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Nurses Rank #1 Most Trusted Profession for 15th Year in a Row

SILVER SPRING, MD – The American public has again ranked murses as the professionals with the highest honesty and ethical standards, according to a Gallup poll released today. The annual poll marks the 15th consecutive year that nurses have been ranked the most trusted out of a wide spectrum of professions, including medical doctors and police officers.

"Every day, millions of nurses are on the front lines in the fight to improve the health of all Americans," said Pamela F. Cipriano, PhD, RN, NEA-BC, FAAN, president of the American Nurses Association. "Whether nurses are by the bedside or in the board room, we continue to be a trusted resource and a vital part of our nation's health care system. This poll reflects the trust the public has in us, and we'll continue to work hard to keep that trust."

According to the poll, 84 percent of Americans rated nurses' honesty and ethical standards as "very high." The next closest profession, pharmacists, was rated 17 percentage points behind nursing.

"Trust plays an important role in the relationship between nurses and the patients we serve," said Cipriano. "ANA encourages nurses to draw on that trust to engage with consumers to improve their health and to advocate for patients and for the quality of care in this country. Additionally, I challenge those charged with making health policy at the facility, local, state and national levels, to include the trusted voice of nurses at the decision-making table. Based on this survey, no other profession is held in as high regard by the public. And given nursing's frontline perspective on health care delivery, we offer a point of view that is unmatched."

In 2017, ANA will continue its longstanding efforts to advocate for health system reform. The association is committed to working with the new administration and Congress to advance policy that aligns with its four principles for health system reform: access to care, affordable and equitable care, quality of care and workforce.

IMMUNIZATION REQUIREMENTS FOR ENROLLED STUDENTS IN CONNECTICUT SCHOOLS

2017-2018 SCHOOL YEAR

PRESCHOOL

DTaP: 4 doses (by 18 months for programs with children 18 months of age)

Polio: 3 doses (by 18 months for programs

with children 18 months of age)

MMR: 1 dose on or after 1st birthday

Hep B: 3 doses, last one on or after 24
weeks of age

Varicella: 1 dose on or after 1st birthday or

verification of disease
Hib: 1 dose on or after 1st birthday

Pneumococcal: 1 dose on or after 1st birthday
Influenza: 1 dose administered each year between August 1st-December 31st

(2 doses separated by at least 28 days required for those receiving flu for

the first time)

Hepatitis A: 2 doses given six calendar months apart, 1st dose on or after 1st birthday

KINDERGARTEN

DTaP: At least 4 doses. The last dose must be given on or after 4th birthday Polio: At least 3 doses. The last dose must be given on or after 4th birthday MMR: 2 doses separated by at least 28 days, 1st dose on or after 1st birthday

Hep B: 3 doses, last dose on or after 24 weeks of age

Varicella: 2 doses separated by at least 3 months-1* dose on or after 1* birthday,

or verification of disease

Hib: 1 dose on or after 1st birthday for children less than 5 years old Pneumococcal: 1 dose on or after 1st birthday for children less than 5 years old

Hepatitis A: 2 doses given six calendar months apart, 1st dose on or after 1st birthday

GRADES 1-5

DTaP/Td: At least 4 doses. The last dose must be given on or after 4th birthday.

Students who start the series at age 7 or older only need a total of 3

doses.

Polio: At least 3 doses. The last dose must be given on or after 4th birthday MMR: 2 doses separated by at least 28 days, 1st dose on or after 1st birthday

Hep B: 3 doses, last dose on or after 24 weeks of age

Varicella: 2 doses separated by at least 3 months-1* dose on or after 1* birthday,

or verification of disease

Hepatitis A: 2 doses given six calendar months apart, 1st dose on or after 1st birthday

GRADE 6

DTaP/Td: At least 4 doses. The last dose must be given on or after 4th birthday.

Students who start the series at age 7 or older only need a total of 3

doses.

Polio: At least 3 doses. The last dose must be given on or after 4th birthday MMR: 2 doses separated by at least 28 days, 1st dose on or after 1st birthday

Hep B: 3 doses, last dose on or after 24 weeks

Varicella: 2 doses separated by at least 3 months-1* dose on or after 1* birthday,

2017 - 2018 Immunization Requirements, cont'd

<u>GRADES 7-12</u> Tdap/Td: 1 dose for students who have completed their primary DTaP series.

