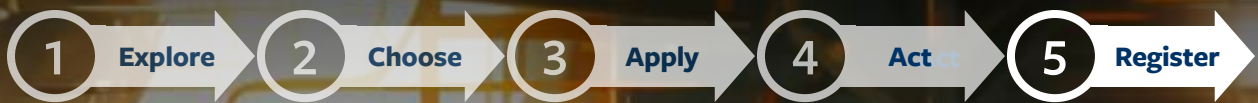
Change the choice order of your original selections

The placement protocol attempts to place students in their preferred schools or districts first before moving on to the other selections. Families may adjust the order of their school and district selections to best position their application for a placement. Since the placement protocol prioritizes choice order, adjusting your choice order could change your waitlist size and increase the likelihood of receiving an offer.

Helpful Tip: *Moving a school or district with a yellow indicator to the top of your list could change it to green.*

Other Things to Know

- **The one-offer rule**—If your student receives an offer from any school, they will be removed from all other waitlists and will no longer be eligible for another placement, regardless of whether you accept or decline the placement.
- **Waitlist** indicators are updated on a real-time basis and can change depending on choice order and the number of other applicants also adding the school to their application. **Monitor your RSCO account to check current waitlists.**
- RSCO will contact applicants by email and text if a placement is made. **Make sure your contact information is up to date.**
- **There are no set numbers for small, medium, and large waitlists.** The cutoff can vary by grade and the number of available seats.
- **Entry grades typically have the most available seats.** Open seats in non-entry grades are more limited.
- **Waitlists expire on September 30, 2026.** Waitlists don't carry over from year to year, so you must submit a new application each year if you are interested in a placement for the upcoming school year.

Once you accept your offer, it's important to start the registration process with the school immediately. The placement letter provides the registration deadline and contact information to start the process.

The registration deadline shortens throughout the placement cycle. Early rounds typically have a deadline of 14 days, while later rounds may provide five to seven days to complete requirements. It's best to start the process as soon as you accept the placement.

Important note: *You must register by the deadline or your student will lose their seat.*

Questions about registering your student at your new school?

RSCO does not manage the school registration process. Your student's new school is your main point of contact, and you must contact the school directly.

Registration Documents


The registration process is handled at the school or in the district your student will attend. During the registration process, families must provide the appropriate documents as directed by the school or district to verify that their student is eligible to attend the school. Listed below are examples of registration documents that schools and districts may request.

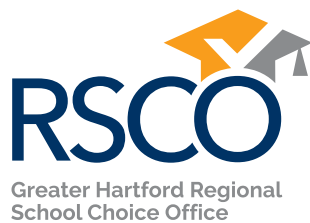