Students who start the series at age 7 or older only need a total of 3 doses of tetanus-diphtheria containing vaccine, one of which must be

Tdap

Polio: At least 3 doses. The last dose must be given on or after 4th birthday MMR: 2 doses separated by at least 28 days, 1st dose on or after 1st birthday

Meningococcal: 1 dose

Hep B: 3 doses, last dose on or after 24 weeks of age

Varicella: 2 doses separated by at least 3 months-1* dose on or after 1* birthday;

or verification of disease

- DTaP vaccine is not given on or after the 7th birthday and may be given for all doses in the primary series.
- Tdap can be given in lieu of Td vaccine for children 7 years and older unless contraindicated. Tdap is only licensed for one dose.
- Hib is not required for children 5 years of age or older.
- Pneumococcal is required for all Pre-K and K students less than 5 years of age.
- Hep A requirement for school year 2017-18 applies to all Pre-K, K, 1st, 2nd, 3nd, 4th & 5th graders born 1/1/07 or later.
- Hep B requirement for school year 2017-2018 applies to all students in grades K-12.
 Spacing intervals for a valid Hep B series: at least 4 weeks between doses 1 and 2; 8 weeks between doses 2 and 3; at least 16 weeks between doses 1 and 3; dose 3 should not be given before 24 weeks of age.
- Second MMR for school year 2017-2018 applies to all students in grades K-12.
- Meningococcal Conjugate requirement for school year 2017-18 applies to all students in grades 7-12
- Tdap requirement for school year 2017-18 applies to all students in grades 7-12
- If two live virus vaccines (MMR, Varicella, MMRV, Intra-nasal Influenza) are not administered on the same day, they must be separated by at least 28 days (there is no 4 day grace period for live virus vaccines). If they are not separated by at least 28 days, the vaccine administered second must be repeated.
- Lab confirmation of immunity is only acceptable for Hep A, Hep B, Measles, Mumps, Rubella, and Varicella.
- VERIFICATION OF VARICELLA DISEASE: Confirmation in writing by a MD, PA, or APRN that the child has a
 previous history of disease, based on family or medical history.

New Entrant Definition:

*New entrants are any students who are new to the school district, including all preschoolers and all students coming in from Connecticut private, parochial and charter schools located in the same or another community. All pre-schoolers, as well as all students entering kindergarten, including those repeating kindergarten, and those moving from any public or private pre-school program, even in the same school district, are considered new entrants. The one exception is students returning from private approved special education placements—they are not considered new entrants.

Connecticut State Department of Public Health (DPH) School Flu Immunization Requirement for PreK Students: Question and Answer (Q+A)

The Connecticut immunization regulation requires at a minimum one dose of influenza vaccine for school entry, each year between August 1st and December 31, for all children aged 24 months - 4 years (59 months). For more information on influenza vaccines, visit the State Department of Public Health's Web site at www.cdc.gov/flu/protect/vaccine/.

- Q: Do all children aged 24 months 4 years (59 months) who have not received a flu vaccine by December 31st need to be excluded from school?
- A: Children do not have to be excluded from school if the following conditions are met:
 - the school has received a statement signed by the child's HCP indicating that the child has an appointment to receive the required immunization (this is considered "immunization in progress"). Continued enrollment in school for more than thirty days after the named immunization appointment shall be contingent on the school receiving written documentation from the HCP stating either: that the named appointment was kept and the child received the scheduled immunizations, or that the child was unable to receive the scheduled immunizations for medical reasons and a new appointment date is named;
 - the school has received a statement signed and dated by the child's HCP indicating that the child has a medical contraindication to immunization;
 - the school has received a written statement that immunization is contrary to the religious beliefs and practices of the child or the parent of such child. Such statement shall be signed by the child's parent.
- Q: How should a school enforce the flu vaccine regulation for those children who have not received the flu shot by December 31st?
- **A:** Children who have not received the flu vaccine by December 31st must be excluded from school for the duration of influenza season (through March 31st) or until they receive at least one dose of the influenza vaccine.
- Q: Where can a family go to get the flu vaccine if the pediatrician does not have any more flu vaccine?
- **A:** If a HCP cannot provide the flu vaccine within the given time frame of August 1- December 31st, documentation stating that the child has an appointment to receive the flu vaccine from his or her HCP would be acceptable.
- Q: How is the 'flu season' defined?
- **A:** Influenza season generally occurs during November through the end of March.
- Q: Is flu vaccine required after March?
- A: No, students enrolling in school after March 31st are not required to get vaccinated but flu season may extend until May and therefore getting a flu vaccine even late in the season is still protective.
